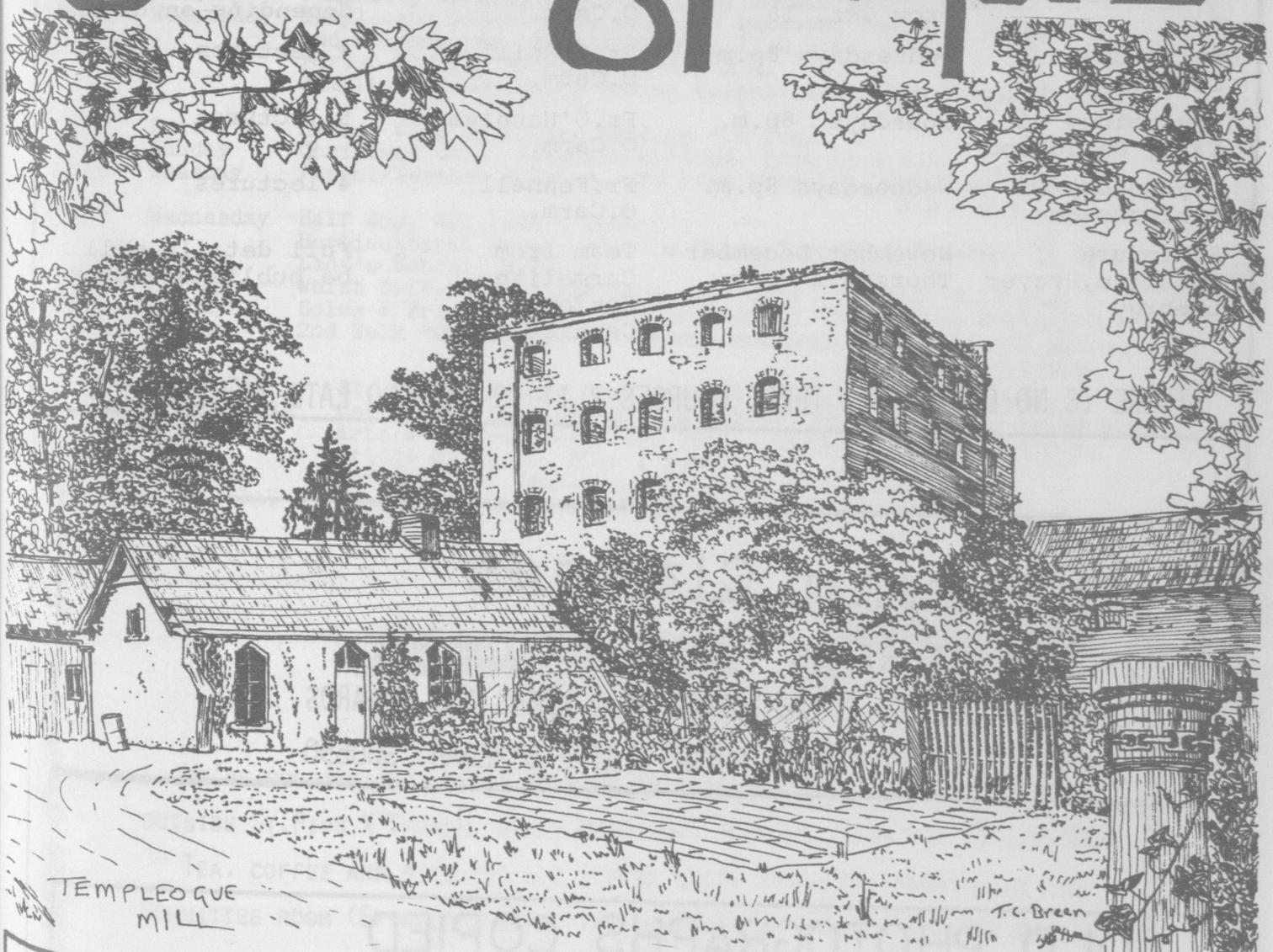
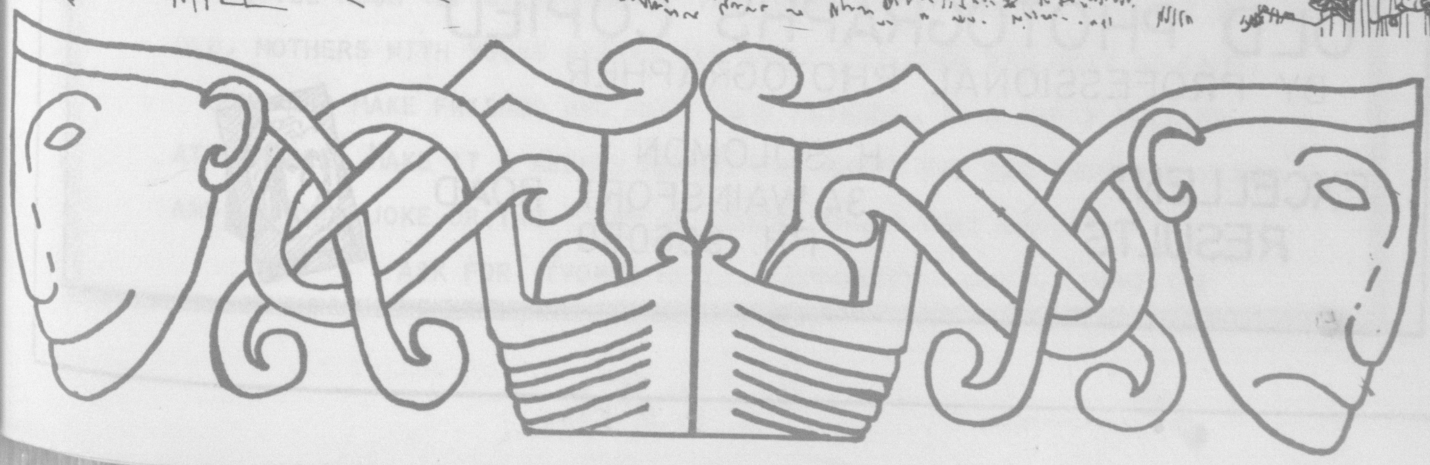


