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
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Memories of Pope John Paul II



On 29th September 1979 I was a mesmerised fiveyear-old in the Phoenix Park waving excitedly at the helicopter carrying Pope John Paul. During his homily at Mass that day he said, "It is from the Eucharist that all of us receive the grace and strength for daily living." The following day in Galway he spoke these famous words, "Young people of Ireland, I love you." At the time I didn't


realise the significance of his words, but this Pope had already made his mark on my young life, and over the years I always remembered that he had come to see us in Ireland.

In 2000 I joined with 2.4 million young people to meet with the Holy Father in Rome. It astounded me that his words were so relevant to my life. How could this old man understand so perfectly the concerns, worries, hopes and dreams that I held secretly inside me? That week I joined with the others around me in returning our affection to him: "John Paul 2, we love you!" Two years later I had the privilege of being close to him during World Youth Day in Toronto. It was clear that, despite physical frailty, he was filled with an energetic love for everyone.

When I heard of our Holy Father's death on April 2nd, I grieved like I would for a much-loved grandfather. I cried with sorrow at his passing, and at

the same time I was filled with immense gratitude for his life and all he has done for me and for the world. I will always remember him on Easter Sunday at his window, struggling to give his blessing. His courage and witness in suffering was an inspiration.

The theme chosen by the late John Paul for this Eucharistic year was "Stay with us, Lord." It was fitting that his last message to the world on Easter Sunday was a reflection on these very words. Just as the words of Christ burned in the hearts of the disciples on the road to Emmaus, so the words of this Pope of my youth will always echo in my heart. He showed me how to be the image of Christ to others in the world. He showed me that the Lord really does always stay with us in the Eucharist and in the Church. May the Heavenly Father reward him and grant him eternal rest.

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<u>REFLECTION</u> Preparing Children for the Sacraments

The month of May is upon us once again, is it my imagination or are the years going around even quicker than before! In our own parish here in Knocklyon – as in parishes throughout the country – 2nd Class children together with their families, Priests and teachers are busily preparing for First Holy Communion.

But sometimes we forget that this is the second sacrament which will have been celebrated with the children this year. Back in early March the children experienced the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the first time. For some reason this equally momentous occasion is not surrounded by as much fuss and excitement. We had a relaxing celebration in an atmosphere of prayer, music and reflection with helpful and encouraging words from our Priests. Children of today will no longer be able to identify with Frank O'Connor's experience of First Confession! (As a child I dreaded going into that dark box – and as for the fear of that door locking when I was inside. . . .)

Yes, much has changed both in our celebration of and our preparation for First Confession with our young children. The rote learning of questions and answers is long gone. The Alive-O Programme of religious education – which was introduced to schools from the mid-90's onwards – is thought-provoking and child-centred with a great emphasis on the 'story'. Of course what better way is there to get a child's undivided attention than to tell or read a story. In this programme many values are conveyed through this medium.


As part of our preparation for First Confession we explore a series of stories which we teachers and children knowingly refer to as the 'Little Being Stories'. In a nutshell these are age-appropriate stories highlighting the distinction between right and wrong. Of course we always endeavour to relate what the children learn to their own experiences. The stories tell of Little Beings doing wrong -'Being Unfair', 'Being Selfish', 'Being a Bully', 'Being Untrue', 'Not Being Bothered', Through the telling of the story and the subsequent discussion (who better for spontaneous discussion than seven and eight-year-olds!) the 'digging deeper' to find the real message in the story we help the children to become aware of times when we all behave like these 'Little Beings' and of the consequences for ourselves and others. When we do wrong we need to be reconciled to one another and to God. Hence our need for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Along with the wonderfully reassuring story of the Good Shepherd these 'Beings' enable the theme of forgiveness to be explained in a child-friendly manner.

In some of the stories, the 'Little Being' talks to its 'Something Inside'. Then we move on and explore the notion of 'self-talk' with the children, the chatter that goes on in all our minds and hearts. We discuss how this 'selftalk' can influence us both in how we feel and how we behave. And so in an indirect way we are laying the foundation for a more in-depth exploration – at a later stage of course – of the role of conscience. In our approach we stress at all times the loving and forgiving God not the negative aspect of sin.

Yes, the way religion is taught today is very different to the way I, and indeed many of our parishioners, were taught. But it's the approach that has changed – the basic truths are still being conveyed. Of course it is said that, 'Religion is taught – Faith is caught.'

