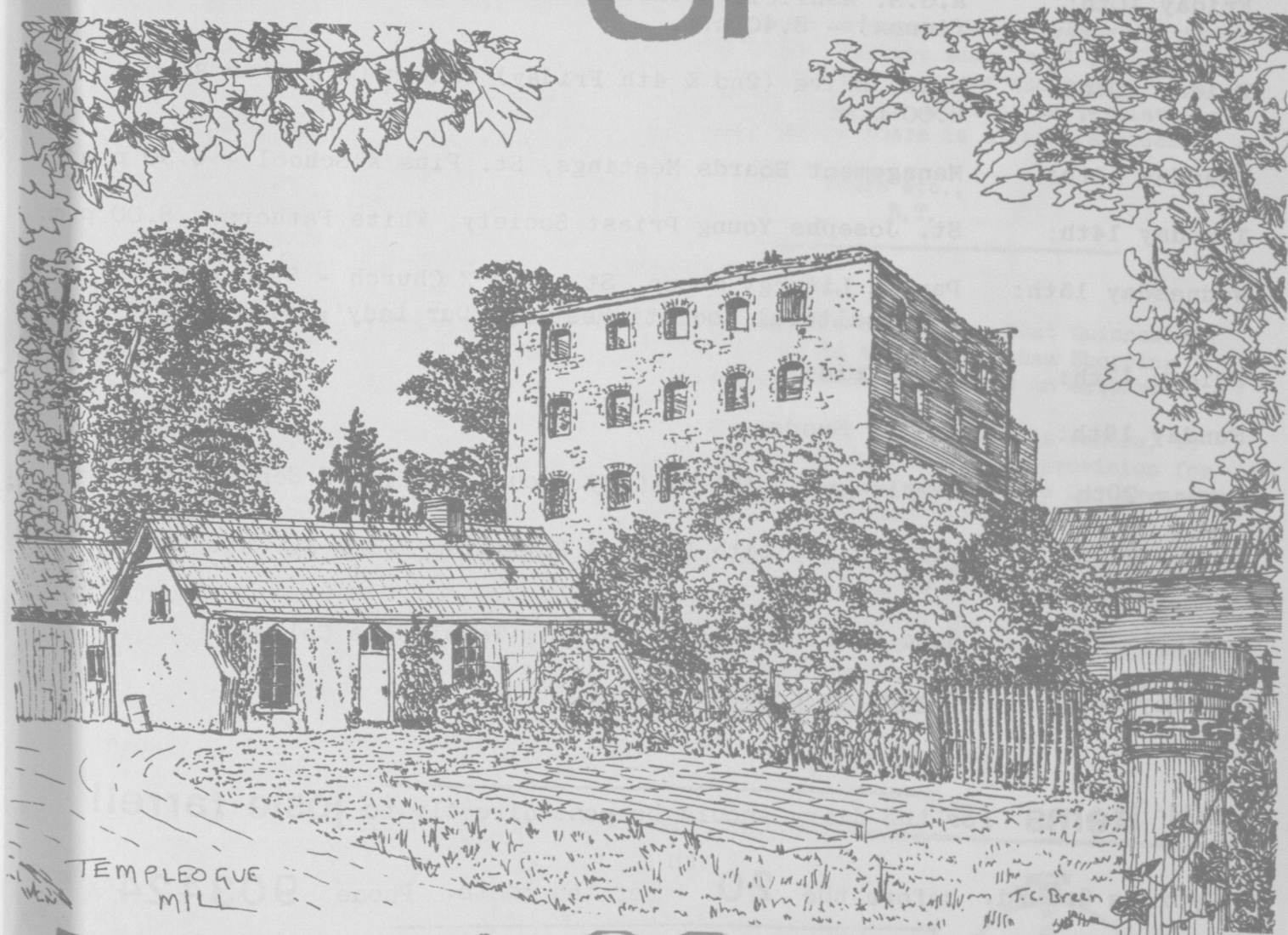


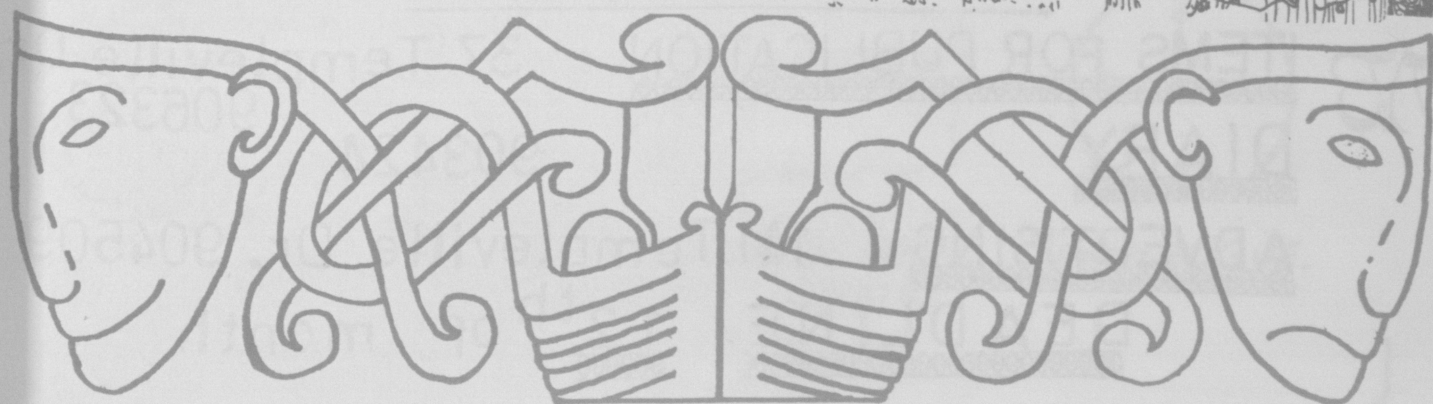

Improvement Works at Templeogue Bridge

Some of your readers have been making enquiries with me regarding the present position of the Templeogue Bridge Improvement Scheme.

The Consultant Engineers retained by the County Council are preparing a detailed design and their preliminary report is expected this month.

The new bridge will be constructed on a phased basis and a contract will be placed during the coming year.

The first stage will be the construction of a new bridge upstream of the existing bridge. It is then proposed to demolish the existing bridge and widen the new bridge. In the meantime, work on footpaths and a wall on the approaches to Templeogue Bridge is in progress.

To date allocations amounting to £175,000.00 have been made for this scheme.

