Its proximity to the most sequestered portion of the Phoenix-park, the beautiful scenery of this part of the Liffey, with the Strawberry beds, render it a place of much resort in the summer season.

**CLONDALKIN.**

CLONDALKIN, an inland parish and village, partly in Newcastle, but chiefly in Uppercross barony, Dublin county, 4½ miles S.W. from Dublin, comprising an area of 4,777 acres, of which 44 are in the village. Population, 2,430; of village, 474, inhabiting 89 houses. It is situated near the ninth lock of the Grand Canal, and close to the line of the Great Southern and Western Railway, of which it is the first station from Dublin. It was anciently named Chain-Dolcan, and by the Danes Dun-awley. Its ancient round tower bespeaks its antiquity. A monastery also existed here, of which St. Cronan Moehua was the first abbot. In 896 a palace of Anlaf, the Danish King of Dublin, stood here, and was destroyed by the Irish under Ciaran, the son of Ronan. In 1171 Roderic O'Connor King of Leinster aided by the forces of O'Ruarek and O'Carroll, were here opposed to Strongbow, on his way to Dublin, but had to yield to the latter. The village consists chiefly of one irregular street, of small but neatly built houses and cottages. The only public buildings are the Parish Church, a small plain modern building, and a neat Roman Catholic Chapel. It has almshouses for destitute widows, established by the Rev. Dr. Reade, the rector; also a Poor Shop, Repository, Dorcas Institution, Lying-in Hospital, and Dispensary, a Parochial and two National Schools, and a Constabulary Police Station. It has paper and oil mills, and there were formerly powder mills at Little Corkagh, which ceased working in 1815. Near the mail coach road to Naas is the monastery of Mount Joseph, pleasantly situated in elevated ground, established in 1813, and consists of a prior, chaplain, and several monks, who maintain themselves by their own industry and the profits of a school. The ancient round tower, before referred to, is the nearest structure of the kind to the metropolis, and is in good preservation. It stands 100 feet high, and is 15 feet in diameter, covered with a conical roof of stone. Near to it is the ruins of the ancient monastery, extending 120 feet in length, and at the entrance to the village are the ruins of a fortified castle. The principal gentlemen's seats are Newlands, formerly the residence of Lord Kilwarden. Collinstown House, Larkfield, Corkagh, Moyle Park, Nanger, and Neilstown House. There is a Post Office Receiver in the town.

## CLONSKEAGH, OR CLONSKEA.

**CLONSKEAGH**, a village in St. Mary's, Donnybrook, parish, barony, and county of Dublin, two miles S. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 68 acres. Population, 310, inhabiting 54 houses. It is situated on the river Dodder, and on the road to Enniskerry. It contains two hammer-smith iron works; and a marble saw mill. The neighbourhood is studded with gentlemen's seats and neat villas. *Virgemount* is a pretty range of houses close to the village. *Roebuck*, a district half a mile further on, is covered with elegant mansions and demesnes, the principal of which is the castle of that name, the seat of A. B. Crofton, esq., which, when originally erected, was strongly fortified, the residence of Lord Trimleston, and occupied by James II. and the Duke of Berwick, when encamped in the neighbourhood. *Milltown* is less than half a mile to the right of Clonskeagh, a dilapidated village in St. Peter's parish, Uppercross barony, and comprises an area of 185 acres. Population 363, inhabiting 132 houses. It contains a small Church as a Chapel of Ease to St. Peter's, and a small Catholic Chapel. Its vicinity is adorned with many pleasing villas and respectable residences, the principal of which are *Milltown-park* and *Fairyland*. Three omnibuses ply through Clonskeagh from and to Dublin and Dundrum several times a day. The nearest Post Office receivers are Rathmines and Dundrum.

