Lent is upon us, among other things, the honouring of Christ's Forty Days fast in the wilderness – the same Christ who is always for us, The Way.


Primarily it is a period of self denial and Prayer. These are not an end in themselves but a means of teaching us to die to ourselves. This at first glance may send an unwelcome shiver down the spine, but we followers of Christ are not in the business of settling for second best, we are looking ahead to glorious Resurrection. The more we empty

ourselves of self love, the more we become enveloped in the infinitely precious love of Christ – Beauty ever Ancient, ever New.

So on our bikes then, self denial and Prayer – set out your own Programme, the opportunities are countless, give the time and effort to Christ who has suffered and died for love of us.

To help us on the way:

An extra weekday Mass is said during Lent, at 7.10 a.m. each morning. Morning Prayer of the Church is said each weekday at 9.30 a.m. The Rosary is recited after the 10 a.m. Mass. The Directed retreat, for the first time in Knocklyon,



begins 8th March – later on in the year a more general Parish Mission takes place in the Parish. The Angelus bell rings twice per day in Knocklyon, it is not meant to be ignored, it is calling us to pray. Perhaps we would do well to think again of the grand old Lenten Devotion – the Stations of the Cross – and, oh yes, the Church is open all day, it would do you no harm at all to drop in to say hello . . .

Note Sunday 15th March is being set aside at the request of the Irish Bishops, as a special day of Prayer for peace in our Country. Each Church is to decide on its own programme for this occasion. In due course, we'll give you the details for Knocklyon. Please attend, it is high time to show real concern.

Put Your Waste to Work!

Some of you may already be in possession of that valuable item, the "Green Bin" delivered to you by Kerbside Dublin and known to them as a "We Recycle" box. This little box is the brain child produced by the Dublin Chamber of Commerce, the Dept. of the Environment, the local authorities and with the co-operation and sponsorship support of industry in an effort to reduce household waste and improve the environment.

Many people seem to have become aware of the damage we humans have imposed on the world and words like "environmentally friendly" and "green" have crept into our vocabulary. The 20th century has been dubbed a 'throw away society' and certainly Dublin seems to fit into this category. The disposal of waste is a huge problem. Today, three of Dublin's four Landfills will be full up in 18 months. The fourth has only five years left. Unbelievably, each household produces more than one tonne of waste in one year, most of which could be used again.

Michael Keyes, General Manager of Kerbside Dublin is another member of the talented Knocklyon community, where he lives with his wife, Katherine and their two daughters. A native of Waterford, he had early ambitions to be a journalist and worked for a couple of years in this field on the Waterford News and Star. Twenty years ago he joined the Department of Environment in the Co. Council and came to work in Dublin. When the Kerbside project was mooted, Michael was asked to go to the States and the UK to investigate all aspects of recycling and after his return was seconded for one year in the setting up and development of the three year experiment.

The Cookstown Depot, from where Kerbside operates, occupies 27,000 square feet and the project has resulted in the creation of thirty new jobs. This includes four office staff: Noelle, in charge of development; Debbie, accounts; and Suzanne and Ailish, receptionists/secretaries. The huge area in which the other work is carried out, houses the collected waste, bottles, cans, cartons and all the recyclable articles that can be deposited in your bin. There is a green moveable floor leading to a conveyor belt which rises up to a platform. As the conveyor belt moves along the platform a magnet removes any ferrous material and the other items are sorted by individual machine operators and dropped through a chute into separate skips. They are then shipped out to various marketing companies who deal in recycling. For example, bottles would go to places like Rehab, cans to Receivable Resources, a Co-operative in Tallaght, plastics to County Meath and cartons to Holland. Paper is placed in a baling machine and ends up as a large compacted bale ready to be despatched to places like Tipperary.

There are many innovative uses for waste paper, one being shredded paper which is manufactured into a type of horse bedding which is quickly replacing straw in many stables. In England, dirty and wet waste is being processed into compost! It is mind boggling also to think that if we recycled even one tonne of paper which normally we discard -17 trees would be saved, or that tonne of glass recycled is the equivalent to an energy saving of 30 gallons of oil - and amazingly, if we collect and recycle half the aluminium cans we use, they would be worth £1m each year!

The official opening of Kerbside will take place in April and Michael tells me that future plans encompass a new Education Centre. At the end of March he hopes to circulate schools with details of proposed visits to the depot for pupils. These will be by appointment only, but will allow the children to view the actual work.

