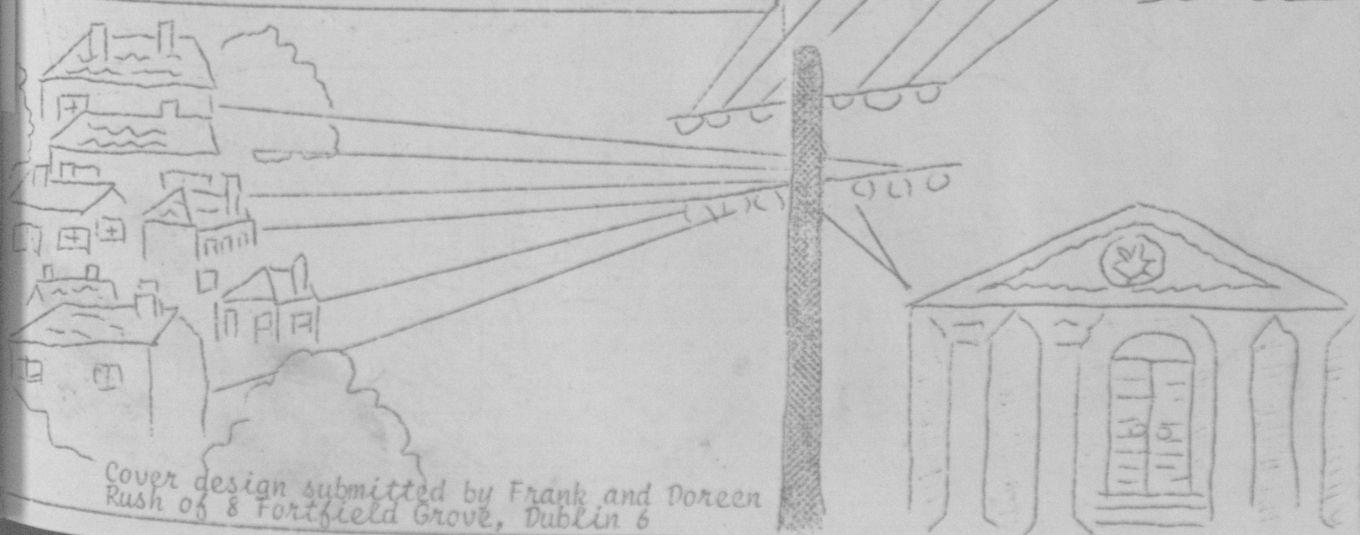

BLITZKRIEG

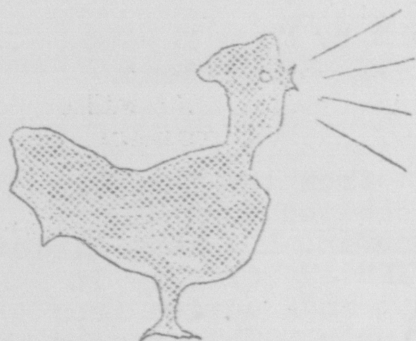

Charles Heather of Cypress Park.

In this month of "Heather Cup" Fever, it seems appropriate that we should pay a visit to the man who gave his name to it all - Charlie Heather of Cypress Park. Charlie's generous offer of a trophy to be competed for by the young footballers of the district came over three years ago, when the possibilities of a football league were being discussed. "If you get the games going", he said, "I'll put up the Cup". Since then, the Heather Cup has become a household word in Templeogue.

The Heathers are Dubliners of long, long, standing, and have been associated mainly with the footwear trade. Readers who have occasion to travel by Lower Bridge Street will know Crowe Wilson premises near the quays, where many generations ago the Heather family had a footwear factory. Later the family went into the retail trade, and Charlie's grandfather had a footwear shop on Arran Quay. Charlie's own father, however, broke with tradition, for he was a CIE man at the Inchicore Works. Charlie got no nearer to CIE than an interview; the lure of the trader's life pulled him like a magnet and he went to work for Norton's of Talbot Street, who specialised in overalls. Later he moved to the Four Courts Clothing Factory, who concentrated on readymades, and, after a time at their headquarters, travelled for them in the West of Ireland. From there Charlie went on to work a number of agencies in clothing lines. With a growing family, however, he began to find that the nomadic life of the traveller did not suit him. He came to Templeogue in 1967 and has called it home!