## CLONTARF.

**CLONTARF**, a maritime parish and extensive village in Coolock barony, Dublin county, three miles E.N.E. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 1,190 acres, of which 33 occupy the village and sheds of Clontarf. Population of parish, 2,682; of village and sheds, 675, inhabiting 138 houses. It is a memorable place in Irish history, as the scene of a great battle fought by King Brian Boromh, or Boru, on Good Friday, 1014, that put an end to the Danish power in Ireland, the details of which are variously and diffusively narrated by the native historians, and form, it is said, the subject of Gray's ode of the "Fatal sisters." The village was formerly a fishing town of some importance, but with the exception of some extensive and profitable oyster beds, off the sheds, it has long lost that character. The central portion is a street that runs from the shore inland to the gate of the castle, but the greater and more diversified part faces the strand in continuous rows or clusters of houses, many of which are handsome buildings, besides numerous small cottages, suited to sea bathers, that line the green lanes and avenues of the village. Marino, the beautiful seat of the Earl of Charlemont, in a line with the strand, and contiguous to the village, is noticed in Drumcondra parish, to which it belongs. The castle of Clontarf, one of the first within the English pale, was taken down in 1335, and the present mansion, with a Norman tower, erected thereon. The Church, dedicated to St. John, is a small edifice. The Roman Catholic Chapel is a large and handsome structure. There is a Widows' Alms House, a Parochial and Roman Catholic Free School, and County and District Constabulary Police Station. It is much frequented in summer for sea bathing by all

**LUCAN.**

LUCAN, an inland town and parish in Newcastle barony, Dublin county, seven miles W. from Dublin, comprising an area of 1,126 acres, of which 33 are in the town. Population of parish, 1,009, of town, 578, inhabiting 79 houses. It is situated close to the line of the Great Southern and Western Railway, of which it is the second station from Dublin, and upon the mail-coach road to Galway and Sligo. After the Conquest this place was settled on Richard de Peche, one of the early English adventurers; and in 1220 was in the possession of Waryn de Peche, who founded the monastery of St. Catherine, in the immediate vicinity. In the reign of Richard II. it belonged to the Rokeby family, and in the sixteenth century was the property of the Sarsfield family, and of William, the distinguished general of that name, who forfeited it for his adherence to the cause of James II. It is now the property of the Vesey family. The town is prettily situated in a fertile vale, on the east bank of the River Liffey, which is here crossed by a bridge of one arch, with granite parapet, surmounted by iron pallsades, and consists of one wide angular street of small but neat houses and cottages, most of which are let in summer to visitors and invalids. Its public buildings are, the Parish Church, a neat structure with a tower and spire, a large new Roman Catholic Chapel, and a Wesleyan Methodist Meeting House. It has a Dispensary and a Loan Fund; a Lending Library, and National Schools. It is a Chief Constabulary Police Station, and Petty Sessions are held every alternate Tuesday. Lucan is noted for its chalybeate spa, and is much resorted to for its efficacy in scorbutic, bilious, and rheumatic complaints; in that called the "boiling spring," its water on



analysis has been found to contain in every two gallons, 70 grains of crystallized carbonate of soda, 20 of carbonate of lime,  $\frac{1}{4}$  of carbonate of magnesia, 2 of silice,  $\frac{1}{4}$  of muriate of soda, and 14 of sulphur. The spa-house is an appropriate building, consisting of a centre and two wings, in one of which is an assembly-room, 62 feet long and 22 feet wide. The scenery around Lucan is delightfully varied, and in part romantically beautiful, particularly in the grounds of Weston park, in which is the well-known and much-frequented waterfall, called the "Salmon Leap," which consists of a succession of rocky ledges on the Liffey, over which the fish dart at one bound. It forms a beautiful cascade, the picturesque effect of which is greatly increased by the rich and lofty wooded banks of the river, and the adjoining tastefully embellished demesne of Leixlip Castle. The parish abounds in gentlemen's seats, and handsome villa residences; the principal of which are Lucan House, in a demesne of 560 acres, in which there is a monument to one of the Sarsfields, and an ancient oratory; St. Edmondsbury, Weston park, Woodville, Hermitage, &c. In the Irish peerage this place gives the title of Earl to the noble family of Bingham.

