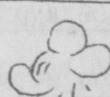
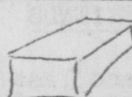

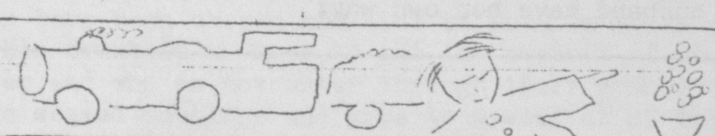

CREDIT UNION QUESTION AND ANSWER (Continued from last month...by Donal Kelly)

How much can be loaned to a member and for how long?

Legally, a Credit Union cannot loan more than 10% of its total assets to one member (in our case, this would be £4,000) and a loan cannot be for a period longer than 5 years.

However, at our present stage of development we could not afford to loan that amount of money to one person. Our largest loan so far has been £1,000, though not many exceed £500. At the other end of the scale, we have given some of £10 and £20.

The length of time for which the money is loaned is related to the ability of the borrower to repay. The period rarely exceeds 3 years, though most loans are repaid within one or two years.

Are there any other restrictions?

Because of the demand for loans, we have had to ration out the money by applying a 3 to 1 rule. To qualify for a £300 loan, a member would need to have savings (shares) of approximately £100.

What is the rate of interest on a loan?

12% per annum. No matter how much the Minimum Lending Rate or Bank Overdraft Rate may go up or down, the rate is fixed at 12%.

The interest is paid each time a payment is made, so the amount gets less according as the loan is repaid.

How about an example?

If a member borrowed £100 repayable at £2 per week plus interest, the repayments would be as follows:

It follows that the interest on a loan of £200 repaid at £4 per week would be £11.88 (double the above).

Note that although only 8 weeks are shown above for the sake of space, the totals represent the total of the actual amounts for the full 50 weeks.

Present position and completion of Templeville Road.

Report: The present position regarding work on Templeville Road is that the kerbing, public lighting and installation of pedestrian crossing have been completed and are operational.

Alteration to E.S.B. services is almost completed. Alterations to P. & T. services have been delayed due to the P. & T. technicians dispute. However the completion work will be programmed in such a way that this delay will not interfere with the completion of the widening and surfacing of Templeville Road which is expected to be completed by mid April.

The Council at its special meeting on 6th March decided to allocate the sum of £50,000 from the Block Grant to this scheme.

BOOK REVIEW - TWICE THROUGH THE LINES by Otto John, published by Macmillan

So many references to Dr. Otto John have been made on television and in magazine articles, not to mention accusations in books, that Twice Through the Lines, Otto John's autobiography, was inevitable.

"Once a traitor always a traitor" had been General Richard Gehlen's comment after Otto John had been kidnapped by the Russians in July, 1954, almost ten years to the day after John had been a principal in the unsuccessful attempt on Hitler's life, subsequent to which he escaped from Germany to London.

His escape by way of Madrid and Lisbon had been possible because John was head of the Lufthansa, the German Air Service. In England he worked against the Nazis, interrogating high-ranking Germans in prisoner of war camps. He broadcast from England to Nazi Germany an activity which was to make enemies for him, even of one like Richard Gehlen, who himself had been cashiered by Hitler and surrendered to the Americans with the almost complete files of the German Intelligence Service intact.

That John defected to the Russians in 1954 and was not abducted was the charge upon which he was arraigned after his remarkable escape from East Germany. He was found guilty and sentenced to four years imprisonment, which he served and is now in exile with his wife in Austria. In this book he tells his complete story; answering what Professor Trevor Roper calls the slanders perpetrated on him.

In December, 1950, Dr. John had been appointed head of the Federal Internal Security Office in West Germany and he now records the many political and personal jealousies during the time of his appointment and his kidnapping, through the treachery of a Russian agent, Dr. Wolfgang Wohlgemuth.

It was early on the morning of July, 21st, 1954, all Western secret services were alerted. On the night after the ceremonies commemorating the tenth anniversary of the abortive rising against Hitler, John had not returned to his hotel. He was in fact lying drugged in a house in East Berlin belonging to the Soviet Secret Service. Only by laborious investigations over the course of several years was John able to reconstruct events prior to the time he was drugged. The key figure was his alleged friend Dr. Wohlgemuth, who had been Hitler's personal assistant physician.

John adopted the course of co-operation with his captors rather than insanity or suicide. He broadcast to the West on the necessity for the demilitarisation and reunification of the fatherland. Everywhere he went he was followed closely by secret police. Always he was thinking of escape but it was not until the spring of 1955 that hope came of possible success.

For six months almost, he had been helped by Henrik Bonde-Henriksen, editor of a Copenhagen journal. Many chances might have offered were it not for misunderstandings and timorousness of some who could have helped. He had made the acquaintance of the Danish journalist only the night before he was kidnapped when they had dined with Prince Louis Ferdinand.

John continued to play his cards well with the Russians. He lectured freely and spoke to university students on the theme of demilitarisation and reunification of the fatherland. He had assurances that the Russians respected him as their protege. Still he varied his meeting places with Bonde-Henriksen sometimes at a public function, sometimes the Press Club or at public lectures.

Bonde-Henriksen had promised him: "I'll get you out." So eventually, they agreed on 4.30 in the afternoon of December 12th. They chose it because

John's guards that day would be two very young fellows who would probably be easier to shake off.

John went to his office as usual; went to lunch as usual in the Press Club. He drove back to his office. Soon after four, he told his guards that he had an appointment at the University. They drove him to the University, to the back entrance, where he told them that he would not be very long. He handed them his brief case and told them there was 8,000 marks in it which he had drawn from the bank to buy a yacht. They swallowed the bluff and allowed him to go in alone. He went straight through the building and came out on the front. For minutes he thought that all was up. Bonde-Henriksen was not parked at the place arranged. He almost gave up as lost until he spotted the car parked between the University and the Opera. Briefly the misunderstanding was explained as he sat in the car putting on spectacles, a thick muffler and a pipe in his mouth.

The car carried a large "PRESS" plate and flew a Danish flag, to distinguish it as a foreign car. Bonde-Henriksen said: "If the Vopos (East German Police) at the Brandenburg Gate fire I'll just step on it," John relates, "there are police and frontier guards on the other side to shoot us out of it if necessary."

It was not necessary. They approached the check-point at two miles per hour and stopped. John puffed great smoke from his pipe as Bonde-Henriksen said to the Vopo: "The boot is behind officer if you want to look." The Vopo waved them on through the gate and on to the airport where John's colleague Wichmann was waiting, having reserved seats for them under assumed names on a plane for Cologne-Wahn. As they left the airport at Cologne, John was received by Dr. Bruckner Chief of Security in Bonn, with some officials, which he took to be a precaution for his safety. Next day he was told he had been arrested. So, having served two-thirds of his four years sentence, from Austria he has written this book in the hope that his innocence will be proved.