Charlie has no hidden yearnings about the life of soldier, sailor or candlestick-maker. He always wanted to buy and sell! We talked about boots and shoes, and let me tell you that talking footwear with Charlie Heather is like talking religion with the Pope: you are in the presence of an authority! He explained to me all about platforms and clogs: he told me what was the "in" thing just now (if you must know, it's suede!) and we discussed the advent and impact of polyurethane. Buying, obviously, is the skill for a trader. "You must buy well," said Charlie. "Otherwise, you can be left with a load on your hands. And he summed it all up with the paradox: "The day you buy is the day you sell".

"How about hobbies?", I asked. Charlie laughed. "We have a caravan in Wicklow," he said. "I think we had our last full holiday there in 1953". He confessed to a little golf, but I think myself that his real hobby is opening shops. The record reads - Templeogue 1967, Crumlin 1969 and Dolphin's Barn 1971.

The Heathers have 3 girls and 6 boys. Mrs. Heather was formerly Miss Teresa Murphy of Sandymount.

LEGION OF MARY NEWS.

Of late a new aspect of the Legion is coming more and more to the front, that is the "Peregrinatio pro Christo" roughly translated "Adventure for Christ".

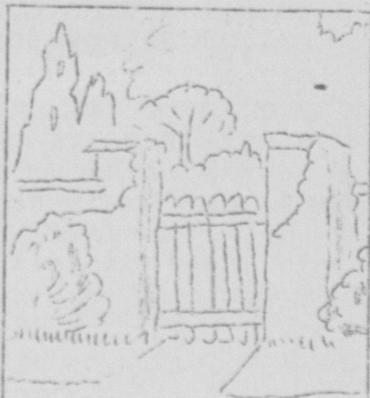
The ambition to get in touch with every soul a process which must begin with those near at hand. It must not stop there but should proceed to symbolic steps far beyond the sphere of normal life. That purpose is facilitated by the Legionary movement known as the Peregrinatio pro Christo. This name is adopted from the Missionary epic of the monks of the West immortalised in Montalembert's classic. That invincible multitude went forth from their own country and from their kindred and out of their father's house" and traversed Europe in the sixth and seventh centuries, rebuilding the Faith which the fall of the Roman Empire had brought down with it.

In the same spirit of idealism the Peregrinatio sends teams of Legionaries, who have the time and means to spend limited periods (usually a week or two) in distant places where the religious conditions are bad, on "the delicate, difficult, unpopular mission of revealing that Christ is the Saviour of the world. It must be undertaken by the people". (Pope Paul VI).

The cover picture of the current Legion Journal shows a baptism, but not just a baptism! To gain a soul, exclaimed St. Francis Xavier, would be rich recompense for a journeying over the world and suffering every hardship. The picture draws that thought into our minds because the baptism was won at the expense of thousands of miles of travelling and great deprivations. It was a Peregrinatio into one of those difficult countries where religion has had to lie low. The team encountered a Moslem who told them that he desired to be a Catholic. What could they do about it? They were on the move all the time and their stay in the particular place was for two days only. But the Moslem seemed very much in earnest. He said he had spoken to Catholics but could get no one to attend to him. There was an anguished consultation. Finally the wonderful priest who was in charge of the group decided that the step must be taken in faith. So compressed instruction was given and the catechumen of one day was received into the Catholic Church. The photograph shows that overwhelming roadside scene. The water was taken from a nearby stream. The sponsor was Brendan Shortall, a young teacher from Drumcondra. Then the party moved on wondering what would happen. A year later the same priest with a somewhat different team passed through the same town on their way to another country. They looked up their conveyer and found him a very fervent Catholic who informed them that he had interested another Moslem and had him nearly ready for reception.

