TEMPLEOGUE PARENTS' ASSOCIATION

MEMBERS' MEETING: A very enjoyable meeting took place in the Boys' Library, Terenure College, on Tuesday 3rd March when a former Feis prizewinner and music teacher spoke about "Piano Lessons". Following the opening talk and the usual tea interval, a long period of discussion and questions kept the speaker and a gathering of about 45 fully occupied. The Vice-President of the Association, Mrs. M. Murphy, Springfield Park, who chaired the meeting, announced the formation soon of the following study circles:

IRISH CONVERSATION: The object of the circle will be to introduce conversation into the home setting. It was proposed to have the circle meet once a week in various homes for one hour approximately, perhaps over an eight-week cycle. Another proposal to have the circle meet at a set place each week is also being considered. Connradh na Gaeilge is sending a young lady from the Irish-speaking district of Carraroe, Co. Galway to help. Friday evening, Saturday morning and Saturday afternoon may be suitable times.

ENGLISH READING: This circle will be for children in the 7 - 9 age range. Again, weekly meetings for an hour on Fridays or Saturdays on an eight-week cycle may be suitable. The Association has offers of assistance from a number of people who have professional experience in this field.

Parents interested in these projects who did not give details to the committee at the meeting of 3rd March are invited to get in touch with the Hon. Secretary, Mrs. Stella Green, 3 Wainsfort Crescent (Tel. 90 00 00).

The fee for a full course of eight-weeks is likely to be 30/- per person in each case.

Please watch out for an announcement about the Association's next meeting in April, when we hope to have a talk about drugs from the drug project from Father Michael Cleary, C.C.

THE MISSIONERS:-

Fr. Cormac is from Cork, where he has spent most of his life now in Kilkenny. An experienced Missioner.

Fr. Sean Cahill is from Fairview, where he attended the seminary. Ordained in 1965. Spent four years studying in Rome. At present in Kilkenny.

Fr. John Wall, for the Youth Retreat: from Drimnagh, ordained three years ago. Spent a year studying techniques of self-expression in London. Now in St. Paul's Church, Arran Quay.

Sometimes people will tell a priest how well he does; much more rarely they tell them what they're doing wrong. We've got a lot of feedback about how the New Mass Books are mixed up.

The biggest confusion is that now we have alternatives to choose from. Unfortunately, instead of having just one prayer-book for everyone with all that's necessary, we have four different books, so to refer to them we'll use this system for page numbers:

A = PEOPLE'S MASS BOOK; B = NEW MASS BOOK AND HYMNAL;

C = THE MASS BOOK FOR IRELAND; D = THE MASS

Page numbers for Introits etc. refer to those for next Sunday 15th March. C and D do not contain the Introits etc. that change every Sunday, so an extra leaflet (at 6d) is necessary. C contains the Irish text of the Ordinary of the Mass, so the second page number under C refers to this. Finally,

E = AN tAIFREANN - ALL IN IRISH

STAND AS the priest enters, all read the Introit together, except where a hymn is sung instead.

KNEEL. The priest then greets the people - there are three forms of the "Greeting" to choose from.

Next we examine our conscience, and tell God and our fellow Christians of our sorrow. there are three forms of this "Penitential Rite" to choose from; the first of these is the short confiteor.

SIT. We then have a short silence, followed by the Collect. The Liturgy of the word follows. You will not find the Collect or the readings in your book, since we now have a three-year cycle of readings or give us far more of the Bible at Mass, instead of the one-year cycle, as before. But after the first reading, there is part of a psalm in response to the reading; in this the people recite their responsorial psalm for year B (1970).

Then, after the second reading, the people recite the Acclamation (STAND), in anticipation of the Gospel.

SIT. A sermon follows the Gospel.

STAND. In reply, all recite the Creed; and we pray for all our needs.

SIT The bread and wine are carried to the altar, and all reply to the prayers - unless, of course, they are singing a hymn. 9 13 17, 94 10 11

KNEEL The priest says "Pray brethren.....", and all reply, "May the Lord accept....." 10 14 17, 95 11 12

The Eucharistic Prayer then begins with the Preface - Next Sunday, that for Sundays of Lent. - 40 20, - - -

There are four Eucharistic prayers to choose from, each throwing a different light on the Mass. The most usual for Sundays is No.3, so you can skip Nos. 1, 2, and 4. 22 25 40, 107 24 28

STAND We begin preparation for Communion with the Our Father; then all reply "For be Kingdom, the power and the glory....". Then while the priest is breaking the bread, all say the "Lamb of God....." 34 34 50, 118 35 42

KNEEL All kneel to pray in silence for a moment before Communion. The priest then shows the Host, and all reply "Lord I am not worthy.....". Unless a hymn is sung during Communion, all then recite the antiphon for Communion. 36 37 52, 121 37 45

When all have received Communion, the priest goes to the seat again, and all pray in silence for some moments. The priest then reads the Post-Communion prayer. 60 67 - - - -

IT. Announcements are now read out

KNEEL These are followed by the blessing. There are three forms of conclusion, but the reply to each is the same: "Thanks be to God." When a hymn is now sung, it follows immediately - please join in and sing it. 37 38 53, 121 38 46

ON YOUR WAY OUT: no traffic jams please! The hymns to be sung are announced at the beginning of Mass, so please come in time.

GUILTY OR NOT GUILTY?

Ted Kennedy thinks the two major causes of unrest in the world are oppression, whether conscious or unconscious, and the existence of weapons of mass-destruction. How about you - guilty or not guilty? Not guilty, of course! We're just individuals - we're not responsible; we just do our best. But then - it's not enough to say "Lord; Lord!" to enter the Kingdom of Heaven. Don't be afraid of those who can destroy your body - rather, fear those who can destroy body and soul. Afraid of yourself? But you can destroy body and soul yourself, as well as other people.

Suicide? There's always the mental health service, and now there's ordinary people, too, to talk too - ring the Samaritans at 67382. Destruction and despair aren't matters of oppression or atoms; the solution isn't bureaucracy or tablet-swallows; the solution is personal. You can destroy another persons world or your own - you have the power. A world closed up with satisfaction in itself is maybe worth destroying. A world of one person is worth opening to another person, and to three persons. Be your own judge - for the moment.

Just examine your conscience always on this - do you bring the Love of God to everyone you meet? That's enough. Otherwise you're destroying the bodysand souls of persons - and crucifying a person. We know the Love of God by what he sent his Son for. You can bring his Spirit to everyone. Well! Guilty or not guilty?
