GREENLEA, LAVARNA AND PARKMORE - Welcome to Templeogue.

I have just received this morning a letter from His Grace, The Archbishop, announcing the transfer of parts of Greenlea, Parkmore and Lavarna to Templeogue Parish. The new boundary will go between 87 and 89 Greenlea Road and between 70 and 72 Greenlea Road. It will take in Greenlea Avenue and cross Parkmore Drive between 51 and 53 and between 50 and 52. It will take in all Lavarna Road and Lavarna Grove, leaving Glenavy Park in Terenure parish.

The reason for this change is obvious, the houses concerned being so close to St. Pius X and so far from St. Joseph's, Terenure. Indeed, the great majority of the people, I think, have already been coming to St. Pius X for many years. The position was anomalous and obviously had to be rectified sometime.

I do hope the change will be acceptable to all the people involved but I can assure them they will be received with open arms into Templeogue Parish. With the Church in a more central position it will be more possible to generate a community atmosphere.

The real problem for the priests is lack of staff. We all have more than our share of houses at the present time. We cannot hope for extra staff because the parish could not support an extra priest or, indeed, can the diocese afford to give us one.

However, our new parishioners can be assured that we will find some means of visiting them in the near future and the rest of the parish will, I am sure, be patient with us in the further slowing-up of the house to house visitation.

We will be doing our utmost in the years to come to weld the parish into an integrated and unified community



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TEMPLEOGUE PARENTS · ASSOCIATION

The final meeting of the 1972-3 Committee took place on Tuesday 8th May. The forthcoming A.G.M. was on the agenda and in the course of a review of activities over the last year the question was discussed whether it was now worth while to continue with the Association. Some members felt that certain activities carried on by the Association could be equally well taken over by other existing organisations. The following in particular were discussed:

- 1. Pantomime Block Bookings: There had been a definite falling off in bookings. It was unlikely that this feature would be continued, as children were found to prefer a trip to the cinema.
- 2. Monthly Discussion Meetings: Other Associations were providing the kind of discussion meetings which the Templeogue Parents' Association had initiated, and it was felt that this activity could be discontinued for the present.
- 3. Twice-yearly concerts: Many of the young children who had been taking part in these concerts were now growing up. If there were a demand for their continuance, they could be run on an ad hoc basis by a few individuals.
- 4. Irish Summer School: While there had been some enquiries, it was not yet clear whether there would be a demand on a sufficiently large scale for the Summer School to warrant its being continued. If a sufficient number were interested, the teachers concerned might organise it.
- 5. Special Football Competition: There were now two football leagues Gaelic Cames and the Heather Cup (Soccer). If the special competition were considered to be desirable, a small committee of parents might
- 6. "Templeogue Telegraph": This presented the really big problem, as it was considered most desirable that the continued publication of the Telegraph should be secured. In the montext of the proposed community council, an arrangement for an editorial board might be a solution.

The view of parents generally will be sought at the AGM on 29th May at 8.30 p.m. in Terenure College. The question of the Association's involvement in the National Council of Parents' Associations would have to be considered also.

May we take this opportunity to thank most sincerely Father Diffney for the kind words he expressed to our Club on his own behalf and on behalf of our guests.

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FIANNA FAIL: BOB BRISCOE CUMANN REPORT

The Bob Briscoe Cumann of Fianna Fail, which covers Templeville and Cypress held its A.G.M. on Tuesday, May 1st in the White Fathers, Cypress Grove. Deputy Ruai: i Brugha attended and presided over the election of the incoming officer board. Having thanked the outgoing board for their work during the previous year and congratulated the new officers on their election he spoke to the meeting about the forthcoming Presidential election. Mr. Childers' undo that ability, sincerity and concern for all the people of Ireland made him the most suitable candidate for the position of President. Mr. O'Higgins' failure to respond to the challenge of a television debate indicated his lack of confidence in his ability to face Mr. Childers in a situation which would give the voters an excellent opportunity to compare the candidates for themselves. Members of the cumann paid tribute to Mr. Childers' interest in young people as well as the mentally handicapped, and are fully committed to hard work during the campaign for such an outstanding candidate.

Turning from the discussion on the Presidential campaign, Deputy Brugha focussed the cumann's attention on recent developments regarding the unauthorised houses at Cypress Park. As readers are probably aware Deputy Brugha, on the request of the residents has been investigating the matter. On April 3rd he wrote to the Manager of the Planning Department, Dublin County Council pointing out the development's encroachment "on the rights of residents" and that it seemed to be "out of keeping with proper planning discipline". He also drew attention to the site changes from the original plans. The felling of trees on the development was also brought to the notice of the County Council. Three days later he received a reply stating that the company had been written to and that their attention had been drawn to the fact that the development was unauthorised and that prosecution had been authorised against the company "in respect of the failure to comply with a condition of the planning permission in relation t the erection of the two houses at Cypress Park". Deputy Brugha informed the cumann that he was keeping in close contact with the people involved and would do his utmost to obtain justing. The cumenn thanked him for his work in the matter and

The "Morning Star" Hostel opened its doors on 25th March 1927. It provides accommodation comprising supper, bed and breakfast at a nominal charge for the derelict man.

The cardinal aims of the hostel are:

- (a) Careful selection of men on the lowest weekly allowance
- (b) Persistence of residence
- (c) The avoidance of the gratuitous idea (d) A religious and home atmosphere and every facility for cleanliness and re
 - creation
- (e) The bringing to bear of sympathy, unlimited patience, and every positive influence for good which case may call for. The hostel has provision for billiards table tennis handball a fairly well-stocked library. There is a monthly Patrician meeting.