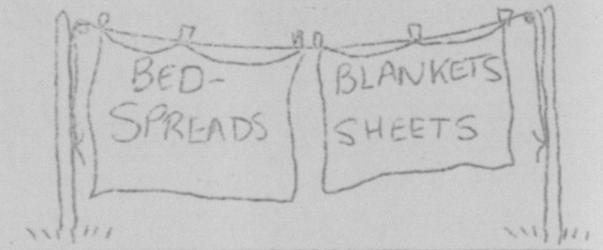
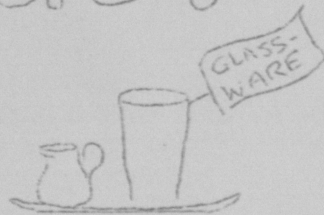
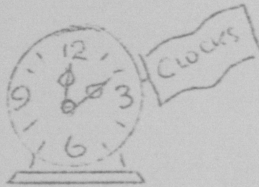

G.A.A. NEWS.

Much has happened on the G.A.A. front since the last issue of the Templeogue Telegraph. A meeting was held in Terenure College on Tuesday, 17th April. It was well attended and was conducted under the chairmanship of Mr. Michael Moore. It was decided to run a street league competition for boys of 12 years of age and under. a panel of names was set up with the assistance of Mr. Doherty and Mr. O'Brien of St. Pius X National School. Additional names were provided by people who attended the meeting. Further meetings have been held on each Tuesday in the Committee Room at which final arrangements were made for the competition.

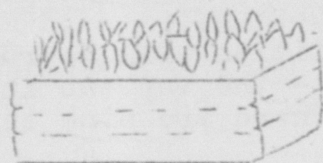

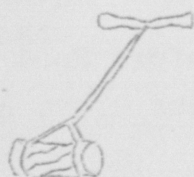

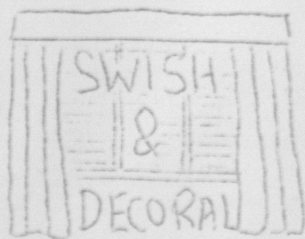

TEMPLEOGUE HOUSE

Templeogue House is situated on the right hand side of the Tallaght Road, after you pass Templeogue Bridge and just before the old mill. It was purchased by the present owners, the Columban Fathers, in 1958.

Templeogue House was the residence of the Domville family. Charles Lever, the novelist, lived there between 1842 and 1845. This house is of special interest because it was built on the exact site of a mediaeval castle which once stood there. It was Sir Thomas Domville who pulled down most of the castle structure to build the first 'Templeogue House'. This he did around the year 1704. The castle was so strongly built that, rather than remove it, it was partly incorporated in the house. The present house is a later structure built in the early part of the nineteenth century and it also incorporated part of the castle.

Weston St. John Joyce, in his book 'The Neighbourhood of Dublin', relates an interesting story in connection with this house. Lord Santry, a nephew of Sir Compton Domville, was sentenced to be hanged for the murder of one of his servants. When all appeals for a reprieve had failed Sir Compton threatened to divert the City water supply, the course of which passed through his grounds. How he intended to do this is not clear as he would very likely have flooded his own grounds and house in the attempt. However, his threat seems to have worked, for the authorities let Lord Santry escape.

The grounds of the House once contained two artificial lakes and a decorative watercourse with Dutch waterfalls. A novel aquaduct stood just inside the entrance gate and was fed by water taken off the mill stream and passed under the mill yard. The aquaduct passed along the top of a stone wall and cascaded down over a stone gothic-type arch. The remains of this unique structure are still standing. A mound in the grounds of the house, being so near the castle, was thought to be of archaeological interest, but the authorities now say that this is not so.

The turret at the east of the house is part of the former castle. The castle walls still existing in the structure of the house are easily recognisable because of their great thickness (4'6"). The vaulted ceilings of the castle cellars are plastered in the very old wattle-reinforced method. The lands surrounding this house have been purchased for building and there is a great danger that this historic building will be demolished. Perhaps it could be preserved as a community centre and civic museum. Another time I will tell you a little of the history of the castle itself.
