THE JESUS PRAYER

One of the most beautiful books I have come across must be 'The Way of a Pilgrim'. The pilgrim is a little man whose wife has died. Their home has gone up in smoke. There is nothing for it but to take to the roads across Russia and Siberia for what is going to be a long haul over thirteen years.

On the 24th Sunday of Pentecost he went to a church to say his prayers during the liturgy, as he puts it. He heard the words from the First Epistle to the Thessalonians 'pray without ceasing'. From that day onwards his search was to discover the <u>how</u> of prayer without ceasing.

After a year he encounters a staretz, the Russian word for a spiritual guide, a kind of Anam Chara. As Dostoesky puts it, a staretz is one who takes you into his soul. The staretz introduces the pilgrim to the Jesus Prayer, "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me a sinner". There are variations of it but in the end through dint of repetition it becomes an affair of the heart from ceaselessly repeating the holy name of Jesus.

A TRAVEL STORY

The Way of a Pilgrim became a travelogue in search of prayer. The pilgrim is on quite an adventure, ever depending on the hospitality of the people he encounters for shelter. What he wants most of all is a place that will afford him solitude for listening. His search continues, walking the vast countryside and resting.

There is then a combination of travelling and resting wherever such shelter is afforded him, of moving forwards and inwards; and during the day he writes,' if I happened to meet anyone all men without exception were as dear to me as if they had been my dearest relations'. People poured out their souls to him. A very surprising emphasis is the sheer number of times he utters the Jesus Prayer, 3,000 times daily increasing to 6,800 and eventually to 12,000. Such attention to quantity reminds one of Fr. Willie Doyle S.J., Chaplain in the First World War. Such counting does not tally with contemporary ways into praying. The Jesus Prayer in the end is a contemplative way of praying.

FOR ALL SEASONS

The Jesus Prayer is a prayer for all seasons, for beginners as well as for the more experienced. I have spoken about it on occasion at Sunday Mass when there was some emphasis on prayer in the readings. People did express gratitude and appreciation for having been introduced to a way of praying that seemed to meet their needs. I am convinced that it can be a very suitable way of praying for those who claim that prayer is absent from their lives because of a lack of both time and space.

The Jesus Prayer can be recited during our normal daily tasks, 'the hands at work, the mind and heart with God', delays in traffic, getting a meal ready, doing the wash up, hoovering the floor, walking the dog; 'Lord Jesus Christ (Son of God) have mercy on me a sinner'.

That is what is called the free use of the prayer as opposed to the more formal use which is setting aside a definite period of time in which to engage oneself in praying the Jesus Prayer in silence, allowing it to permeate into one's innermost being. The Jesus Prayer combines adoration and repentance and comes straight out of the Gospels. Recall the blind man Bartimaeus in the tenth chapter of Mark's Gospel shouting out in the midst of the crowd 'Jesus, son of David, have mercy on me'.

The Jesus Prayer is one of the great treasures of the Russian and Greek Orthodox Churches which they share with other Christian churches. To quote Bishop Kallistos Ware "the Jesus Prayer makes each into a man for others, a living instrument of God's peace, a dynamic centre of reconciliation". (SLG Press Oxford 1982).




Please God when the sabbatical is over and my sense of humour is restarted, you shall see the same Tony with a new smile!

The Ladies travelled to Japan the next day and went on a whirlwind ten-day tour, promoting



and parents and players will also be able to purchase the clubs track suits and football shorts and socks.


Monthly Draw


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JUNIOR SCHOOL NEWS

Spring Term has ended and what an exciting term it was. Seachtain na Gaeilge was a particular highlight with every pupil and teacher involved in the week's culture fest, co-ordinated by Ms.Carr.

Every class participated in the Ceilí Mór, while many pupils prepared songs, dances and instrumental music. We had six classes participating in Córfhéile na Scoileanna at the arena in Tallaght, and they then performed for the whole school on 15th March. Members of the local Craobh Naithí Branch of Comhaltas Ceoltoirí Éireann and pupils from the Senior School also entertained us from the stage.