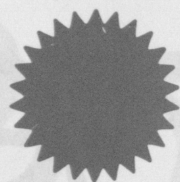

The following is a letter from our Chairman, Mr. Johnny Whittle, which I am sure you will find interesting:

The Committee of the Templeville & Fortfield Residents Association, on a proposal submitted by me, as Chairman, discussed the possibility of setting in motion a practical and confidential advisory service. It has come to our notice that many problems are developing in the area, especially in the maintenance of homes and environmental infringements in these

changing times. We, the Committee, decided that the time had arrived to create an atmosphere of communication between the members of the residents Association and the members of the Committee, for the purpose of helping out, where possible.

As the official representative body of the residents of this, the Templeville & Fortfield area and with many years of experience, as is well known to everybody we have many options open to us in the various departments; where we get the utmost co-operation and consideration. Bearing this in mind we feel, we have a lot to offer in the advisory line and would like to create a liaison between ourselves and the people of this area.

Many problems arise as an area grows up, or grows older. Some residents are now approaching retirement, and others in advanced years may have problems and may not know whom to turn to for help. We would like to advise the residents that any problems they have will be discussed, by the Committee, in private at our monthly meetings and help will be given in the various ways open to an Association. We have found many solutions to problems in our area in the past, and in some cases, e.g., the removal of the 54a bus from Templeville Drive at certain hours, landscaping of green at the corner of Fortfield Park and Templeville Road, etc., the results are there to be seen.

Whether your own problem has to do with such ordinary things as house maintenance, which, comes under many headings, or public matters which are causing you distress, we, on the Committee, having experienced the satisfaction of having someone somewhere, to approach for advice and direction in the past, feel that it must follow, that you, the residents now turn to us, if you need advice.

FEILE BHRIDE, FEBRUARY 1980

Cookery Corner

For a party dessert that is different - why not try **AMERICAN CHEESECAKE?**

As this is not a cake that can be turned out of the tin, you will need an 8" Spring Clip sided tin. This would be quite a good investment for many other things. (I bought mine in Switzers, and I also remember seeing them in the Hardware Store in Terenure). Failing this, a cake tin with a loose base will do if care is taken.

