He was first elected as a Green Party candidate in 1999, topping the poll in the Local Elections.

In 2002 he was elected as a TD in the new Dublin Mid West Dail constituency, the only Green TD ever to be elected in what was then



a three-seater.

Recognised for his work rate on the ground and his straight-talking, nononsense style, Paul Gogarty was re-elected in 2007, taking the second seat.

Paul supported entering Government in 2007 in line with the Party's stated policy of ruling no coalition partner in or out he saw no difference between Fianna Fail or Fine Gael as both

continued to parties take money from vested interests.

Upon entering Government and in recognition of his work on developing Education Policy, particularly the well-received "50 Steps to a Better Education System", Paul was appointed Chairperson of the Joint Oireachtas and stated publicly that Committee on Education and Science.

His record this on committee shows a fair-

minded approach to working with all parties and a proactive role in dealing with education issues that arose. He immediately resigned as Chair of this Committee after the Green Party announced on November 22nd that it would be shortly leaving Government.

His key role at national level was to successfully ensure that education spending was prioritised at a time when all budgets were being cut. With €4 billion cuts in 2009 and €6 billion cuts in 2010, Education was recognised as having fared the best. He also fought to stop third level tuition fees being reintroduced and minimised proposed increases in registration fees in this year's budget.

Paul's personal priorities for the next Dáil



1. Protect investment in Education. It will save money in the long run and help create new jobs.

2. Jobs - Use our vacant industrial units as incubator zones to stimulate new enterprise. Use vacant units for arts groups short of facilities. Continue investment in areas where we hold a competitive advantage such as in software development, tourism, food and renewable energy.

3. Reform the political and electoral system to make it better to serve the modern age. Less TDs with more real say for the Dail as a parliament with free votes on many issues. A reformed Seanad directly elected by the people to scrutinise legislation. An end to the link between politicians and those who donate money to serve their own commercial interests.

4. Invest massively in producing our own home-grown renewable energy. This is where any additional borrowings should go, not into artificially boosting our standard of living. In the coming few years oil and then gas will rocket massively in price, due to rising demand and inability to produce extra supply. We need to save money on imports and become exporters of excess electrical capacity to Europe. Producing three times our needs would fuel our cars through stored hydrogen and electric batteries, it would heat our homes and it would give the country an additional income. This process has begun, but needs to be intensified. This will create jobs and play our part in minimising global warming. Mostly it will preserve our relative prosperity.