In the original plans for this centre, it is understood that there was provision for a public toilet, either beside Quinnsworth, or in the restaurant upstairs.

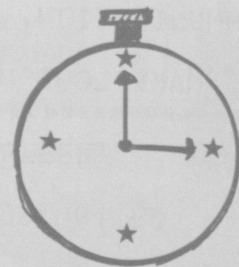

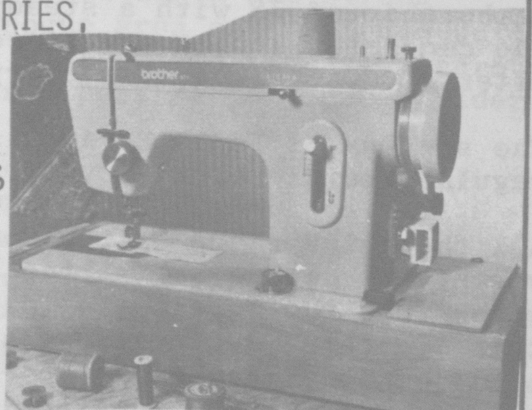

The Annual General Meeting of the Community Council took place in Our Lady's School on Tuesday, 24th February, at 8.00 p.m. Michael Brady chaired the proceedings. Representatives of the following affiliated bodies were present:

Councillor S. Laing and Rev. Fr. Supple, representing V. Rev. Fr. Lee were also present together with some interested members of the community.

The Secretary's Report was read and signed. The Treasurer's statements for the Community Council, Feile Bhríde and Templeogue Telegraph were submitted and inspected.

