CLONDALKIN.

CLONDALKIN, an inland parish and village, partly in Newcastle, but chiefly in Uppercross barony, Dublin county, 43 miles S. W. from Dublin, comprising an area of 4,777 acres, of which 44 are in the village. Population, 2,179; of village, 470, inhabiting 38 houses. It is situated near the ninth lock of the Grand Canal, and close to the line of the Great Southern and Western Railway, of which it is the first station from Dublin. It was anciently named Chain-Dolcan, and by the Danes Dun-awley. The village consists chiefly of one irregular street, of small but neatly built houses and cottages. The only public buildings are the Parish Church, a small plain modern building, and a neat Roman Catholic Church. It has Almshouses for destitute widows, a Dorcas Institution, Lying-in Hospital, and Dispensary, a Parochial and two National Schools, and a Constabulary Police Station. The ancient round tower is the nearest structure of the kind to the metropolis, and is in good preservation. It stands 100 feet high, and is 15 feet in diameter, covered with a conical roof of stone.

CLONTARF AND DOLLYMOUNT.

AMALGAMATED WITH THE CITY OF DUBLIN BY ACT OF PARLIAMENT, 1900-FOR STREETS see CITY OF DUBLIN.

CLONTARF, a maritime parish and formerly a township in Coolock barony, Dublin county, three miles E.N.E. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 1,289 acres, of which 38 are occupied by the "sheds" of Clontarf. It is a memorable place in Irish history, as the scene of a great battle fought by King Brian Boromh, or Boru, on Good Friday, 1014, that put an end to the Danish power in Ireland, the details of which are variously and diffusively narrated by the native historians, and form, it is said, the subject of Gray's ode of the "Fatal Sisters." The High road skirts the strand, and off it branch many important roads and avenues, which are lined with villas and houses. The green lanes of Clontarf are justly celebrated for their sylvan beauty; along them are situated many fine residences. The castle of Clontarf, one of the first within the English pale, was taken down in 1835, and the present mansion, with a Norman tower, erected thereon. A fine Town Hall, erected in 1894, and enlarged 1898. There are a handsome Church of Ireland Church and Presbyterian and Methodist Churches. The Roman Catholic Church is a large and handsome structure. There are Parochial, Presbyterian, and Roman Catholic Free Schools, and others, under the National Board. The O'Brien Institution, situated on the Malahide road, is for Roman Catholic Orphans. There are also two District Stations. It is much frequented in summer for sea bathing, and is well provided for as regards recreation, as the Royal much frequented in summer for sea bathing, and is well provided for as regards recreation, as the toyal Golf Club Links are at Dollymount and there are also good cricket and tennis clubs, and a yacht club. A commodious station on the Great Northern Railway Line has been erected near the Howth road. The Tramway in the district is electrically equipped, a very fine power station being erected in the grounds of the Tramway Depôt, everything in connection with the installation being on the newest and most approved type. There is also an Electric Tram road from Clontarf to Howth. Near Dollymount, at the further extremity of Clontarf strand, is an extensive causeway or break-water, called the "Bull wall." It extends upwards of 1½ miles in a S.S. E. direction. A tram car starts from Sackville-street every five minutes. There are 3 Post Offices in the District, 2 of them being also Postal Telegraph Offices.

LOUGHLINSTOWN—see SHANKILL.

LOUGHLINSTOWN, a small village, partly in Killiney and Rathmichael parishes, Rathdown barony, Dublin county, 81 miles S.S.E. from Dublin, containing a few straggling houses and cabins, to the left of which is Loughlinstown House, the residence of Major Domvile, J.P. On crossing Loughlinstown green, to the right, on the brow of the hill, stands the Rathdown Union Workhouse, very prettily and most saluviously situated on a site of eight acres, erected in 1841 at an expense of £6,000. The village of Loughlinstown form a part of the Township of Killiney and Ballybrack.

LUCAN.

LUCAN, an inland town and parish in Newcastle barony, Dublin county, seven miles W. from Dublin, comprising an area of 1,126 acres. Population, 872. It is partly the property of the Colthurst Vesey family, and partly the property of J. F. Shackleton, esq., who have purchased the Petty Canon lands from the representatives of the late J. Ganon, esq. The town is prettily situated in a fertile vale, on the banks of the River Liffey, which is here crossed by a fine stone bridge of one arch. The older portion of the town consists of one wide angular street of small but neat houses; there is also a number of fine residential houses in the neighbourhood. Its public buildings are, the Church of Ireland, a neat structure with a tower and spire, a large Roman Catholic Church, a Presentation Convent, a Methodist Church and Manse. and a Presbyterian Church and Manse. It has a Dispensary, a Lending Library, Church, Rectory, National Schools,

and a Parochial Hall. It is a Chief Constabulary Police Station, and Petty Sessions are held every alternate Monday. In the grounds of Weston Lodge and Leixlip Castle is the well-known and much-frequented waterfall, called the Salmon Leap, which consists of a succession of rocky ledges crossing the Liffey, over which the fish dart at one bound. It forms a beautiful caseade, the picturesque effect of which is greatly increased by the rich and lofty wooded banks of the river, and the adjoining tastefully embellished demesne of Leixlip Castle. The Lucan spa is much frequented by visitors and invalids. A beautiful and capacious new hotel and sanitorium has been completed by the " Lucan Hydropathic Spa Co., Limited," and is generally crowded with visitors. There is an electric railway from Dublin, Conyngham-road, to Lucan.

