

PIONEER TOTAL ABSTINENCE ASSOCIATION

In the week from Sunday 28th November to Sunday 5th December, 1976 all members of the community will be reminded through the media that this will be Temperance Week. Temperance — or the "Golden Mean" — is a very attractive rule of life, more so obviously than abstinence because it is a more attainable one. Immediately prior to that, on Sunday 21st November Dublin Pioneers will be particularly well placed to attend the Annual Pioneer Meeting in St. Franci Kavier Hall, Upper Sherrard St. A number of tickets will be available for a short period at 35p each (to be taken up not later than Tuesday 16th November Tel. 900789 or 909128).

It is always interesting to see how other nations tackle their social problems especially those of roughly the same size as ourselves. It is said that out of a population of 4 millions, Norway has 90,000 alcoholics. These are registered patients but very likely the actual figure is much higher, including secret drinkers and those who would not admit even to themselves that they are alcoholics. What are the Norwegians doing? Business firms have adopted the very sensible approach — even though it might disappoint foreign visitors — of providing sandwiches and coffee or tea for lunch, rather than the business lunch as we know it which very often starts with a drink at the bar, and several drinks during meals. You can't buy alcohol anywhere you like in Norway — you can buy what you need in state—owned wine—shops, which are not to be found in every town. The price of alcohol is high and this further restricts purchase. The advertising of drink on television is banned — indeed they are considering banning programmes on television tending to glamourise drinking.

It would seem then that the Norwegians are more than a step ahead of us in tackling the problem of the excessive use of alcohol. It is often argued that what is good for one society does not necessarily work in another, and that alcoholism is a problem of great complexity with roots in history, standard of living, economic and particularly taxation structures, etc., etc. and so on. Which seems a wordy though not a worthy argument for experimenting with some of the Norwegian measures.

St. Pius X Pioneer Centre is happy to be able to record that already a number of young people have availed of the new rule amendment to apply at 12 for Probation membership rather than wait until they are 14 as was necessary up to lately.







RECIPE CORNER

Christmas is fast approaching and with it the frenzy of Christmas baking and entertaining. If you haven't already made your pudding perhaps you would like to try this easy recipe. The success of any pudding always depends on how well cooked it is, so don't skimp on your cooking time and don't let the pot boil dry.

4 ozs. flour
2 ozs. breadcrumbs
4 oz. shredded suet
4 oz. brown sugar 1 teasp mixed spice 4 oz. grated apple l level teasp. cinnamon l small carrot grated

l level teasp. cinnamon
l " " nutmeg
l eggs
4 oz. mixed peel
4 oz. currants
8 oz. raisins
2 oz. chopped prunes
or dried apricots
grated rind and juice ½ lemon
l small carrot grated
4 oz. mixed peel
4 oz. currants
8 oz. raisins
4 oz. chopped almonds
grated rind ½ orange
l tblsp. golden syrup or treacle

Mix all ingredients together and leave overnight, then stir again. Put into greased basin or basins, cover with foil, greaseproof paper or cloth. It is a good idea to grease both the inside and outside of the paper to keep pudding dry on top. Steam or boil for 6 - 8 hours, allowing longer time if all mixture is in one basin. Remove wet covers as soon as pudding is cooked, then put on dry covers. Re-steam for 2 - 3 hours before eating.

To Serve: Brandy Butter made by creaming 4 oz. butter, 6 oz. icing sugar and 2 tablesps. brandy. The same and all the

For 12 - 18 glasses

large pints water
6 oz. sugar
rind 2 lemons

Bottle claret
2 pint cheap port juice 2 lemons

rind 2 lemons stick cinnamon

Method:

Put water and sugar in to a pan and boil for 5 minutes. Add lemon rind and juice, claret, port and cinnamon. Heat for a few minutes, then strain into a hot punch bowl.

OUR LABYS HOSSES FOR BUYS ECCESS

TEMPLEOGUE YOUTH GROUP

The group is now in its fourth year, having recently celebrated its 3rd birthday. Congratulations! Chief activities at the moment are Folk Mass and Encounter meetings.

The Folk Group sing each Sunday at the 5.30 p.m. Mass in St. Pius X Church. This section is preparing for Christmas visits to hospitals, etc., which proved so fruitful last year. It will also of course be taking part in the Christmas Carol Service at the Parish Church.

The Encounter Section works closely with Fr. Liam Carey. An Encounter Weekend, primarily for the 5th year age group of the parish, was held at the beginning of October at Our Lady's School. Similar weekends have been run by the group in other parishes, for example, Greenhills and Glasthule. Apart from their intrinsic worth, there have been beneficial spin-off results in the communities concerned after these weekends.

THE NUNS' STORY

The Carmelite Nuns who opened their present monastery at Firhouse Road, Talla in 1827, are still occupying the house which was built four hundred years ago They are an enclosed order founded by St. Teresa of Avila, and are strict vegetarians. The house is surrounded by a small section of land on which the grow their own vegetables. They also have a couple of cows and some hens from which they receive some of their daily needs. In their spare time they do so Adve needlework, which entails making mortuary habits, soft toys and scapulars.

They lead a very contemplative life, rising at twenty to six a.m. all the year round, and spending a great deal of time in prayer and self denial. They do not have the luxuries of modern day living and their contact with the outer world, excepting visitors, is limited to the reading of one daily newspaper. They welcome visitors but are only allowed to speak to them through an open grid. Many people from the the poorer sections of society visit them, and with them the nuns share their gifts.

This order maintains a rigid fast from the 14th of September until Easter each year. They have an hour of community prayer every morning and evening, and between these times they read the Divine Office seven times daily. They live on alms and revenue received through the kind donations of their many friends. Many people who are troubled or distressed find consolation by visiting these nuns and many requests have been granted through their intercession.

A Cheese and Wine Party and Fashion Show is being held on Tuesday 30th November at 8 p.m. in Templeogue College, in aid of the Monastery.