With little time to spare in between we then start on the Preparation for First Holy Communion. One of our important tasks here is to lead the children to an understanding of Mass. Obviously this understanding leads to more meaningful participation both now and in the years ahead.

We firstly talk of the Mass as a Celebration. Usually I ask the children to look at and think of the word 'celebration' and we brainstorm it:



We link this to the Mass and see that all the essential elements of a celebration are there. We discuss how natural is it that Jesus should ask us to celebrate His presence in the form of a meal, at Mass. Very soon our Second Class children will be able to share more fully in this meal through Holy Communion.

We talk of how yet again we celebrate the gift of God's forgiveness at Mass – re-affirming for the children the message of a loving Father always ready to forgive us when we say sorry.

We talk of how at Mass Jesus comes to us both in the words of the readings and Gospel and in Holy Communion. We are fed by his words and his presence in Holy Communion.

Of course there is no explaining the great mystery of the Real Presence. As teachers we are accustomed to explaining things, leading children to an understanding. When I am asked 'How can this be? How can Jesus be present in that little Host?', I tell the children that this is a question I cannot answer nor one which any of us – even the great theologians – can understand. But then as adults we know that Faith does not depend on us understanding everything perfectly. If we did understand we wouldn't need Faith!

We must always remember that the preparation for the Sacrament is on-going – it doesn't just start in Second Class. It all began a number of years ago when the children were taken to the church to be baptised. Nor does it end here – we are simply laying the foundations for hopefully a later more explicit understanding of all the Sacraments.

As a teacher I feel privileged to be part of this great partnership – consisting of home, school and parish – as we journey with the children as they prepare for the Sacraments of First Penance and the Eucharist.

I finish by quoting part of the Centenary Prayer of our own St. Colmcille:

As they journey on Life's Way May they remain like Colmcille Strong in Faith, Firm in Hope, Active in Charity.

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KNOCKLYON CONCERT BAND CROWNED NATIONAL CHAMPIONS!

On Saturday, 2nd April, our Senior Band were awarded First Place at the **Irish Association of Brass and Concert Band National Championships** in Athlone. Not only did they get First Place in the Concert Band Section (Woodwind and Brass) they were also awarded Best Overall Junior Band at the Championships. The adjudicator Mr. Dennis Wilby also added a further award by selecting our performance of 'Ceremony Chant and Ritual' (a very complex piece commissioned for Concert Band) as the best choice piece performed in the section.

This triple victory is a unique achievement and although we have come close to winning before, the lifting of all three categories is a testament to how far our players have matured in the last couple of years.

To put this victory in context, the Knocklyon Concert Band are the newest band, having only formed in 1999, on the register of Concert Bands eligible to play at the National Championships. The next youngest band are our friends and neighbours from the Rathfarnham Concert Band who were formed in 1981. After that, competing bands have a long tradition of music-making, with some bands being over 50 years old.

For such a young group to march off with all the main prizes is a staggering achievement!

This is shaping up to be a year of exceptional achievement for the KCBS. Following our gold medal success at the regional championships of the European Band Festival in Midsomer Norton (England) last year, our Senior Band will travel to Neerpelt (Belgium) to play at Europe's largest gathering of bands. The 3 day European Youth Music Festival only invites the cream of European talent to perform, and we are very fortunate to have been invited. Meanwhile, our Intermediate Band will perform at the South of Ireland Band Championships in Clonakilty, Co. Cork, in early July.

Congratulations to all our successful musicians, and many thanks to our hard-working conductors, tutors and parents on the Development Committee.

Our joy at winning the National Championships was later tempered by the news of Eamonn Rynne, the father of two of our band members. The Band would like to thank the family for the opportunity to partake in the funeral Mass and would again like to extend our deepest sympathy to them.

Ms Murphy O'Shea, our Physical Education co-ordinator, organised a very successful fortnight of games on our three school yards. Teachers taught the game in class and pupils then had opportunities to teach their friends at lunchtime.

