

# **ONCE A YEAR DAY** ....

There is no doubt about it. Summer has gone. After the bonus days of unexpected sunshine and blue skies, suddenly, without warning, we are up to our ankles in crunchy brightly coloured leaves. The ground is a carpet of red, brown and gold - and the trees are bare. Each night now sees the curling smoke from hundreds of chimneys, rising silently into the frosty air. It seems as if the whole community has locked their door, pulled up a chair to the fire or the telly and forgotten the outside world. But don't you believe it. Inside these quiet homes the majority of people are either working for, or thinking of, the most exciting event of the year in Knocklyon - THE CHRISTMAS FAIR.

Started in the mid 70's the Christmas Fair has gone from strength to strength and is the biggest source of financial help towards paying off the Parish debts of Church and School. The committee in turn, rely on the magnificent help from the vast number of willing helpers, many of whom have been working towards this day for almost a year. Everything to help your enjoyment of the day has been taken care of; including security in the Car Park so you can leave your car in safety.

There are so many attractions on offer – something for everyone's taste. Stalls to tempt you are: Fancy Goods, Bookstall, White Elephant, Good as new, Grocery and Cakes (Cakes welcome). #### MY KIND OF SAINT ...

What is a saint, we queried at the Childrens Mass here on the 1st November. Up popped a stout hearted little female urchin with this reply: "A saint is a man who's in heaven and he's dead!" This moment of beautiful innocence earned a round of spontaneous applause from a delighted congregation.

November honours our saints — it also remembers our dead. The following is a touch of both. I have just returned from Mount Jerome Cemetary after laying to rest an old friend, Margaret. You might say we have a kind of one track mind concerning that same Margaret. Some years ago, after an inspiring visit to her in the Meath hospital, I wrote about it in the Knocklyon News. At the time she was not expected to last the night. In the expectation of her imminent passing, my few lines were intended as an obituary tribute.

Man proposes etc., Margaret did not leave us then. She lived to fight another day and even to read what I had written. She fully enjoyed the quirk of fate; she was grateful for the nice things said, because she was that kind of warm, well-balanced person. And because she was that kind of person, now some years later I feel she fully deserves another tribute, as I spoke it this morning at her funeral celebration Mass.

She inspired me; perhaps my picture of her might be a little uplift for you also, so here goes: "I think it very appropriate that we are celebrating the passing of Margaret in this 'old world' church." (James' St. Church — a parish and locality of no mean antiquity, character and history). "Margaret was an 'old world' person in the best sense and she would be a natural part of this area of Dublin.

And yet, for this she was none the less the complete person. I did not know her well enough to list all her interests but did know her well enough to appreciate there was nothing narrow or provincial about her philosophy, her understanding of life. It transcended place and time and that in a nutshell, made her the attractive warm personality those of us who knew her relished and loved.

She grew weak and feeble in latter years but never old. Only her failing senses could hide her wonderful spirit — serene with the fullhearted chuckle never far away. Moaning about her lot and suffering was foreign to her make up. But rather a quiet and brave acceptance, unselfish, with deep appreciation of kindnesses shown her.

It is easy to visualise such a person walking hand in hand with the Lord in life; it is easy to

#### SOCCER



#### GREENFINGERS

Another month, and we are now well and truly up to our oxters in fallen leaves, which continue to cascade down in a spectacular autumnal display.

The more reticent of us, including myself, are pleading a 'Damascus like' conversion to organic gardening, and pointing out the many positive attributes of massed leaves including natural mulch and frost protection for sensitive plants. However, on the negative side is the very dangerous conditions created by wet leaves on concrete, and more generally the overall reduction in light and air to shrubs and grass alike.

What a pity that 'Bob-a-Job' week does not coincide with such widespread community need, but perhaps the Scouts or some similar youth organisation might consider the future investment in some black sacks, and thereby provide a welcome local service.

But to return to matters horticultural, you should now complete your bulb planting adhering to packers instructions, when provided, i.e. tulip bulbs 4 inches apart, 4 inches deep. Height varies depending on variety, but avoid the taller ones unless your garden is very well sheltered.

My garden centre visit this month was to Mick Maloney in Clondalkin Garden Centre, Boot Road. The current emphasis here was on bulbs, with good value in half stone bags of daffodils, and also 100 mini bulb bags, incorporating 6 different varieties. For the meagre outlay involved your investment will continue to increase and give pleasure over a very long period of time (Eat your heart out, stockbrokers!)