The hostel has a very beautiful Oratory where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved and Mass is said on Sundays and Wednesdays.

It has also a rehabilitation workshop which is not yet fully developed.

The hostel is run by the Legion of Mary (all men members). Visitors are welcome and will be shown around the hostel. At present there are 100 residents but there is room for at least 150 and at times the numbers have exceeded the 200 mark. The help it needs are men who will give two hours of active work each week at a convenient time and attend a weekly meeting that may not last more than 1½ hours.

In the Morning Star Hostel you meet, mix with and help destitute men who have great human as well as material problems.

You learn from them to deepen your understanding, your sympathies, your compassion. Your social conscience gets to grips with Real

A MODERN SAINT (St. Maria Goretti)

On 27th April, 1947 Pope Pius XII awarded the title of "Blessed" to Maria Goretti, a child martyr at 12 years. Her mother a poor widow aged 82, was privileged to be present that day. The official decree stated that the little Saint "rejoices in Heaven with her father just as we on earth rejoice with her mother".

Maria, the eldest of five, was born to Luigi and Assunta Goretti, poor peasants, on 16th October 1890. She was taught her prayers at home from an early age and grew up loving and talking to God.

Her father died and her mother laboured in the fields while the 12 year old Maria kept house.

Alessandro Serenelli - a loutish fellow began to pay attention to Maria. Horrified she ran away twice - she prayed very hard, her rosary always in her hands.

On the Feast of the Precious Blood, 6th July, 1902, Alessandro Serenelli cruelly stabbed her with a stiletto because she would not surrender to him. She died next day forgiving him.





MEMORIES OF CONFIRMATION DAYby A Parent.

The date was lith February, 1941, the venue Dublin's Pro-Cathederal. The church was filled to capacity with hundreds and hundreds of Dublin children about to receive their Confirmation from His Grace, the Archbishop. I remember it well, as I shivered with cold in the back seat of this big church and was oblivious of what went on at the high altar which then seemed miles away from me.

I had been deposited at the nearby schools at 10 a.m. and my parents had been instructed not to collect me before 2 p.m. I was then marched hand in hand with my companions through the snow-covered streets to receive my Confirmation behind the closed doors of the church. I doubt if many of those present would remember any other significant details of this occasion.

But how different it will be for the boys and girls who received the Sacrament of Confirmation on May Day, 1973 in St. Pius X Church, Terenure. This was a ceremony to remember. On Monday evening, 31st April at 7.30 p.m. the Confirmation ceremonies commenced with Holy Mass celebrated by Rev. Fr. Diffney at which the families of those to be confirmed attended. This was a symbolic ceremony at which the children presented their gifts of food and clothing for the poor, to the celebrant. They were reminded by him of the strengthening of their Christian Faith by the reception of this great Sacrament on the following morning. On Tuesday, 1st May, 1973 at 11 a.m. his Lordship

Most Rev. Dr. Carroll entered the church to the strains of the hymneto the Holy Spirit. The Confirmation ceremony had begun and we, the parents of the recipients, took our places in the church with the children.

In his homily His Lordship told the children that by the imposition of his hands on their heads the Holy Spirit would decend on their sould to make them "Grown-up Christians" and with the ancinting of oils in the sign of the cross on their foreheads they were reminded of Christ's victory over sin on the cross. Speaking to the parents. His Lordship told them of the need of some form of daily family prayer - directed to the needs of the family, which would eave a lasting impression on the children. After the confirming of the boys and girls of St. Pius X National School and the girls from Our Lady's School, Templeogue Road, there was a renewal of baptismal vows. 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CHARLES KICKHAM - Patriot, Poet and Novelist.....by Emily Grimley
PART I

Charles Joseph Kickham was not born in Mullinahone, Co. Tipperary, as is generally supposed. His parents resided there, it is true, but in the early summer of 1828, his mother, a sister of John O'Mahoney the redoubtable Fenian leader, was on a visit to some relatives in a little hamlet called Knickeengow and it was here that the future patriot first saw the light. Old John Kickham was in comparatively comfortable circumstances. He had a drapery business in Mullinahone where he was held in high esteen for his keen commonsense and kindly disposition. A man of strong political views, he had been a devoted follower of Daniel O'Connell in the early days of the great Repeal movement. When, however, the Liberator gave expression to the doctrine "that a nation's liberty was not worth the shedding of human blood" the Mullinahone draper transferred his allegiance from the O'Connellite to the Young Ireland camp and remained an unrepentant rebel to the end.

An incident in the school career of young Charles Kickham shows that the bent of the boy's talents was revealed at a very early age. The master called Kickham's class around him to examine the sums he had given them an hour before. On Kickham's slate there was not a figure to be seen, but there was instead a sweet little poem called "My Old Dhudeen", that he had spent his arithmetic hour in composing. The fond hope of his parents that Charles might be educated for the medical profession was rudely blighted by a shocking accident which maimed and disfigured him for life. He had been out in the hills with his dog and gun and arrived home drenched to the skin. Drying the contents of his powder flask in front of the kitchen fire later on, a spark from the sods of turf leaped out and there was an explosion which resulted in the unfortunate youth's sight and hearing being permanently impaired. It was an accident, said his friend John O'Leary, which would have crushed all spirit out of most men, but Kickham worked till his last day with an unselfish devotion that no man has ever surpassed. The poet's soul within him compensated him for the terrible loss he had sustained. Charles Kickham took his first plunge into the stormy sea of Irish politics the fateful year of '48. He organised a confederate club in Mullinahone, the members of which had their share in such fighting as took place in gallant Tipperary in those stirring times.
