

BROTHER MARTIN - A Man of the People

Brother Martin Baxter is the newest member of the Presbytery in Knocklyon. He joined the priests there last March, just after he was made a Deacon. This tall, friendly young man has settled into community life quite easily, but then I suppose that would not be too difficult for someone whose whole life has been bound up with the Carmelite Fathers. Born and reared in Whitefriars Street – a genuine Dub – just across the road in which he lived, that much loved church could not fail to have had some influence on his life.

When his father died, Martin's mother was left to bring up their only child alone. His early schooling was in the hands of the Holy Faith nuns and he later became a pupil at the Christian Brothers, Brunswick Street. "Why Brunswick Street, that was a bit of a journey?" He laughed, "Well, you see – all my friends went there." Peer power always wins!

Living in the heart of the city can be quite exciting and Martin enjoyed every minute of it. "It was great" he told me, "St. Stephen's Green was my back garden. We used to go there almost every day. There are so many places to visit too, like the museums and Art galleries. I love art in all its forms. Not that I'm any good at it. In the city, you are so near everything, shops and theatres and crowds of people. It's easy to get to other places too, like the sea. We often went to Dun Laoghaire. I still do. I love walking down the pier. Every summer, we went on holidays to the north of England, to Preston in Lancashire. I have many relatives there."

After school, Martin worked for a while in the southern branch of a pharmaceutical company, before entering the Novitiate. "What made you want to be a priest?" I asked. "I always had the inclination" he replied, "and if you feel that way about something, you've got to try it out. I've never really wanted to be anything else."

His first year on entering, was spent in Kinsale – a town which he thinks must be the most beautiful in the world. The following five years, Gort Mhuire was his home, where he studied "Theology and Philosophy". During the summer holidays, students were sent away to work in various fields of community care. For Martin, these experiences proved to be wonderful - meeting people from all walks of life and seeing and sharing their problems at first hand. He worked with the handicapped. spent time in St. Vincent's and St. James's Hospitals and in St. John of God's, Celbridge. Working on children's summer projects, parents and children's groups were also jobs to be undertaken and he was even sent to Scotland for a month to work with deprived delinquents, and to a Detoxification Centre where drug addicts were treated. This particular experience was for Martin, one of the saddest things he ever encountered. Many of the drug addicts were HIV Positive - most had full-blown AIDS. They stole money and went out on mugging sessions - all to buy drugs which they watered down or mixed with cider -a way of stretching the dose. "It was the hopelessness that was so terrible", Martin told me. "They knew they were under a sentence of death, but the AIDS factor made little difference. They just had to have the drugs. It was a MUST that consumed their whole being. So many young people - so hopeless".

The life of a young man studying for the priesthood though, is not all work. Time is allowed for lighter moments of recreation and in between studying "Pastoral Ministry" at All Hallows, Martin sometimes pays a visit to the theatre, which he loves. Juno and the Paycock is a favourite, and he is thrilled to have seen that wonderful production of "Dancing at Lughnasa" which brought such recognition to its author, Brian Friel. He also loves to read and is particularly attracted to the classics, yet simple things, like visiting friends, please him most.

There is no doubt that Martin is looking forward to his ordination and a life dedicated to the community. "I love people" he says, "all sorts of people, different people, ordinary people, rich or poor, happy or sad. I want to help them, work with them, talk to them – wherever I am sent."

Worthy thoughts, Brother Martin. May God bless you and give you the courage and strength needed to carry out whatever tasks He may give you in the years ahead.

PROCEEDINGS

Much of the Council's work this year has been in the Planning Area. The Council has had to lodge objections both to the Co. Council and An Bord Pleanala in relation to a number of proposed developments. The Council's objections in many cases were based on the serious inadequacy of the present road network to cater for these developments. Since the opening of the Western Parkway (M50), the traffic through Knocklyon has increased very noticeably, resulting in very long traffic hold-ups both morning and evening.

The Community Council has made strong representations to Dublin Co. Council to ensure that the construction of the Southern Cross Route, the so-called Green Route with associated local roads in the area is commenced without delay.