## MALAHIDE.

**MALAHIDE**, a maritime town and parish in Coolock barony, Dublin county, nine miles N. from Dublin, comprising an area of 1,126 acres, of which 28 are in the town. Population of the parish, 1,341; of town, 596, inhabiting 105 houses. The town is situated on a narrow inlet of the sea, and on the Drogheda railway, of which it forms the fourth station from Dublin. In 1174 the Manor and Castle of Malahide were granted by Henry II. to Richard Talbot (the ancestor of the Earls of Shrewsbury and Lords of Malahide), who accompanied that monarch into Ireland; this grant was confirmed by King John, and its privileges were extended by Edward IV. in 1445, by appointing the Lord of Malahide High Admiral of the port and seas adjoining, and granting courts leet and baron. The whole continued throughout an uninterrupted succession in the family of Talbot to the Revolution, when Cromwell besieged and took the Castle, and resided there for some time, when he passed sentence of outlawry upon Thomas, Lord Talbot de Malahide, and granted the Manor and Castle to Myles Corbet, one of the regicides, who held it seven years, until the Restoration, when the Talbot family resumed possession, and in whom it has remained to the present day. The Castle, commonly called "the Court of Malahide," is a large square building, flanked by lofty circular towers, and stands on a high limestone rock, commanding a fine view of the town and bay. Of the original Castle little remains but the site, and that has been greatly enlarged and improved by the present Lord Talbot de Malahide; the principal front is embattled, and the main entrance, which is under a splendid Gothic porch, is defended by two circular towers. The grand hall is roofed with richly-carved ancient Irish oak, lighted by three large windows, with a gallery at the end. Among many splendid apartments the Castle contains, the most curious is that called the "oak chamber," ceiled and wainscotted with richly-carved oak, in compartments, containing scriptural devices, and lighted with a pointed window of stained glass. In the drawing-room, among other valuable paintings, there is a small altar-piece painted by Albert Dürer, said to have been originally in the oratory of Mary Queen of Scots, at Holyrood House. The demesne is adorned with groups of stately trees, and the grounds and gardens of the Castle are beautifully laid out. It is open daily to visitors (Sundays excepted) from 10, A.M., to 1, P.M., and 2 to 4, P.M. The town contains few houses, but many handsome cottages, which are chiefly let in summer to visitors for sea bathing. The only public buildings in the parish are the Church, a neat edifice of the later English style, and a handsome Roman Catholic Chapel, opened July, 1846. It has a Constabulary Police and a Coast-guard Station. It is said to have been once a place of great traffic, and Hollinshed enumerates it as amongst the principal post-towns of Ireland. The cotton manufacture was introduced here in the last century by the late Mr. McIntire, aided by a grant of £2,000 from the late Irish Parliament, but did not succeed. An Act was also obtained in 1788 by the same gentleman, at his own expense, for a canal to extend to Swords and Fieldstown, but it



## PALMERSTOWN.

**PALMERSTOWN**, or **PALMERSTON**, a parish and village in Uppercross barony, Dublin county,  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles west from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 1,513 acres, of which 7 are in the village. Population of the parish, 1,511; of the village, 411, inhabiting 152 houses. It is situated on the river Liffey and road to Lucan, and contains large cotton mills, iron and lead works, and oil and dye-stuff mills. The village consists of small humble dwellings, irregularly built, a Roman Catholic chapel, and Constabulary Police station; a fair for horses and cattle, well frequented, takes place on 21st August. The Great Southern and Western line of railway passes through the parish. In the vicinity there are several handsome seats and villas, the principal of which is Palmerstown House, a seat of the Earl of Donoughmore, erected by his ancestor, the Right Hon. T. H. Hutchinson, when Secretary for Ireland. It is a spacious mansion in an elevated situation, commanding fine views. In the Irish peerage this place gives the title of Viscount Palmerston to the Right Hon. Henry John Temple. The nearest Post Office letter receiver is Chapelizod.

**PHIBSBOROUGH**, an extensive suburb and district, partly in the parish of St. George, but chiefly in that of Grangegorman, Coolock barony, Dublin city and county,  $1\frac{1}{4}$  miles N. W. from the General Post Office, Dublin. The area and population is not distinguished from the parishes in the Census returns. It is situated partly within, and partly without, the electoral boundary, on the road to Navan, along which it extends, and on the Royal Canal and North Circular-road. Within its limits is Grangegorman church; also a Roman Catholic chapel belonging to the union of St. Paul. The Royal Military Infirmary, the Constabulary Police Barracks, and the Zoological Gardens, all three within the Phoenix Park, the Convent of St. Mary, Cabra, the Female Orphan house and Episcopal chapel, North Circular-road, and there are National schools, male and female. It is within the G.P.O. delivery, and in its limits there is a City Post Office receiver at 16, Phibsborough-road.