Student Teachers

We have hosted ten student teachers during March – five from Lockhaven University, Pennsylvania USA, and five Irish students, two of whom are pastpupils of the school. These students have brought great new ideas to our classrooms and they have learned a lot from our teachers and pupils.

Sacramental preparations

After receiving the Sacrament of Penance in February, our six second classes began preparations for First Holy Communion which will take place on three May Sundays -14th, 21st and 28th at the 9.30 and 10.45 a.m. Masses. Everyone is looking forward to these special ceremonies after Easter.

School Building

The Department of Education and Science has granted funding towards essential maintenance work on the roof of the school. Many flat-roofed schools which were built in the 1970's are now experiencing problems with leaks. The maintenance work will be completed during the Summer Holidays. The Board of Management also hopes to resurface our playground during the Summer. The Design and Science Team appointed by the Department of Education and the Board of Management has been busily preparing plans for new permanent classrooms to replace our many prefabs. We hope to have their proposals before the Summer holidays.

Government Buildings

Government Chief-Whip Minister Tom Kitt, hosted fifty staff members at his office in late March. We received a warm hospitable welcome, before taking a tour of the Houses of Parliament. Our American student teachers were presented with special mementos of the visit by the Minister.

European Links

Since Christmas pupils and teachers have focussed on the second aspect of our Comenius project – 'School Long Ago'. Retired teacher Mrs. Kay Garvey completed special workshops with second class pupils. Mrs. Garvey helped the pupils to compare and contrast life in the Junior School from when it first opened in the mid seventies to today. We sent project packs to our six European partner schools and we then received six very interesting studies of school long ago in Estonia, Germany, Italy, Belgium and Turkey.

Six of our teachers will visit our German partners in Wesseling, near Bonn, over the June Bank Holiday weekend.

Enrolment

All places in next year's twenty four classes have now been filled. There are quite a number of applications on our waiting list for cancellations.

School Tours

Mrs. Corduff, our Deputy Principal, and class teachers have organised exciting field trips for our pupils during Summer term. They will travel to Airfield Trust in Dundrum for an educational visit to the farm and also to visit their Discover Primary Science Centre.

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JUNIOR SCHOOL NEWS

The Boards of Management of St. Colmcille's Senior and Junior National Schools have been very concerned at the lack of attention being paid by some motorists to the traffic management system on our grounds.

The two schools and the parish invested very heavily in a one-way road system and large car parks in 2002. The project was prioritised in order to make our school environment safer for everyone in the school community, particularly our young pupils.

During this school year some incidents have indicated that a small minority of motorists are ignoring the safety mechanisms that are integral to the success of our traffic management system. Our Boards of Management have received numerous complaints in relation to the following issues.

- 1. Parking on double-yellow lines
- 2. Parking in disabled parking spaces
- 3. Parking on footpaths and grass verges
- Parking in the set-down area (which is designed to operate exactly like the one in Dublin Airport)
- 5. Driving forward and reversing against the oneway system
- 6. Driving through the staff carpark
- 7. Ignoring of pedestrian crossings and road signs
- 8. Speeding on school grounds
- 9. Parking across entrances to driveways of school, Iona Centre and presbytery
- 10. Removal of traffic cones and parking in the staff car park
- 11. Refusal to give way to school buses
- 12. Failure of pedestrians to use school wardens and footpaths

In the interest of pupil safety we urge all members of the school community to abide by the simple principles of our traffic management system.



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KNOCKLYON HISTORY SOCIETY

On March 8th 2006 Our Local History Society in Knocklyon was treated to a truly interesting and informative lecture on Georgian Dublin. This was an excellent presentation by Ainnle O'Neill - which traced the origins of Dublin from the Viking invasions in the 9th Century through to the reign of George 4th. The maps used by Ainnle were particularly interesting. We were shown the extent of the walled Viking Settlement. Next came Dublin as it looked after the Norman Invasion, now with walls of stone. Lured by our wide port and its trading potential the Anglo Normans had seized the town and displaced the Norsemen. Early in the 13th Century they built a castle and proceeded to subjugate the native population.