In a reference to the need for a community meeting place or Recreational Centre Mr. Terry Samuels reported that following a proposal made at the Church Liaty Week to form a committee to discuss this matter and present its findings to the Community Council, he had volunteered to do so. Despite endless enquiries and approaches to people, he had failed hopelessly to recruit anyone who was prepared to undertake a serious investigation of the matter. It seemed that the enthusiasm shown at the Church Liaty Week for such an undertaking was quickly forgotten when it came to a serious study of the situation.

The report on the Youth Group presented by John Deegan was encouraging. There are now 80 registered members with at least 18 stewarding adults standing by. The interest and attendance of Fr. Sean Breen at the Club has been of great benefit and much appreciated.

The Whist Drives too are proving most popular and meet regularly on the 2nd and 4th Fridays of the month. The Horticultural Society boasts of a membership of 78 with a steady increase at each meeting. Yvonne Kelly and the dedicated ladies committee still continue to pour "the cup that cheers" after 10.00 O'clock mass every Wednesday morning - all are welcome.

The success of Feile Bhríde is undisputable and will continue to be a regular feature of the cultural contribution to the community at large.

All the enterprises of the Community Council were worthwhile and praiseworthy but no praise was too high for the untiring efforts of the Committee which runs the Templeogue Telegraph. The combined and tireless efforts of this dedicated few provide us monthly with a magazine of which we are justly proud. Reporting on its operation, Prof. R. Kernan told us that advertising plays a substantial part in the existence of the Telegraph. A great deal of foot-slogging had to be undertaken every month to accomplish this and he felt a well deserved tribute be paid to Mildred Sargeant whose dedication to this task month after month was most praiseworthy. In New York's Madison Square Garden, an unprecedented rock event, with Bob Dylan, Ringo Starr and George Harrison among others took place on August 1st. It was in aid of the victims of the war in Bangladesh. However since we have seen the Rolling Stones give a concert for charity (as a court sentence) and 'Rock for Kampuchea' in aid of the victims of the Lon Nol regime. Still in the music world, "Satchmo" or Louis Armstrong, the 'boy with the cornet', died in the state of New York aged 71. Within a month his second wife, Lil Hardin, also died aged 73.

On 9th August detention without trial was introduced in Northern Ireland. 800 men were seized and (allegedly) tortured at Long Kesh (now 'the Maze' - a tactic to play down its notoriety perhaps). August 9th was to be the subject of the inconclusive *Widgery* Enquiry and to inspire the song which topped the charts for nearly a year, 'The Men behind the Wire' by the Barleycorn.

In September, Nikita Sergeyeovich Khrushchev, one of Stalin's bloodiest henchmen died near Moscow. In his time he put down the Hungarian uprising ruthlessly and seemed to take pleasure in provoking international crisis after crisis. But in the years after he was ousted in 1969 a de-Stalinization programme, similar to the de-Maoisation beginning in China now, took place, so Khrushchev was buried without honours. Shortly after his death,

14 days in fact, one of his most resolute opponents finally gained his freedom. Imprisoned from 1949-1956 until the Hungarian uprising, Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty, then spent 15 years in the U.S. Embassy in Budapest. On 25th September he was finally allowed to leave for Rome.

Two unusual books, dedicated to awakening public consciousness appeared in 1971. 'Bury my heart at Wounded Knee' by Dee Brown - rather heavy going, biased, but well documented it was a welcome view of the 'winning of the West' from the other side. And 'The Female Eunuch' by Germaine Green, her witty analysis of the war between the sexes. The book advances the theory that the sexuality of women has been denied to render them docile and content with an inferior role in society. Both books are still around.

Finally, the Nobel Peace Prize was awarded to Willy Brandt (later found to have East German spies in his cabinet) and presented to him on December 10th by King Gustav Adolf VI of Sweden, since been succeeded by his grandson Carl Gustav.