## RATHCOOLE, &c.

RATHCOOLE, an inland town and parish in Newcastle barony, Dublin county, 10 miles S.W. from Dublin, comprising an area of 4,705 acres, of which 20 are in the town. Population of parish, 1,356, of town, 380, inhabiting 240 houses. The town, which was anciently called "Radcul," is situated upon the road to Naas, and, prior to the reign of Henry III., appears (from various records) to have been incorporated; in one of which, dated 1240, Lucas, Archbishop of Dublin, grants "to the burgesses of Radcul" common of turbary and pasture, &c. It consists of one street, about a quarter of a mile in length, chiefly of small houses and cabins, irregularly built. The only public building is the Parish Church, a neat plain edifice. It has a Dispensary. There is a patent for three fairs, but none are held. It is the head station of the Constabulary force of the district of Upper-cross. To the west of the town is a range of hills, that extend from those on the confines of Wicklow, called respectively, Rathcoole, Athgoe, Windmill, and Lyons; all of which are of the clay or graywacke slate formation. Rathcoole formerly gave title of Viscount to the family of Tracey, of Geashill, King's county, but is now in abeyance. About two miles and a half N.W. from Rathcoole is the parish and village of Newcastle, comprising an area of 4,283 acres, of which 20 are in the village. Population of parish, 1,108, of village, 281, inhabiting 61 houses. It is situated on the Grand Canal. The village was formerly a borough, having a portrieve and burgesses under charter of James I., and prior to the Union, sent two members to the Irish parliament. The Church is an ancient picturesque edifice, covered with ivy, and having a fine eastern window. The Roman Catholic Chapel is a neat building, with a belfry. There is a Dispensary and National Schools; and Petty Sessions are held there every alternate Friday. In the parish, and within a mile of the village, and 10 miles W. by S. from Dublin, is *Hazlehatich*, the third station of the Great Southern and Western Railway, About one mile and a half E. by S. from Rathcoole is the village of *Saggard*, in the parish of that name, Newcastle barony, comprising an area of 20 acres. Population, 260, inhabiting 44 houses. It is situated near the Tallaght hills, and on the road to Blessington. The houses are small but well built, and it contains a Roman Catholic Chapel. In the vicinity are the extensive paper mills of Messrs. J. and T. McDonnell.

RATHFARNHAM, a parish and village in Uppercross and Rathdown baronies, Dublin county, four miles south from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 2,561 acres, of which 60 are occupied by the village and ponds. Population of parish, 5,555; of village and ponds, 845, inhabiting 130 houses. It is situated on the road to Whitechurch, and near where the Military-road commences that crosses the mountains into Wicklow county. The village consists of one long irregular street: the Church on the right side, with a tower and spire. The Chapel, with a residence for the priest, is a large building. The Loretto Convent, in the vicinity, formerly the residence of the late George Grierson, esq., is a large modern brick building, attached to which there is an elegant chapel, a female free school, also a ladies' boarding and day school. There is also at *Firhouse* a Carmelite Convent, and there are Parochial and Hibernian Society Schools in the village, also a Dispensary, a Petty Sessions Court-house, and District Constabulary Police Station. A fair is held on July 10. The bridge of Rathfarnham, of one arch, over the river Dodder, is several hundred yards from the village, the approach to which is rising ground, thickly shaded in summer by the trees of the demesnes on each side. Near the bridge are the Ely flour mills of Michael Hickson. The neighbourhood abounds in pretty seats and villas, commanding rich views of the Dublin mountains and bay. The castle of Rathfarnham was built by Archbishop Loftus in the reign of Elizabeth. One of the entrances to the demesne, fronting the Dodder, is in the style of a Roman triumphal arch. The entrance to the castle is by a portico of eight Doric columns that support a dome painted in fresco with the signs of the zodiac. *Ballyboden*, a village in the parish of Whitechurch, is about one and a quarter miles farther on, and comprises an area of two acres, population 252, inhabiting 52 houses, near which the Military-road passes; and in the vicinity there are numerous handsome seats and picturesque villas, among which are Marlay and Glen Southwell, or the Little Dargle. In the grounds of the former there is a mausoleum, in which are interred the late Right Hon. John David Latouche, and his sister, the Countess of Lanesborough. Here also is Priory, the seat of G. Hatchell, esq., and where the celebrated Right Hon. John Philipot Curran lived many years.

TOWNSHIP OF RATHMINES.