The boundaries of Dublin hardly changed during the next five centuries. It remained a small and dilapidated mediaeval city – its growth random and disorderly. Trinity College was established in 1591 but it was more than a hundred years later before the great infloresence of architectural planning and building took place. Large numbers of English settlers, who had become the ruling caste, flocked to the city. Confident of their power and privilege they took up residence and disdaining the existing dwellings these wealthy and discriminating citizens asked for more. The response to their demands was the building of Georgian Dublin.

A man called Luke Gardiner – a wealthy Dublin banker – who owned land on the north side of the Liffey, was in the vanguard in speeding the urban expansion. The real beginning of the great building period was in Henrietta Street in 1724.

There followed the laying out of new residential terraces and stately squares. Mansions of great scale and pleasing proportions with beautiful internal decoration began to sprout up south as well as north of the river. During the 1750s the Wide Streets Commision was appointed and to this body we owe the excellent symmetry and dignified character of what we know today as Georgian Dublin.

The city was now expanding at an impressive rate. The population had increased to about one-fifth that of London, making it the second city of the British Empire. In addition to the nobility an upper class of wealthy merchants and professional men had found their niche. There was great wealth in the city, but also great poverty as Swift under the pseudonym of "Drapier" kept reminding the British Parliament.

The Anglo Irish gave Dublin the character that it still retains today. They have left us with a lasting reminder of an age of culture, refinement and good taste.

On March 25th Áinnle led us in a walk around Georgian Dublin when with the benefit of his extensive knowledge on the subject we enjoyed and began to appreciate again the beauty of our wonderful but fragile heritage.

Rural Electrification

At a recent meeting on 8th February 2006, Chris Shouldice made a presentation on 'Rural Electrification in Ireland'. Chris had been one of the Rural Area Engineers who were in charge of the construction crews carrying out the work from 1946 to 1963. The genesis of the programme was the implementation of the Shannon Scheme (1925 – 1929) at a cost of £5.2 million, the brainchild of a young Irish engineer Thomas Mclaughlin and made possible by Patrick McGilligan, Minister for Industry and Commerce. The ESB was established in 1927.

During the 1930's the emphasis was on supplying 1.3 million urban dwellers; it was not until the end of World War Two that electrification for the 1.7 million rural dwellers was tackled, due mainly to the urging of a later Minister for Industry and Commerce, Séan Lemass. 792 areas were identified, each with an active local committee and consisting of about 500 houses, 25 square miles in extent.

The first pole was erected in 1946 at Kilsallaghan in Co. Dublin – this location has now been chosen as the controversial site for the new State prison! The work increased in intensity and in 1956 alone 99 areas were electrified; the 35,000 consumers connected that year entailed erection of 113,000 poles and 6,200 miles of overhead wire. This rate of



working was the second highest in the world, next to the TVA scheme in the USA.

By 1963 the work was almost complete, at an overall cost of £34 million over its 17 year duration – surely very good value for a major



infrastructural project, when compared to recent experience e.g. Luas, Dublin Port Tunnel, PPARS, electronic voting systems etc.

Apart from the obvious advantages for household and farm e.g. electric light and power, pumped water and indoor plumbing, there were two other significant spin-offs. Firstly, the national confidence and self-reliance created by the successful harnessing of our native engineering, planning and management skills in carrying out a major infrastructural project, and then the intensive efforts of up to 500 local committees in canvassing and facilitating the scheme. Even in the hindsight of history it seems a remarkable achievement that with over a million poles erected and 75,000 miles of overhead line stretching along mainly private land over a 17 year period, that the number of disputes and wayleave objections not settled on the spot but which rose to Boardroom level could be counted on the fingers of two hands.

After Chris described some of the mainly humorous incidents that happened in the 'Hidden Ireland' about to be electrified, members of the overflow audience contributed their own reminiscences about this exciting period in our social history that carries some important lessons for our own time.