INGREDIENTS:

1 oz. Butter; 6 Digestive Biscuits;
14 Ozs. Philadelphia Cream Cheese;
4 ozs. Sugar; 3 Eggs; $\frac{1}{2}$ teasp. Vanilla Essence; 6 fluid ozs. Soured Cream.
(fresh cream soured with lemon juice will not do. You must use the real cultured soured cream, which you can sometimes get in H. Williams in the Shopping Centre, and always in the Swiss Delicatessen).

METHOD:

Melt the butter in a small saucepan and draw off the heat. Crush the biscuits to crumbs and, using a fork, stir into the butter. Blend the mixture well, then spoon into the base of buttered tin. Spread the crumbs evenly and press down firmly.

In a large mixing bowl combine the Cream Cheese, Sugar, Eggs and Essence, and beat at medium speed for about 10 mins. Pour carefully over crumb crust in tin. Bake in centre of oven for 40 mins. at 325 F. Gas Mark 3. Remove from oven and allow to cool for 35 minutes. While it is cooling stir two teaspoons of castor sugar into Soured Cream. Pour over top of baked cake. Bake at 400 F. Gas Mark 6 for 10 minutes - watch carefully. It should brown very slightly on top.

Refrigerate at least overnight. - and Don't count the calories!

ST. PIUS X PARISH YOUTH GROUP

A meeting of the Youth of the Parish was held on Sunday, 14th October, in St. Pius X School Hall. The purpose of this meeting was to see what action the Youth of the Parish were going to take as a direct result of Pope John Paul's visit to Ireland.

Present at the meeting were most of the members of the Parish group who went to Galway, and, of course, Fr. Carey. Also present were Fr. Supple, Eddie and Margaret Hearn, who were invited guests.

Fr. Carey opened the meeting by welcoming everyone and thanking them for coming. Following the Pope's theme in Ballybrit, Fr. Supple opened the discussion to the floor with "The future of the Church depends on the Youth" and re-echoed the Pope's words "The young people should sing" - from this Eamonn McCauley took his cue and extended an invitation to any interested and committed member of the Youth of the Parish to join the Folk Group. He emphasised the commitment that is required from its members, and pointed out that if this commitment is present, this is a very worthwhile way of answering the Pope's call. Fr. Carey then went on to explain when and where practices took place, and said he would like to see the Folk Mass emerge as a focal point for the youth of the Parish.

As the meeting was opened to the floor, various different activities that the youth of the parish would like to participate in were suggested, i.e. there was quite an amount of support given to the idea that a junior branch of the St. Vincent de Paul should be organised in the Parish. The general concensus of the meeting was that a lot of worthwhile social work could be done in the area, visiting the sick, old lonely, etc.

A random sample of the areas of the parish that were represented was taken by Fr. Carey, and it was found that each Parish area was well represented. However this also brought to light the fact that the youth of the Parish didn't know each other very well. There were various different cliques and 'never the twain should meet'. Many suggestions were put forward to rectify this situation, i.e. An encounter group or a retreat on the lines of the Better World retreat. This idea was received with enthusiasm. The lack of communication within the parish was also brought to light; this was found to be due to the fact that all the youth of the parish did not attend St. Pius X Church, but go to Terenure College, and thus they missed any announcements made. To this end, the meeting was informed that the Liturgy group was drawing up a list of groups in the Parish and detailing their activities. A contact person would also be given, and this will be posted in the Church porch.

Fr. Carey impressed on all the youth present at the meeting, how important it was that any activity they embark on as a result of this meeting or any subsequent meetings, should not interfere with home life or school work.