RATHGAR, a townland in Rathfarnham parish, Rathdown barony, Dublin county, 3 miles south from the General Post Office, Dublin. Population 1,190, inhabiting 200 houses. It is situated midway between Rathmines and Roundtown, on the road to Rathfarnham and Tallaght, and has sprung up within the last twenty years. In 1825 there were but 2 or 3 houses and cottages on the road. It is now one of the most pleasing outlets of the metropolis, studded with handsome terraces or detached villas, and several pretty avenues diverging from the centre, and leading towards Harold's-cross, the river Dodder, Roundtown, and Upper Rathmines. On the site of Rathgar lodge, stood the ancient castle of Rathgar. Near the Dodder, until very lately, there were extensive calico printing works, of Messrs. Waldron, worked by steam and water-wheel power, and giving employment to a great number of persons. Close to the cross-roads are extensively worked quarries of calp limestone, which is chiefly raised by blasting. There is a Post Office letter receiver on Rathgar-road.

## RUSH, &c.

RUSH, a maritime town in Lusk parish, Balrothery east barony, Dublin county, 17 miles N. by E. from Dublin, comprising an area of 162 acres. Population, 1,496, inhabiting 315 houses. The harbour has been repaired during the years 1847 and 1848, at the joint expense of the proprietor and Board of Works. It is now safe and commodious for small class vessels. It is situated on the eastern coast, and was formerly noted as a fishing town celebrated for its ling, which was here taken and cured in great quantities, and gave employment to 40 superior fishing vessels. In 1846 there were 18 fishing boats and 27 yawls, employing 300 men and boys, engaged in the fishery, the banks of which are about 20 miles from the shore, and abound in ling, hake, and haddock. The harbour since repaired is well suited for the reception of vessels of moderate tonnage, say up to fifty tons. The only public buildings are, the Roman Catholic Chapel, with an embattled tower and new spire surmounted by a cross, and a Martello Tower on the beach. It has a Dispensary and National Male and Female Schools, and is a Constabulary Police and Coast Guard Station. A patent for two fairs, on May 1 and September 29, exists, but none are held. The harbour is only fit for small craft, being difficult of access, and exposed to heavy swells of the sea in north-east winds. The pier was originally built by the Duke of Ormond, in the reign of James II. A deep-water harbour could be erected at a moderate expense in the north of the bay, where two ledges of rock run out that would form a natural foundation. Early potatoes are raised in the vicinity of the town in great abundance, from the fertility of the soil and sea weed. About half a mile from the town is Kenure park, formerly Rush House, the seat of Sir Roger Palmer, once the residence of the great Duke of Ormond, and subsequently that of Sir Henry Echlin, bart., from whom it was purchased by an ancestor of the present proprietor. It is a handsome and spacious structure, and contains some fine paintings of the old masters, also a rare collection of vases and other interesting relics brought from Pompeii. In the demesne, which is richly embellished with some fine old timber, is the ruins of Kenure Church, and nearly adjoining, those of an ancient Castle. A short distance to the left of the railway station at Rush is the village of Lusk, in the same parish and barony, comprising an area of 87 acres. The population of Rush and its vicinity, when taken in 1844, was 2,922, and the number of houses 527. It is pleasantly situated on the road from Dublin, five miles north from Swords. The Church, in the later English style, erected on the site of Lusk Abbey, has a massive square tower. The Roman Catholic Chapel is a spacious modern edifice. It has a Constabulary Police Station, and one National School, and fairs are held on April 5, May 4, June 24, July 13, and November 25; they are chiefly for cattle and pigs. Near the village is the Balrothery Union Workhouse, on a site of 54 acres, erected in 1840 at an expense of £4,954, and is capable of containing 600 paupers. Connected with the Church there are some very ancient ecclesiastical remains, particularly those of an Abbey over which St. Maccalind presided till his death in 497, and where St. Adamnan held a grand synod of all the chief prelates of the kingdom in 695; within the precincts are numerous ancient and highly interesting sepulchral monuments—one, composed of various kinds of marble, in the S. aisle, and elaborately sculptured, erected at the close of the sixteenth century, represents the effigies of Sir Christopher Barnewell and his lady; another, of black marble, in the north aisle, to James Bermingham of Ballogh, esq., bears his effigy in chain armour.