Ten years on, some things remain the same, other events are ironic viewed with hindsight. They say we can learn from history but if you have forgotten as much as I had, before doing this article, in the space of only ten years, it just goes to show that memories are short which may explain how Mrs. Gandhi is Prime Minister of India in 1981 too.

One of the first tasks I was asked to carry out on my election as County Councillor was to have a traffic warden appointed at Our Lady's School, Templeogue. Unfortunately, that was not possible, but I was promised that traffic lights would be erected as soon as money was available. I am delighted to report that these lights have now been erected, as I have been constantly in touch with the Traffic Department about this dangerous crossing at Fortfield Road. I now look forward to hearing from residents in the area, and particularly parents from the school as to the efficiency of this new lighting system. I would also like to hear from residents in the Wainsfort area how effective the new lights are on Wainsfort Road/Fortfield Road. It is hoped that this pause in traffic will help pedestrians to cross more easily to the shops, in particular the elderly.

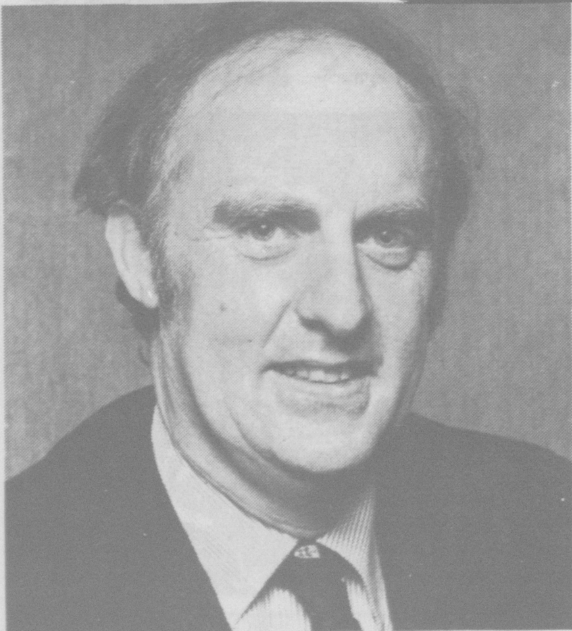
Most of the time at this month's Council meeting was taken up discussing the arrangement, already agreed some months ago, of the disposal of toxic waste material. However, owing to the concern of the residents living close of this dump at Finglas, all Councillors were anxious to ensure that adequate and foolproof guarantees could be received from the Council Engineers in charge of this tip at Dunsink.

After a lengthy debate, and I quote from the Minister of the Environment as follows:-

"What is involved in the disposal there, in mixture with other wastes and under conditions of close supervision, control and monitoring of limited quantities of certain industrial wastes arising in the Dublin area that could create problems if they were not disposed of under such conditions of control. The I.I.R.S., based on an independent assessment, have found the site to be very suitable for this purpose. The I.I.R.S. will be vetting the operation with the Council".

He also stated that the current proposal is for a limited trial period of six months, and that no waste which would be regarded as coming within the E.E.C. directive as toxic and dangerous would be accepted, and that the position would then be reviewed.

As I have said, a long discussion took place, and having received these assurances from the Minister and indeed the County Officials, a majority vote was passed to proceed with the tiphead for special categories of waste disposal. If this had not been done, employment would be at risk, and this is surely something we are all deeply concerned about. Also, we would be back to a situation where unauthorised dumping would take place throughout our county. I am sure we would all agree this would be a very serious situation. Of course, this is a national problem, and we now await action by the Minister for the Environment.

CREDIT UNION donal kelly

Last month's article traced Credit Unions from their origins to combat usury in Europe in the last century and their spread to America, to Ireland in 1958 and to Templeogue in 1969. Anyone living in the area is welcome to join.

WHAT IS A CREDIT UNION?

Our Credit Union is an association of people living in our area who have joined together for the purposes laid down in the rules:

- (i) To promote thrift among its members by the accumulation of their savings.
- (ii) To create sources of credit for the benefit of members at a fair and reasonable rate of interest.
- (iii) To use and control members savings for their mutual benefit.
- (iv) To educate members in their economic, social and cultural well-being as members of the community

It belongs to the people of our community who have become members and is run for their benefit by a board of directors which they elect from among themselves each year.