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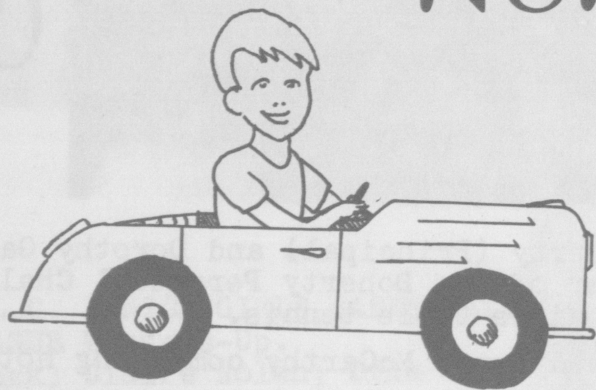
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Templeogue Ladies Club

REPORT FROM GALWAY

"Young People of Ireland, I love you...."

A weekend which began on 28th September and ended on 1st October is one which the youth of our Parish will never forget. That weekend will always remain in our minds.

The wonderful weekend began on Friday, 28th, at 2.30 The youth of the Parish assembled outside St. Pius X Church, and awaited eagerly the two coaches which would take them to Galway to see Pope John Paul II. Equipped with haversacks, sleeping bags, seats and food, they chatted away happily until their coaches arrived. Once boarded, the youth of the Parish began to sing the songs which would be sung at the Pope's Mass. The journey lasted a few hours, and we arrived safely in Galway.

Ten people who represented the youth at the Phoenix Park Mass in the Choir, arrived in Ballybrit on Sunday morning. The amount of teenagers at the train station was an experience to see. 16,000 waited to board trains and intended to do it all together, but order was demanded, and finally everyone got on a train. Our ten youth from our parish joined the rest on Sunday morning at 5.00 a.m.

Everyone was pretty tired but the youth of Templeogue danced and sang in their corral for part of the morning. The atmosphere was great, and touched everyone's heart.

Through the dark grey sponge of the Sunday weather, and under the dreary mist which always threatened to become rain, we could see the youth of Ireland pouring into Ballybrit.

The youth of our Parish were in corral No. 56 and had quite a good view of the Pope. At 10.00 the orange helicopter was said to be arriving. At first your ears strained to hear the noise of the engine. On hearing that, your eyes searched the sky to find the helicopted, and then it was to be seen. It circled around Galway racecourse, and everyone waved flags, hands, scarves, and sang and cheered for the Pope.

When His Holiness arrived on the altar, the cheers for him rang out from everyone present. He spoke to us first in

English and then in Irish. The Mass began with a well-known folk song "Walk in the Light. The Mass proceeded, and then came the part everyone waited for: the Pope's message to the youth of Ireland. He began "This morning the Pope belongs to the youth of Ireland" and everyone responded by making it clear that we belonged to him. He told us that Christ was the way, the truth and the life, and to stop the excess use of alcohol, vandalism, sex and drugs. And then came the most touching part of his speech, when he said in a loud voice: "Young people of Ireland I love you". Ten minutes of non-stop cheering and then the main choir broke into a song in Polish so familiar to the Pope - "Stolat". All this brought tears to the kind man's eyes. He then noticed that the sun had shone through the mist and rain, and said aloud: "It was necessary to have the sun shine for us a little". The Mass continued, and afterwards the Pope drove around in his 'Pope-mobile'. We had a great view of him as he drove past us, his lovely smiling face as he waved happily at us.

And all too soon it was over. As we made our way back to the Presentation Convent in Galway it seemed that everyone

who had been present had gotten some message to take home with them.

Back at the Convent we tried to grab a few hours sleep. Those who did not sleep visited Galway Cathedral. That night, after we had eaten, we talked among ourselves, and then retired to sleep soundly. Our coaches arrived next day at 3.30 and we arrived home at 7.30. We enjoyed every minute of our weekend.

The youth of Templeogue simply wish to say: "Thank you Pope John Paul II for everything".