in trustees to found a school, which is at present in operation, attended by upwards of 300 children, and from which six of each sex are annually apprenticed out in May, with a fee of £10 each. The parish is a prebend in the Cathedral of St. Patrick, Dublin, and is noticed by Archbishop Alan in his *Repertorium Viride*, as the "golden prebend," a term similar to that given to Sarum in England—which its endowment in tithes or land does not seem to favour at the present day. The town consists of one wide street, about a mile in length. Its public buildings are the Parish Church, a handsome modern structure of hewn stone, in the pointed style; a neat and spacious Roman Catholic Chapel, with a small tower and spire. A Loan Fund, having a capital in 1845 of £435, which circulated during the year £1,665, leaving a profit of £31. It has a Dispensary, and a National School. A patent for a market exists, but is not now held, and there are fairs on March 17, May 10, July 12, Sept. 10, and Nov. 5. Quarter and Petty Sessions are held here—the former twice in the year, in April and October, and the latter every alternate Saturday. The parish is studded with numerous seats and villa residences, among which are Brackenstown—R. Manders, esq.; Balheary House—Henry Baker, esq.; Lissen Hall—Owen Beahan, esq.; Swords House—James Taylor, esq.; and Mantua—Joseph St. Clair Mayne, esq. The only remains of the early ecclesiastical structures that adorned this place, are the belfry tower of the old church, a square building of the 14th or 15th century; one of the ancient round towers, 73 feet high, and 52 feet in circumference; and the archbishop's palace. The latter was an extensive structure in the centre of a court, encompassed by embattled walls, flanked by towers, the inner portion of which is now a garden. There was also a Nunnery here, as appears on record, by a pension being granted by Parliament in 1474, to the Lady Priores and her successors. Swords is two and a half miles W. from the Malahide station of the Drogheda Railway.

## TALLAGHT.

**TALLAGHT**, an inland town and parish in Uppercross barony, Dublin county, six miles S.W. by W. from Dublin, comprising an area of 21,868 acres, of which 27 are in the town. Population of parish, 4,921; of town, 348, inhabiting 57 houses. The town is situated on the road to Blessington, and the parish extends from Balrothery hill on the river Dodder, to the Green hills at its western extremity. The southern portion forms the range called the "Tallaght Hills," and commands magnificent views of the bay and vale of Dublin. Tradition states that at this place, (the name of which signifies "a place of burial,") the whole race of Partholon, who formed a settlement in Ireland, A.M. 1956, and were destroyed by the plague, were interred. In the eighth century an abbey was founded here, of which St. Maelrune was abbot. Prior to 1324, Alexander De Bickner, archbishop of Dublin, built a castle here, which was subsequently enlarged, and, with extensive gardens, and 200 acres of demesne land, formed the palace or country residence of all his successors down to 1803, when Dr. Fowler was the last archbishop who resided here. In 1825 it was taken down and disposed of under an Act of Parliament, and out of the materials, Tallaght House (the seat of John Lentaigne, esq.) was erected. The church, a little above the town, dedicated to St. Maelrune, is a modern building in the pointed style. At Firhouse there is a convent of Discalced Carmelites, and at Mount Anne a small monastery of the same order, in both of which free schools are held. In the town there is a Dispensary, and there are National Schools. A patent for fairs exists, but none are held. It is a Constabulary Police station, and Petty Sessions are held every alternate Wednesday. There are several paper and flour mills in the parish, as also a woollen mill. Of the remains of antiquity there are numerous vestiges. In the garden of Tallaght House is a large square tower, formerly part of the Castle. Timon, or Timothan Castle, consists of a square tower and keep. At Augharrel there are remains of a castle; and at the Green Hills is a rath and fort.

## WILLIAMSTOWN.

WILLIAMSTOWN, a maritime village in the parish of Booterstown, partly in Dublin barony, but chiefly in that of Rathdown, Dublin county, 3½ miles S.E. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 46 acres. Population, 575, inhabiting 94 houses. It is situated upon the S. shore of Dublin bay, close to the Kingstown railway, and on the road to Bray. It was formerly much resorted to as a bathing-place, and is still frequented for that purpose. There are hot and cold salt water Baths, and a Metropolitan Police station. In the neighbourhood around, approached from Booterstown or Blackrock, there are many handsome seats and villas, the principal of which are Ruby lodge, Rosefield, and Seafort lodge. Numerous cars to and from Dublin to the Blackrock and Kingstown, ply constantly through the village.