In the drawing-room, among other valuable paintings, there is a small altar-piece painted by Albert Durer, said to have been originally in the oratory of Mary Queen of Scots, at Holyrood House. It is open daily to visitors. The town contains many handsome private residences which are permanently occupied. PALMERSTOWN.

PEMBROKE URBAN DISTRICT.

The botanic garden of the University is in the vicinity. There is a District and Branch Post Office at Shelbourne-road, Ball's Bridge, where Money Order, Savings Bank, Telegraph, &c., business is transacted and from which delivery of letters for the district is effected. The Pembroke Urban District includes Baggotrath, Donnybrook, Irishtown, Merrion, Ringsend and Sandymount, and contains an area of 1,623 acres, or about 2½ square miles. Population in 1901, 25,524 (estimated to be now 28,948), and the number of municipal electors, 4,839. The valuation of the Urban District in 1910 was £131,412. The electric tram cars pass to and from Dublin every few minutes.

RANELAGH AND CULLENSWOOD-see RATHMINES AND RATHGAR URBAN DISTRICT.

RANELAGH, a suburban district in the parish of St. Peter, Uppercross barony, Dublin county, two miles S.E. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 170 acres. It is situated on the road to Dundrum and Enniskerry. Here is a Carmelite Convent, with a neat Chapel, and a Methodist Church, also the Sandford Church of Ireland founded in 1826. There is a station on the Dublin and South-Eastern Railway here. About half a mile further on is Cullenswood, a village in the same parish and barony as Ranelagh, comprising an area of 118 acres. There is a Town Sub-Post Office at 13, Ranelagh, and another at 13, Dunville-avenue. Electric Trams run to and from Sackville-street every 5 minutes.

RATHCOOLE AND SAGGARD.

RATHCOOLE, an inland town and parish in Newcastle barony, Dublin county, 10 miles S.W. from Dublin, comprising an area of 4,705 acres. Population, 271. The town, which was anciently called Radcull, is situated upon the road to Naas, and consists of one street, about a quarter of a mile in length, chiefly of small houses and cabins, irregularly built. The only public building is the Church of Ireland Church, a neat plain editice. It has a Dispensary. It is the head station of the Constabulary force of the district of Uppercross. About two miles and a half N.W. from Rathcoole is the parish and village of Newcastle, comprising an area of 4,283 acres. Population, 1,108. It is situated on the Grand Canal. The village was formerly a borough, having a portrieve and burgesses under charter of James I., and prior to the Union, sent two members to the Irish Parliament. The Church of Ireland Church is an ancient picturesqueedifice, covered with ivy, having a fine eastern window. The Reman Catholic Church is a neat building, with a belfry. RATHFARNHAM.

RATHFARNHAM, a parish and village in Uppercross and Rathdown baronies, Dublin county, four miles south from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 2,531 acres. Population, 9,208. It is situated on the road to Whitechurch, and near where the Military-road commences that crosses the mountains into Wicklow The village consists of one long irregular street; the Church of Ireland Church on the right side, with a tower and spire. The Roman Catholic Church is a large building. The Loretto Convent, in the vicinity, is a modern building, attached to which there is an elegant chapel, a female free school, also a ladies' boarding and day school. The Novitiate College of the Augustinians and St. Columba's College are in the neighbourhood. There is also a Dispensary, a Petty Sessions Court-house, and Constabulary Police Station. Three fairs are held in the year—May 15, July 10, October 7. The bridge of Rathfarnham, over the river Dodder, is several hundred yards from the village, the approach to which is rising ground, thickly shaded in summer by the trees of the demesnes on each side. The neighbourhood abounds in pretty seats and villas, commanding rich views of the Dublin mountains and bay. At Grange is situated the "Priory," the residence of the famous John Philpot Curran. The castle of Rathfarnham was built by Archbishop Loftus in the reign of Elizabeth. One of the entrances to the demesne, fronting the Dodder, is in the style of a Roman triumphal arch. The entrance to the castle is by a portice of eight Doriccolumns that sumport a dome pointed in freecowith the signs of the radius. Rallabeler, a villege in of eight Doriccolumns that support a dome painted in fresco with the signs of the zodiac. Ballyboden, a village in the parish of Whitechurch, is about one and a quarter miles farther on, and comprises an area of two acres. Population, 252. RATHGAR, a townland in Rathfarnham parish, Rathdown barony, Dublin county, 3 miles south from the General Post Office, Dublin. Population of township, 1901, 32,602. It is situated midway between Rathmines and Terenure, on the road to Rathfarnham and Tallaght, and is now one of the most pleasing outlets of the metropolis, studded with handsome terraces or detached villas, and several pretty avenues diverging from the centre, and leading towards. There are several handsome churches. There is a tramway from Dublin to Terenure, and there are two Town Suboffices at 44 and 45 Highfield-road and 155A Rathgar-road, and a Sub-District Post Office on Orwell-road.