Available also for instant impact are some large evergreen shrubs, with seven to eight years growth behind them. Unfortunately this advantage of maturity does carry a penalty, which is reflected in the prices applicable. They also carry a full range of gardening gifts and indoor plants, which with Christmas imminent, may be appreciated by one of the gardening fraternity. (Gift wrapping on garden forks is not available!) Incidentally, if your needs are more pressing, i.e. leaf rake, they have a good selection available in wire, plastic and bamboo.

Mick feels that his prices are already very competitive, but will extend a 5% discount to all Knocklyon customers armed with a current issue of the Newsletter.

Berberis (Barberry): This comprises a range of decorative shrubs, the more common of which is B. Darwinii (8 foot high with evergreen shiny leaves). It produces masses of yellow flowers in spring, and purple fruits in Autumn. B. Stenophylla similar to above but with a more arching habit. B. Thunbergii Atropurpea bronze foliage which turns red in Autumn and its dwarf variety 'Nana' is useful for the rockery or front of border.

Betula (Birch): B. Pendula is the common silver birch, but unless your garden can accommodate a 40 foot high tree, resign yourself to admiring it on open land. The variety Youngii is more suited to suburbia and has a graceful weeping habit. If you want an upright birch for your garden then Fastigiata may prove a better choice.

# **REPORT ON PUBLIC MEETING**

A public meeting organised by the Knocklyon/ Ballyboden Post Primary committee was held on Monday November 2nd at the Senior School Knocklyon. Approximately 100 people attended. The meeting was attended by all our TD's and Councillors except Deputy John Kelly. A representative from the Dept. of Education addressed the meeting and explained that a total review would not be completed before the end of November. All of the TD's addressed the meeting and declared their continued support for the project. Mr. Pat Kelly, principal of the Senior School, reminded those present that St. Colmcille's was now the second largest primary school in the country with approximately 1400 pupils. He appealed to the community to support the committee's work. Our parish was losing the very life of our community, our children, and we badly need a community school. Fr. Chris Conroy reminded the attendance that Baptism figures were rising. This important factor was highlighted by the chairman of the committee, Mr. Vincent Kenny, in responding to Dept. of Education statistics which show falling birth rates nationally.

Despite the fact that we are a newly developed community, we have no decent roads, no public amenities, or public transport. Mr. Pat Murray, Knocklyon Community Council, supported this view and added that planning appli-

cations for new houses in the area were increasing. Was the Dept. of Education aware of these extra numbers, he asked? Councillor Mary Muldoon proposed a motion that the Minister for Education respond to the committee and give specific assurances to the Knocklyon pupils seeking post primary places in 1988. This was seconded by Councillor John Hannon. In summary Mr. Vincent Kenny stressed that the community would not accept the manipulation of statistics by enlarging school catchment areas in order to offer a paper solution to the real difficulties being faced. We have a site paid for and we most certainly have the children. What we need now is our promised school.

#### THINGS CULINARY

There is nothing to beat a nice hot home-made scone, dripping with plenty of butter and home-made jam, maybe with a touch of sweet whipped cream and to feel it ooze down the side of your mouth as you bite into the warm pleasure of it and 'OH' to savour every morsel. For those of us who cannot afford to partake of such calorific luxuries, we need not feel too deprived because a fresh whole-meal scone, with a few sultanas added to give interest and a thin layer of low fat margarine to help it slide down is a pleasure in its own right. It takes a little practice to get the mixture just right so don't be discouraged if at first you don't succeed.

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> lb. fine wholemeal flour

1/4 lb. strong flour or plain flour (if you have none)

2 ozs. very cold margarine,

1 oz. castor sugar

<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> lb. self-raising flour 1 egg 1 oz. Baking powder 4 ozs. sultanas Pinch of Salt

(cut up small) A little less than  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint of milk to make a soft, yet rollable dough.

Rub the 2 ozs. of margarine into the brown flour. Do not allow the mixture to become warm with the heat of your hands. Sieve the baking powder, white flour, sugar and salt into the brown flour and mix very well. Add most of the beaten egg and enough milk to make a soft yet rollable dough. Roll out to about one inch deep and cut in squares or rounds. Place on a greased baking sheet, brush with the left over beaten egg and bake in the middle shelf of the oven at 220degrees (Regulo 5) for 15 to 20 minutes. Take great care of the baking at this high temperature, reduce the temperature if they appear to be colouring too fast.