MUSIC EDUCATION

Ms Meeley has taken responsibility for this important area of Arts Education. She welcomed the Band of the Garda Síochána to the school on their first ever visit to Knocklyon. They performed two great concerts for our young pupils. The New Church Organ



Parishioners, particularly those attending the 11 o'clock Mass, may have noticed recently that our church has a new organ. The old instrument had fallen into disrepair and like all things electronic, had become obsolete and impossible to rehabilitate. After much discussion and research on the part of the Parish Team assisted by organists and choir directors past and present, the new Allen electronic organ was chosen and was installed by Jeffers Organs of Cork in time for the Holy Week ceremonies. While it is not a pipe organ, the organ reproduces pipe organ sounds which have been sampled electronically. A much wider variety of sounds is available than on the previous organ. These are transmitted throughout the church through two large speakers attached to the side walls of the building. The hope is that our new organ will give enhanced support to the choirs and to all who participate in our liturgies as they lift their voices in communal prayer in years to come.

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UPDATE FOR THE PARISH FORUM



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ST. COLMCILLE'S COMMUNITY SCHOOL

OFFICIAL SCHOOL OPENING

More than 20 years of campaigning finally came to fruition with the official opening of St Colmcille's Community School in Knocklyon.

Monday 7th of March 2005 students, staff, past and present, members of the Board of Management and the Parents Association as well as community leaders and public representatives gathered to mark the occasion; the school has been in operation since 2000.

The Minister of Social and Family Affairs, Séamus Brennan, did the honours, assisted by Bishop Eamonn Walsh who also blessed the school.

Students sang and played instruments during the liturgy and different art work, trophies and achievements were also on display throughout the building.

The crowd was welcomed by deputy principal Ger Hackett, followed by Bishop Walsh who said he saw the school as an expression of "people power and determination". Head girl Kylie Moynagh was MC on the day, introducing each speaker.

Dr. Vincent Kenny, the chairman of the school's board of management and who, along with others campaigned and fought tirelessly for the school since the late-1970's, then spoke and appealed to the community of Knocklyon to stay involved with the school. He said: "The campaign didn't mean just getting a building and a community school, something lit and took hold because we became a community, what we know today as Knocklyon. Don't let go of the dream, participate."

The chairman of the parents association, John Bentham, outlined some of the achievements of the school and association and then announced that the school's library is to be named the Dr. Vincent Kenny Library and presented Dr. Kenny with the silver name plate which will hang over the door; a standing ovation greeted this announcement.

Minister Brennan then spoke of lessons he learned during the campaign for the school, which was "be wary of the accepted, of the given research".

He said: "We were told there was no need for a local school, that the other schools in the area could handle the students, but it turned out the research and statistics were inaccurate."

John McKennedy (Principal) then spoke of the dedication of all the staff and students both in getting the school up and running and in preparing "selflessly" for the official opening. Addressing the first sixth year and Leaving Certificate

Addressing the first sixth year and Leaving Certificate class to come through the school, he said, "You led the way and showed strong leadership to the newer students. You are our best asset and we would like to wish you every success in the exams and your lives ahead."

FRENCH EXCHANGE

All 40 students who participated in the French exchange

were really excited, and awaiting the arrival of their French correspondent who they had spent a week with in October 2004. There were many activities lined up for us which both French and Irish took part in.

On the 15th of March, they arrived, greeted by a warm reception with food and drinks which students and parents had prepared. Everyone was excited and looking forward to the fun filled week ahead. Activities organised included a Dublin sight seeing tour, a Céilí lead by Mr Mc Kennedy and an adventurous hike up Larch Hill. On St. Patrick's Day everyone headed off in different directions, some went to the parade, as it was a lovely day. The Irish families occupied their French visitor making sure they were always kept busy. Over the weekend, each family and their French visitors enjoyed different activities such as swimming, trips to the zoo, shopping and video nights in each other's houses. Each French visitor got a chance to spend some quality time with his or her families while having fun at the same time.

On Monday all students went to Blanchardstown shopping centre to take part in team bowling and some shopping. On Tuesday morning, there were tears and laughter as students waved goodbye to their French friends. One student said, "It was a very enjoyable experience and we would like to thank Ms Callaghan, Ms Hanlon and Mr. Flynn for making it all possible."

FORM AND FUSION

Creative Knocklyon students have put their heads together and designed an innovative costume which has put them into the finals of the Form + Fusion Awards.

Local Transition Year students Shane Kenrick, Mark Smith, Barry Sheridan, Ross Maguire Karl Doran and Ciara Lynch will bring their colourful design to the Grande Finale of the competition in May.

The costume, Navajo, represents the struggle for survival of native minority cultures against the onslaught of Western capitalism.