RATHMINES AND RATHGAR URBAN DISTRICT.

RATHMINES, an extensive district, suburban to the metropolis, in the parish of St. Peter, Uppercross and Rathdown baronies, Dublin county, two miles south from the General Post Office, Dublin comprising an area of 1,714 acres. Population of township, 1901, 32,602. It is situated on the road to Rathfarnham and Tallaght, and is one continued line of buildings, upwards of a mile and half in length, intersected by numerous terraces, with detached villas, and only separated from the city, at Portobello, by the Grand Canal, numerous terraces, with detached villas, and only separated from the city, at Portobello, by the Grand Canal, here crossed by La Touche's bridge, and where the municipal and parliamentary boundaries terminate. The Church of the Church of Ireland is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, and was rebuilt at a cost of £6,000. The Roman Catholic Church is a large and handsome structure, in the later style, and the principal one of the Union of St. Mary and St. Peter. There is also a Methodist Church at Charleston-road. On the right of the road from Dublin is Portobello Military Barracks. There are free and National schools, a School of Commerce, a Police station, a Public Library (established 1887), and branches of the National, Royal, Belfast, and Ulster Banks.

In 1847, a local Act was obtained, creating that part of the parish of St. Peter which is in the barony of Uppercross into a Township; and this Act was amended by the Rathmines and Rathgar Improvement Act, 1862, by which the Townland of Rathgar and the small Townland of Sallymount were included; and was amended again by the St. Catherine's Improvement Act, 1866, by which the townlands of St. Catherine and St. Nicholas Without, in the barony of Uppercross, were included; again by Milltown Extension Act, 1880, by which Milltown was added. The total valuation of the Township is £181,478. The Council have constructed Water-works at a cost of about £200,000 at Glan-na-Smoil Valley, which supplies the Township with water under Rathmines and Rathgar Water Act, 1880. Tram cars ply on the Rathmines road, starting every few minutes from Nelson's Pillar, in Sackville-street, to Rathmines, Rathgar, and Terenure, Upper Rathmines and Dartry-road, and via Ranelagh to Palmerston-road and Palmerston-park. There is a Postal Telegraph Office at the Branch and District Post Office. TALLAGHT.

Tallaght, an inland village and parish in Uppercross barony, Dublin county, seven miles S.W. by W. from G.P.O. Dublin, comprising an area of 21,868 acres. Population of parish, 4,921; of town, 312, inhabiting 57 houses. The town is situated on the road to Blessington, and the parish extends from the village of Templeogue to Crumlin, and on its southern side to Balrothery hill on the river Dodder, to the Green hills at its western extremity. The southern portion forms the range called the Tallaght Hill, and commands magnificent views of the bay and vale of Dublin. The church, a little above the town, dedicated to St. Maelrune, is a modern building in the pointed style. At Firhouse there is a convent of Discalced Carmelites, and in the village is the Priory of the Dominican order at St. Mary's, where a beautiful Memorial Church has been erected to the memory of the Very Rev. Thomas Burke. In the town there is a Dispensary, and there are National Schools. The Bright Constabulary Police station, and Petty Sessions are held every alternate Monday. New Petty Sessions Court House erected by the County Council at a cost of over £1,000. There is a Postal Telegraph at the Post Office. Mr. Robert Boardman's paper mill at Boldbrook is in the vicinity. The cars of the Dublin and Blessington Steam Tramway Co. running between Terenure and Blessington, pass through Tallaght, which is a station on the line now running to Poulaphuca, a most interesting and charming line of country opened up by the enterprise of the Steam Tramway Company.

WILLIAMSTOWN—see BLACKROCK URBAN DISTRICT.

WILLIAMSTOWN, a maritime village in the parish of Booterstown, partly in Dublin barony but chiefly in that of Rathdown, Dublin county, 4½ miles S.E. from the General Post Office, Dublin, comprising an area of 46 acres. Population, 575, inhabiting 54 houses. It is situated upon the S, shore of Dublin bay, close to the Kingstown railway, and on the road to Bray. It is resorted to as a bathing-place. In the neighbourhood, approached from Booterstown or Blackrock, there are many handsome seats and villas. It is within the Blackrock postal delivery. Tram cars pass to and arrive from Dublin every 5 minutes.