DOWN MEMORY LANE WITH THE TEMPLEOGUE TELEGRAPH

Believe it or not, the "Templeogue Telegraph" first appeared ten years ago this month - Vol. 1 Number 1 Date 16.11.69 went on sale for the princely sum of 6d a copy, and for those who have difficulty in recalling the £.S.D. era, this was a charge of 2¹/₂p. Seven type-written pages, a cover and two ads., dedicating themselves to the ideal of furnishing a better form of communication between local active bodies and the people, and between the societies themselves! The cover carried a large question mark, with the caption: "What goes here? This is your magazine - what goes into it depends on you". Still, after ten years, a worthy question and a worthy sentiment. The staff of the day were Mr. T. Gogan, Rev. Fr. P. McCarthy, and the Misses Jacinta Devlin, Joyce Parkes and Catriona Ferriter. The ads. indicated that sugar was 1/4 (7p) for two pounds and sultanas 1/8 (9p) a pound! St. Pius X National Schools were celebrating victories in the Primary Schools Sports of the year, having produced in John Vaughan the best athlete. They also had four firsts, and three seconds. Local community leaders were working for a Community Council and traffic lights on Templeogue Bridge.

Five years later, and the Templeogue Telegraph had blossomed forth into a 26-page monthly magazine. The November 1974 issue was priced at 6p. and recorded among other news items that the College and Wainsfort Residents' Association were happy that at last the County Council were getting down to paving the pathway through the "grass area" at College Drive/Fortfield Road junction. Parktype benches and trees were to be provided. The Templeogue Parents' Association were announcing their dinner at the Green Acres Golf and Country Club, with tickets at £2.50 each. The Templeogue Ladies Club confessed to having learnt something at their October Club meeting, when Miss Costelloe of Elida gave an interesting talk on hair care, showing slides and answering ques-

tions. Fr. Lee was sitting, unnoticed, in the corner, and said he was simply fascinated, but was not reported to have had any hair problems. A reader asked the Telegraph to enquire whether there would be any support for the idea of a district fruit, flower and vegetable show in 1975? Mervyn Taylor was stressing the importance of husbands making financial provision for their wives and families, pointing out that a survey of the time showed that fewer than half the men questioned had never discussed with their wives what their wives' financial position would be in the event of their deaths. A local hardware merchant was offering Kosangas Heaters at from £39.95 complete. And Sheila Whittle was reminding us of how complicated life could be made by all the little bits of paper - the Inter. Cert., the Leaving Cert., cheques, bills, prescriptions, etc., etc., etc. Some things never change, do they?

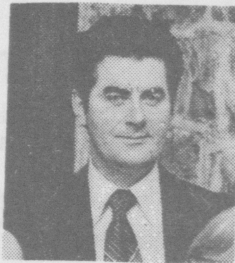

Know your Neighbour

At the time of reading this many of you will have seen and enjoyed the Fashion Show in Templeogue College on October 18th. Featured will have been a collection of clothes to suit most occasions by Matt O'Donohue.



Matt, who lives at Cypress Park Templeogue was born in Castleisland Co. Kerry. After school he obtained a 2 year Horticultural Scholarship. The first year was spent at Johnstown Castle and the second year in the Botanic Gardens, Dublin. He enjoyed the work but was disappointed that after his training there were such limited openings for his skills.

Encouraged by his fiancée Ann, now his wife, he enrolled in the Grafton Academy of Dress Designing. This was not so far removed from his original training as might at first appear. The same flair for texture design and colour is an asset in both avocation.

On completing his training he started at once in business for himself but soon decided that he needed to widen his experience in the business end of his trade. So for several years he worked for a clothing manufacturer and later took a course in London.

On his return he again started his own business with a small staff. In the years since then he has carved his own niche in the fashion world. He has concentrated, and probably will continue to do so, on a small business which can be personally supervised. He caters for individual clients, supplying clothes to suit their personal requirements. Most of his clothes therefore are models but each season he designs some dresses and suits using the same materials. A customer may then select an outfit which has a similar colour scheme to another but no two are identical.

He specialises in Irish fabrics and does a great deal in Irish tweed. He also has a liking for wool crochets and includes at least one item in this material in each collection.

His clients include people who are in the public eye but he would, of course, mention no names. One of his creations he did not mind mentioning however, because it had been seen recently in the newspapers was the wedding-dress worn by Paul Darragh's lovely bride.

Matt says he is not influenced by Continental designers. He feels that Paris has lost its individuality and exclusiveness. Many of their designs today seem to be geared towards commercial production.