According to teacher Lorna Burke, who supervised the project, the idea behind the costume arose from a brainstorming session. The concept for the costume is based on the totem pole, a pole or pillar carved and painted with symbols representing family lineage and mythical or historical incidents and traditionally erected before the homes of native Indians in America.

But the Navajo Indians represent just one of the almost extinct minority cultures that the students wanted to draw attention to in their project.

Lorna explained: "It's about the destruction of native minority cultures against the on-slaught of Western capitalism.".

"From (the students') point of view, it's basically looking at identity and individuality within a group or community so, they made their own totem pole, and so they weren't

following one specific design. They looked at different totem poles and Indian masks and created their own."

The Form and Fusion Awards, which are open to all 14-18 year old secondary school students, were established to empower teens to unleash their creativity in a supportive environment. An incredible 2,441 costumes were received for this year's awards, and this is also the first year that the Knocklyon school has entered the contest.

Ms Burke explained "that is why we are so delighted to reach the final, we have being working on this since October and they were in every day after school and on Saturdays".

The Competition is based around the idea that the "fusion of ideas, materials, techniques and talent variably produces inspiring and memorable costumes from recycled materials".

Finally, we selected our representatives from 1st, 2nd and Transition Year to go on to the County Final, which was held in February.

It was a fabulous achievement for all students involved to represent our school in the County Final. The students learned a lot about the competition they were up against and the interview skills they needed to win. We were delighted and very proud of Conor Power and Karl Dunne, both TY students, who won "Most Innovative Product" in the senior category. All students gained great confidence in themselves and in their ability and practical knowledge of the business subjects.



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Talk, Wednesday, 9th March, The History of San Clemente – the Dominican Church in Rome Speaker: Dr. Eileen Kane

The Church of San Clemente, administered by the Irish Dominicans since the late 1600's, is one of the oldest churches in Rome. While the present basilica dates from the 12th century, there is evidence of a church on that site going back to the first century. The basilica is located near the Colosseum.

Pope St. Clement was the third successor to St. Peter. During the reign of Trajan (98-117), Clement was exiled to Crimea, worked in the marble mines there, and in 100AD, was thrown into the Black Sea with an anchor tied round his neck – hence his icon, the anchor. His remains were located by SS Cyril and Methodius, and in 867 were returned to Rome and interred in San Clemente.

In 1867, Fr. Joseph Mullooly, a Longford man then Prior of San Clemente, began excavations under the present church, uncovering the earlier 4th century basilica, and at a still lower level the remains of an earlier first century building. Later excavations revealed a fourth stratum containing buildings destroyed in the fire of Nero in 64AD. The water table prevents further excavation at that level.

In her illustrated talk, art historian Dr. Eileen Kane, described in great detail the ornate decoration, from the Cosmatesque mosiac floor (after the family Cosmas – using pieces of marble from ancient buildings) to the ceiling – late Baroque and early Rococo. However, the crowning glory is the Apse mosaic, depicting the Crucifixion with the Cross as the Tree of Life giving sustenance to all creation.



Of the side chapels, the most interesting is that of St. Catherine of Alexandria, martyred for protesting against the persecution of Christians.

Dr. Kane has studied the basilica's art for over 25 years and has written a number of books on the subject, the most recent being on St. Catherine's Chapel.

San Clemente is well worth a visit.

Reflection for Pentecost

Confirmation is closely associated with Baptism but differs from it, Confirmation is an extension of Baptism and is associated with the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. When the Spirit came on the Apostles they were filled with power and conviction. They became men transformed, filled with God's spirit.

The work of the Holy Spirit in them made them aware of the love of Jesus and so a new relationship with Jesus was born. The Spirit launched them into the world to be witnesses to the Resurrection and to preach the gospel of salvation to all people.

The power that was given to the Apostles is given to us also. The gifts of the Holy Spirit were given to at Baptism and later at Confirmation. What we need is Faith to accept the gifts and the energy to put our faith to work in situations where we find ourselves.

The gifts of the Holy Spirit will give us courage to open doors and to go out to people who may not have heard of the Holy Spirit. We need to be transformed at Pentecost, our fear must be turned to joy. We know that the Apostles were fearful and were staying together in their fear before the coming of the Holy Spirit but then they received the gifts and were no longer afraid but went out to preach the good news with joy. They were liberated from their fears and were prepared to suffer any hardship for the sake of the Gospel.

When we are liberated from our fears we will not be afraid or ashamed to proclaim the gospel by word and example.