WHY SHOULD YOU JOIN?

Ideally, members should save so that the pool of savings they created would be available to be loaned to those members who wanted to borrow. It is not possible to know just why each member joins, but we believe most are highly motivated. However there appears to be an increasing number whose aim seems to be to save solely to get a loan as quickly as possible - and, when the loan has been partly repaid, they either top it up with a new loan or

transfer their savings to wipe out their loan. They obviously have no desire to leave their savings there for the benefit of their neighbours a moment longer than they can help.

If all our members behaved like this there would only be exactly enough money to loan each member the exact amount of his or her savings, which would not be much use to anybody. It is fortunate that many of our members are not like this or we would have ceased to exist long ago.

OTHER REASONS FOR JOINING

- (1) It encourages you to save
- (2) By being a member and saving you are able to get a loan
- (3) Shares and loans are covered by "free" life assurance
- (4) Last year the dividend paid on shares (savings) was 4%


HOW TO JOIN

You are welcome to call to our office at 46, Fortfield Park any Wednesday (7.15pm-8.15pm) or Friday (7.15pm-8.30pm) when you can find out more about our Credit Union, without any obligation.

If you want to join you just fill out two forms - an application form and a nomination form, on which you state who is to receive your savings in the event of death.

There is an entry fee of 20p. You can then save as much as you like or as little as you like when you like. This is recorded in a Pass Book which you keep and produce each time you pay in money. You will be given some literature about the Credit Union, including a rule book which explains how it is run.

COMPLETION OF ESTATE:

A lot of correspondance has been going on with the Co. Council, the builders, Crossspan and Howard Lane and other bodies regarding the completion of the estate. It is the intention of the parties involved to commence work on the grass verges, the roads and the open spaces within two months. The principal drawback at the moment is alleged to be the weather and the state of the soil. It is the intention of the Association to undertake levelling the mounds of earth on the open space and those mounds adjacent to the river Poddle, if there is undue delay on the part of the builders and the Co. Council. In this regard a sub. of £10 per house is being collected. Most people have already paid this.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL:

As the appearance of the wall backing onto Templeville Road and the delapidated look of the entrance to the estate detracts from the area in general, we would appreciate if the Community Council would invite us to their next meeting so that we may ask for their assistance on the matter.

TEMPLEOGUE LOCAL HISTORY GROUP



The first meeting of the Templeogue Local History Group took place on Thursday the 12th of March in Templeogue College. A slide-show by Thaddeus Breen, called the Story of Templeogue was attended by a sizeable audience, who learned about Templeogue's past, from prehistoric times to the most recent suburban developments. The replacement of the rural landscape and fine old building by housing developments evident in his slides was of particular interest to those of us who had forgotten how Templeogue looked 25 years ago or even 10 years ago. His reference to a Roman gold coin found in the area many years ago would tempt one to go digging in the garden and indeed a resident of College Drive recently unearthed a metal wool seal dating back a few centuries. His old maps and aerial views of Templeogue were interesting but one would have appreciated more time to assimilate all the details of old estates and their boundaries. Mr. Breen finally invited those present, who were interested in researching the history of Templeogue, to leave their names and addresses and it seemed to me that at least 30 people did so.

At the next meeting future activities will be discussed - both lectures and visits to places of interest in the locality - the old Churchyard for example. It will also be an opportunity to plan one or two research projects such as locating old photographs of the area, interviewing old residents, and looking at life in Templeogue at the turn of the century through the 1901 Census returns.

This meeting will be held in St. Pius X National School, on Monday April 20th at 8 p.m. Anyone wishing to help in the organization of the group will be particularly welcome.

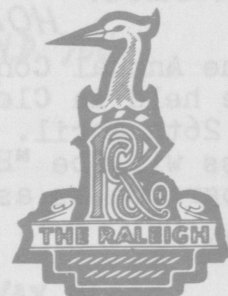