The Education Committee is co-operating with the other bodies involved in the completion of the Parish Survey. The Central Statistics Office has been requested to provide advance information in relation to the area based on the recent Census.

The Policing Committee is endeavouring to get improved lighting on certain lengths of the Knocklyon Road.

I am sure that it is only lack of consideration for the old people that causes these conditions, and some thought would eliminate all the danger. Lately we have had the week of the old and retired, and it is a suitable time to bring this matter to the notice of the cyclists.

Of course, this does not apply to toddlers on their trikes. As a matter of fact, these children are most careful on footpaths or pedestrian walks.



"An unreflected life isn't worth living", said Socrates many years ago, so while Easter is still in our minds we might consider one of its more fascinating episodes.

The two dejected disciples are plodding their weary way home to Emmaus. They reckon the game is up. It is now Sunday and they walk along so absorbed in conversation that they don't notice the stranger until he joins them.

When he asks them what they were discussing so eagerly, they glumly reply that he must be the only one in Jerusalem who has not heard of the events concerning Jesus of Nazareth. Teasingly, he enquires: "What events?" They tell him of Jesus being a great prophet, " our own hope was that he would set Israel free".

Even when he explained the Scriptures to them, showing them the passages which foretold the death of the Messiah, they still did not recognise Jesus. As they enter the inn at Emmaus and the stranger makes to go on, one of them uttered the words which have immortalised the event.

"Stay with us, Sir, it is nearly evening and the day is almost gone". These words express the urgency of the disciples to continue in the stranger's company. When he broke bread at table, they eventually recognised Jesus. He then disappeared.

"Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the Scriptures to us? He had that effect on people. Five thousand had earlier gone out into the desert to be with him, forgetting even their food to do so.

Perhaps if we spend time in Jesus' company, our lives too might be dramatically altered.







POST-PRIMARY SCHOOL/SURVEY

With the growth of the Knocklyon Parish during the past few years, it is quite possible that many of our new neighbours may not realise that we have an eleven acre site on Scholarstown Road set aside for a post-primary school. Our committee recently held our 92nd meeting to discuss ways of pushing our case for the building of the school. The site, as you may imagine, is one of the last valuable open spaces on the Scholarstown Road and this community should be ever vigilant that it is not sold off as building land for new housing. Our Community Survey is now completed and a report is being drawn up for submission to the Minister. In general, it confirms what this community already knows, i.e. that the need exists for a post-primary school in Knocklyon and now we have the statistics to prove it.

BROTHERS PEARSE ATHLETIC CLUB

Brothers Pearse A.C. was formed in 1956 to promote and foster Track and Field Athletics in the Templeogue/Rathfarnham area. The club now draws most of its juvenile athletes, boys and girls, from the Knocklyon parish and the main club officers for 1991 are resident in this parish. Tommie Mulvey of Coolamber is Chairman, John Masterson of Delaford is Treasurer, Mary Sheehan of Coolamber is Assistant Treasurer, Ann Masterson of Delaford is Secretary and Bill Tyson of Coolamber is also on the committee.

In 1967, the Leinster Hockey grounds at Firhouse Road became the headquarters of the club and for the next twenty years the athletes trained there. In 1987 the club found itself without a base when the Hockey Association sold the grounds for building development. The club's athletes also trained for cross-country running in the fields of Delaford Farm which was adjacent to the Hockey grounds and on which most of Knocklyon Parish is now built. In fact, the All-Ireland Juvenile Crosscountry Championships were held on these lands in 1971.

For the past few years the club has used Sancta Maria College for Winter indoor training and the County Council grounds at Cherryfield for Summer track training. Recently the club obtained permission from Dublin County Council to site a suitable structure in Cherryfield which will provide much needed changing facilities for the athletes. With this in view, the committee has now organised a fundraising campaign.

Many of the club athletes have represented Knocklyon in the Community Games over the past number of years, and indeed some of them went on to represent Dublin in the National Finals.

New members are welcome and training takes place at Cherryfield from now until the end of September on Tuesdays and Thursdays at 7.00 p.m.

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
Senior School News