Hopefully, everyone in our area will soon be able to participate in this worthwhile recycling scheme. You leave your green bin out on the day of your normal bin collection and it is collected by Kerbside on the same day. It is an easy way to dispose of our waste, but as Michael says "Recycling is an expensive business and it is up to all of us to make it succeed by BUYING recycled goods. There are numerous and varied goods for sale. If your local shops do not stock recycled products – ask them to do so. We need YOUR help", he says, "PLEASE!" It is up to us – for in supporting such a project, we are saving the environment and protecting our beautiful world for generations to come. to come.


February was a memorable month for a certain Senior Infants teacher, who reached the magic 30. Sense and maturity along with wisdom have hit her with a bang.

YOUNG LINGUIST AWARD

On the 14th March the Local History Group of the Knocklyon Guild will receive an award by the National Arts Council of the I.C.A. at the Dublin Federation Meeting.

To qualify for this award the Guild was required to start a Local History Group, keeping a diary of meetings, and of what was planned and achieved. The material had to be compiled from original research, and presented in booklet form containing between 4,000 and 12,000 words. This work had to be submitted within one year of registering as a Local History Group. The compilation of the booklet was required under six different headings: History and Folklore; Special Features of the area; Flora and Fauna; Personalities, Past and Present; Place Names and Family Names; A Walk Plan, taking in as many Historical Sites as possible. The completed work was then sent to an independent adjudicator.

The Guild had its International Night on the 14th February, with Austria as its theme. We learned a lot about the cultural life of Austria from the videos, kindly sent to us by the Austrian Embassy. Value travel broadened our knowledge of skiing and travel. Prizes for our raffle were donated by the Leopardstown Race Course and the Racing Promotions Group. The night was a great success, thanks to our International Rep. Imelda Stokes, who organised the night (and the baking of scrumptious apple strudels).

COUNTY COUNCIL COMMENTS

1. LANDSCAPING WORKS - SCHOLARSTOWN ROAD

The Parks Department have carried out some landscaping at the Bus Terminus.

Some trees requested by Councillor Mary Muldoon have been planted on the wider verges of the Templeroan Link Road – a very welcome addition.

2. PUBLIC LIGHTING – BEVERLEY AVENUE/ORLAGH PARK

The delay in providing current at this site is caused by the fact that this issue is among matters included in High Court proceedings against the developers for the completion of the development. An early hearing is hoped for.

3. BAD BEND AT RIDING STABLES, KNOCKLYON RD.

It is intended that a Compulsory Purchase Order will be made shortly for the land needed to eliminate this hazardous bend. Meanwhile, the request by ClIr. Muldoon for the provision of a guard rail opposite this bend and outside numbers 76 - 80 Dargle Wood is being investigated.

4. DESIRE LINE - DARGLE WOOD OPEN SPACE

A footpath along this open space near number 80 much sought after by Templeroan residents would cost an estimated £3,000. No provision exists in the 1992 estimates for this work.

5. TRAFFIC CONGESTION – SPAWELL ROUNDABOUT

A recent report on traffic flows at this roundabout indicate huge tailbacks at morning and evening peak hours, affecting movement on the Tallaght By-Pass, Firhouse Bridge Road and Western Parkway. Unfortunately no immediate solution is available and it is believed these problems will be remedied by the opening of the Southern Cross Motorway. Meanwhile all possible short term options will be investigated and if found satisfactory, the necessary funding will be sought.

6. FIRHOUSE ROAD BUS SHELTER

A request will be made to Bus Atha Cliath to re-locate the bus shelter adjacent to the playing fields at Cherryfield as it currently obstructs the lefthand view of children leaving the park to cross the very busy road to Ballyboden St. Enda's. In the interim it is proposed to remove the side panel of the shelter.

A FEW SAMPLES OF OUR ACTIVITIES



The historians among us knew of course that there is a cross in the grass on the roadside at that point, marking the spot where Cavendish and Burke were assassinated by the "Invincibles", Brady and Kelly, in 1882. Story has it that this patch of grass has been maintained since then by the same Dublin family.

The tour of the ground floor included a walk around the table (originally in Dáil Éireann) in the room where the Cabinet holds its first meeting after Ministers receive their seals of office from the President, overlooked by portraits of all the previous Presidents.

A welcome diversion was provided by an invitation to stroll outside in the grounds, giving us a new perspective and also an opportunity to take a permanent record of our visit. A bonus was the chance to mingle with the neighbouring Ballyroan group who were also present that day.

A most pleasant and welcome finale was provided. Afternoon tea was served in the main salon, giving respite to tired feet and an interval to sit and relax and take in details of the splendid rooms — which, as we recall, are part and parcel of a normal household.

Our sincere thanks to Lyla Kennedy for taking the trouble to arrange everything so smoothly and most certainly to all at Áras an Uachtaráin, who took pains to make the day a memorable occasion.
