PARISH WEEK – JUNE 10th – 17th

It should be a high point in our lives as a community. It will be, only if we make it so. And the 'name of the game' is 'involvement'. Have a look at the programme; choose the events that interest you and plan your presence and preferably, your participation.

Last year's Parish Week was a mixed success. The outdoor Mass, the pet show, the fancy dress competition, the soccer championships, provided a satisfying blend of celebration, excitement and enjoyment. Some other events did not reach the same heights. The Parish Council is trying to learn from the past – to build on the successes, amend or eliminate the non-events, and float a few new enterprises.

So here we go again, 'crawling' for your support. But sure you've never let us down yet!!!

On 23rd April this year (Easter Monday), a temperature of 75° Fahrenheit (nearly 24° Celsius) was recorded on Valentia, Kerry, a bit of alright for 23rd April or 23rd of any month in Ireland for that matter.

Now, as the fine weather continues well into May, for better or for worse, I've gotten myself a hunch – '84 is going to be a good year weather-wise. No matter that a goodly number of my hunches become "also-rans". That prediction about our weather sounds like good news, also even if the worst comes to the worst, before it could be checked, I would be banking on you having forgotten my forecast. Anyway who wants to hear the bad news!

Among older generations of our people there was no such thing as bad news. In good times and in bad, in fair or foul weather it was always: "Thank God." That wholesome Christian attitude may not be so common among us today but, happily, we have by no means lost it completely. It is beautifully expressed for us in the Canticale of Daniel, which we pray frequently in the Liturgy.

The Book of Daniel is probably the last of Old Testament writings. In these Resurrection days it is of interest to note, Daniel, in Chapter 12, has the clearest indication in the Old Testament of belief in the Resurrection. It was written at a time when the Jewish people were under extreme pressure to forsake their God.

The Sacred Writer wrote to encourage them to hold fast, and what more effective way of doing so than through the capital story of the three men in the fiery furnace. They were Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego (and these were not even their real names!), and they were being pressed by the Babylonian King, Nebuchadnessar, to forsake their God. If not he would throw them into a fiery furnace, which he had made hotter than hot. Valentia on 23rd April would not be even remotely in the same league! Worth reading about it in Daniel 3.19.

Our three heroes chose the furnace with this reply "We are not alarmed. Our God can deliver us. But even if he does not, we still shall not worship the false image". What classic faith! Would be grateful for even a teeny-weeny bit of it Lord; would sure settle for the 'crumbs' here!

It was out of this situation was born the inspiring Canticale with its repeated "To him be highest glory and praise forever" and its call, on such various elements of creation as, 'clouds of the sky', 'sun and moon', 'the stars of the heav'ns', 'showers and rain', 'breezes and winds', 'fire and heat', 'frost and cold', 'night time and day', 'darkness and light' to 'bless the Lord, again and again, and for ever.'

OUR LADY, QUEEN OF PEACE

(Article compiled from interview with Elenor McFadden – May 1984)



Very special graces and blessings are flowing to a tiny mountain village named Medjgorje in Yugoslavia, where Our Lady, Queen of Peace has been appearing for nearly 3 years to 4 girls and 2 boys. Her message is simple – peace, prayer, penance, fasting and reconciliation. She recommends people to go to confession once a month and asks us to live the message of the Gospel, say the Rosary and, where that is not possible, say seven Our Fathers, Hail of Mary and Glory be to the Father – adopt a weekly day of fast.

Our Lady is said to have appeared first on a mountainside on the 24th June, 1981 above the village. The Parish Priest was absent at the time and, on his return, was sentenced to 3 years' imprisonment for inciting the people to cause disruption by using the Bible – as the whole village (2,500 approx.) was converted to Christianity!

Over 3,000,00 pilgrims have visited Medjgorje to date despite the fact that the local authorities have been unsympathetic towards the installation of facilities. Very few Irish have visited there, but who knows? – remember you read about it first in the Knocklyon News!

GETTING TO KNOW YOU (The Brownies)

Did you know that there are Fairies, Leprechauns, Elves, Gnomes and Little People in Knocklyon? You can see them any Tuesday evening as they hurry along to the Junior School for a very special meeting with Brown Owl and the 3 Tawny Owls.

Brown Owl, alias Roisin Caffrey, has been in charge of the Brownies since last September. There are 30 of them aged between 6½ and 10½ and they are divided into groups called 'sixes'. The 'sixes' are known by delightful fairylike names and each has its own emblem. Roisin is helped by 3 hardworking Tawny Owls and together they provide an exciting, exhilarating and busy hour for these young people.

At 6.30 p.m. there is the 'Opening Ceremony'. There are Brownie Rings and special songs; secrets in the Pow Wow Ring and important discussion where no one can speak without making a Brownie 'sign'. Favourite games follow – quiet or noisy – like "Queen's Headache" or "Shopping Basket". Then comes the most important part of the evening "Studying for Proficiency Badges". You can become expert in anything – Art – Gardening – Athletic Skills – Music – whatever you like best. Later you can work for the Golden Bar Test or the Golden Ladder.

In winter there are outings to pantomimes or films – hikes in the summer and next September they are off (for the first time) to Brownie Cottage, Enniskerry.

REFLECTIONS

It's that time of the year, the end of school term in sight, and hopefully sunny days moving into the sights, and time again to think about holidays. For some it will be, "Where do we go this year?". For others it will be no problem, for there will be many reasons for not, "Following the Sun". But there will be time off to relax and take it easy with the family; friends to visit and an occasional drive into the unknown.

Driving out of Dublin, it's a good idea to have a destination to arrive at. There are many fine holiday resorts and hotels, but the outing could be equally as interesting and less expensive if you are prepared to bring your own picnic snack. The lakes at Blessington are beautiful. Of course you have been there many times. And now to really put my foot in it, how about visiting some old ruins of early Christianity, a wayside shrine or one of the countless Holy Wells? They are a point of interest and a place to go. I used to take our Wayside Shrines and Holy Wells so much for granted. They were there, we usually saluted as we passed a Shrine and slaked our thirst at a Holy Well, the water tasted good, as good as 'Perriers'. (Could it be used as a mixer?) I'm sure there are as many Holy Wells throughout the country as there are Saints in the litany of Irish Saints, but I'm always amused whenever I pass, 'St. Anne's Swimming Pool'

Joking aside the Wells and Shrines are a reminder of God, we are forced to think for a moment and maybe to pause and say a prayer. That pause is a good thing, it's a break from the strain of driving; or the strain of life. Having lived for many years in a land where there are no Wayside Shrines or Holy Wells, with the exception of the Crosses erected to indicate that there is a Catholic school nearby, one reflects on how these devotional objects do remind us of God and goodness. The termites felled many of the Crosses we erected. Due to changing government policy our out schools were taken over by the state. I remember at one of our former schools where the Cross had fallen to the white ants, no attempt was made to erect the Cross. Instead an official sign replaced the fallen Cross. It appeared very strange, the Cross lying where it had fallen and the attractive sign bearing the new name of the school seemed to stand in triumph over the Cross. Was it a sign of our changing values?