His own taste runs to designs based on classic lines which can be worn successfully for several seasons. His emphasis is on elegance and simplicity of line. Interest is introduced by the use of colour, stitching, texture and trim. All trimmings used are made in his own work-room. They make a particular speciality of drawn-thread work and pin-tucking. I saw an example of the drawn-thread work in a bainin suit. The entire sleeve was in an open-work design hand-done with great skill and artistry.

Matt favours the longer line in clothes and is pleased to see a greater clothes consciousness in women at the moment. He also welcomes the signs of a return to the wearing of hats. He feels that a formal outfit is incomplete without a suitable hat.

In general, Matt keeps his work on a 9 to 5 basis except when preparing a collection. He does one a year in the Autumn but includes clothes for all occasions, suits, coats, blouses, day-dresses, evening and bridal wear.

Matt and Ann have five children, four boys and a girl. Now that they are grown up a little he indulges his love of gardening. His back garden is a riot of colour in season and he has lots of vegetables. He enjoys an occasional day at the Races but both Matt and Ann find their greatest relaxation in Bridge. They are members of several bridge clubs in the locality and they play for pleasure and not in a competitive spirit.

Matt has strong feeling on one subject which constantly crops up whenever parents meet and that is the subject of education. He feels that in spite of some improvement in the provision of technical education at all levels there is still too much emphasis on academic subjects. There is a need for a change in public attitudes and parents should be encouraged to consider technical education for their sons and daughters at Inter-Cert Level if they do not have an academic bent. Many are pushed for foolishly snobbish reasons into careers for which they have no taste, to the neglect of manual skills which can be much more fulfilling.

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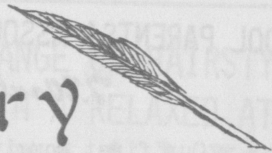

THE DUBLIN COUNTY COUNCIL

Since my election as Councillor many people seem anxious to know more about the Council and its operations, consequently I feel it would be worthwhile to tell you a little about this Local Government Authority.

Well, we don't meet in Parnell Square, where the Council has many of its Departmental Offices, and where many of you pay your monthly repayments, but in the Administration Block of offices at 46/49 Upper O'Connell Street (opposite Gresham Hotel). This suite of offices has only been built in recent years and provides an excellent service to the public. It is beautifully laid out and the Council Chamber is a most attractive suite with the most modern facilities. As well as the seating arrangements for the 36 Councillors, the chamber also provides seating for the Council Departmental Officials The Press and Public Gallery. It is here that many deputations are received by the Council and indeed that you, the public, can find the answer, we hope, to many of your queries. By the way, we also have an Information Centre in Tallaght, Main Street, which of course is much more convenient for many of you and where we have a small staff to deal with your local problems.

The Council Meeting itself has an agenda rather similar to any large organisation, but much more detailed. We have the usual Minutes Approval, Housing, Finance, Chairman's Report and the District Committees. Perhaps the most important part as far as you the public are concerned is the time for Councillors' questions and motions which have already been sent in and are included in the Agenda

The meeting is long, varied and most interesting and on many occasions is adjourned, to complete the Agenda, until a later date.

Dealing with questions at the last meeting, Deputy McMahon and myself raised the question of the serious pollution and the lack of protection to children at the River Tymore/Poddle which runs through many residential areas. I have also raised the question of the very poor service on the No. 17 Bus Route which, as you know, large numbers of students and business people use at peak hours. Still dealing with C.I.E., I am pressing for bus shelters at the new 54A terminus and also at the Templeogue College bus stop. At a recent debate I have also asked for the Templeogue Bridge improvement scheme to be placed on the priority list. Many of you will also be well aware of the work done by the Southern Cross Group and at the recent Monthly Council Meeting I was pleased to support the resolution asking the Council to press ahead as a matter of urgency with the acquisition of land for the building of the new high speed limited access route as suggested by this Group.

Well folks I have tried to tell you just a little of the service and the administration of the Dublin County Council and I do hope you will continue to use your Councillors for the improvement of your area.
