RONNIE PATTERSON THE MAN WHO LOVES TO ENTERTAIN

Not everyone can have 'two bites of the cherry'. Ronnie Patterson is one of the fortunate ones. This talented young man has pursued two separate careers in show business and has been remarkably successful in both.

He was born in the lovely county of Donegal, spent most of his early life in Letterkenny and was educated at Royal School, Raphoe. The whole family loved music and the children, (two boys and two girls) grew up singing and playing for their own amusement. Ronnie was the lead singer. He played the guitar and double bass. Billy and Christine played guitar and Dorothy made up the fourth member of the group. They sang mostly folk music and became very popular in all the surrounding counties. Soon their fame spread southwards and an invitation to sing at a Dublin Festival led to another performance at The Kilkenny Beer Festival. It was the latter that brought them their first big break – an offer to do a series of gigs in Colorado, U.S.A. Could anyone refuse? "The Pattersons" gave up their jobs and off they went.

Ronnie reckons that Colorado must be one of the loveliest States in America. He has fond memories, not only of new friends and successful tours, but of the peaceful countryside and the times he spent pony trekking along the banks of many of its rivers.

A visit to Las Vegas was another memorable event. Not every Irishman can be entertained by a member of the Mafia! The gentleman in question was said to have five murders under his belt, but this didn't seem to bother our Ronnie – who was wined and dined in the lap of luxury. In Vegas too, he met the late Sammy Davis Junior. 'I'm your number one Irish fan' he boasted. 'You're not' said Sammy. 'Richard Harris is – you must be number two'. Then there was the pink Cadillac! On his way to a show, Ronnie stopped to talk to the driver of this enormous vehicle when the door of the hotel burst open and out came Elvis Presley

surrounded by seven *tiny* henchmen. Elvis was obviously conscious of his own height and had to surround himself with very small men.

When Ronnie got back to Ireland the group worked the usual circuits. A record deal with CBS took them to London and then came another break with the BBC – a spot on the Val Doonican Show. It was after a very successful appearance with Morecambe and Wise that they signed a contract for a further thirteen shows in which they shared the bill with people like Nina and Frederic, Sasha Distel, horror star Peter Cushing, Rolf Harris and the late Roy Orbison.

More TV shows followed in France, Belgium and Holland. They were very high on the ladder of success when Billy and Christine both decided to get married. It looked as if the group would split up, but after much discussion they decided to do one more year together.

A year later it was 'make your mind up' time for Ronnie. Should he go it alone he pondered – or should he try something else? He had always observed with interest the intricacies of production work in television and liked the buzz that emanated from the studio floor. That was it – he would work in TV. How lucky can one get? He wrote to the BBC and RTE and by return, the BBC asked him to attend an interview for the post of Assistant Floor Manager. He travelled up to Belfast and needless to say – got the job. He worked for some time in northern Ireland but in the end it was RTE who claimed him as a Floor Manager. So once more he returned to Dublin – this time to stay. There he met and married Rhona, an air hostess and they settled in the Knocklyon area where they live with their two children, Stephanie and Gillian.

Ronnie has worked on hundreds of shows in RTE. Keen on drama he is proud to have been assigned to such outstanding productions as Neil Jordan's first play which was directed by Pat O'Connor, and Jim Sheridan's 'Mobile Homes' also directed by Pat O'Connor who is now in the States and lined up to direct seven or eight more movies. The last show of note (to date) in which Ronnie was involved was the 'Late Late Show' in which Gaybo interviewed Annie Murphy.

He loves his job though he does harbour an ambition to become a director one day. Show biz, especially on a floor in TV is hard work. One spends long, hot, arduous hours beneath glaring lights that beat down relentlessly on the studio floor. But it is exciting, fascinating, exhilarating and compulsive – and when the final captions roll and you know that another show is 'in the can' – there is a tremendous sense of achievement.

Ronnie Patterson – the best of both worlds are yours.

A POST-PRIMARY SCHOOL FOR KNOCKLYON?

I consider myself an optimistic and positive individual and yet, on the last occasion on which I wrote in the Knocklyon News regarding the proposed Post-Primary School at Scholarstown Road, I notice that I refrained from thanking everyone involved in the campaign and instead I opted to wait until "the bricks arrived". The change of Ministers has unfortunately also brought a change of attitude and the official attitude now is that the Project will be considered in 1994 "within the constraints of available funding and the demands of other Projects". The Minister also states that the "needs of disadvantaged areas" must be taken into account.

Now I consider Knocklyon to be a charitable community and I know that no one in this growing parish would want to skip the queue over other communities in greater need. However, if living in a middle class community, having a job and paying high taxes is considered "advantaged" then perhaps the Minister should come and visit this overstretched, underfunded middle class suburb of Knocklyon. We have conducted a respectful campaign for over fifteen years and in the meantime watched our parish triple in size and our primary school become the largest in the country.

We have a signed letter on Department of Education headed paper from the previous Minister of Education sanctioning our school. We have confirmed approval from the Manager of the Building Unit of the Department of Education and we have the proven statistics justifying our case for this school. What then has changed in the four months since the Minister made her decision? Her budget was increased by 25% and the same officials who sanctioned the school project continue to act as advisors to the Minister. According to Deputy Eithne Fitzgerald, "the long term economics of a new school at Knocklyon depend critically on the future population of Knocklyon/Scholarstown, which will be affected by the final decisions on re-zoning in the Scholarstown area". I'm sure most of us have a déjà vu feeling about that statement. Are we really expected to take a few hundred more houses in order to justify our school and if we do, will we be "advantaged" or "disadvantaged"?

The European Youth Parliament

The twelfth session of the European Youth Parliament took place in Budapest, Hungary from the 26th February to the 7th March. This organisation gives the youth of Europe a chance to voice their opinions and put forward solutions to current EC problems.

Twelve delegates from various Dublin schools were chosen to represent Ireland. I was selected from Our Lady's School, Templeogue. Each delegate had a different committee issue which had to be studied and researched in preparation for the committee meetings. I was on the Economic Monetary and Industrial Committee and our issue was concerned with the future of the European Monetary System.

The first three days were spent in team building with the fourteen European delegates who made up our committee.

Then it was down to business, and the task of formulating an agreed resolution from the many and varied opinions of the fourteen countries, was finally achieved.

General Assembly took place in the Hungarian Parliament where all resolutions were presented and debated under the strict rules of the Parliament. Happily, most resolutions were adopted, including my committee's, and will go forward for consideration by the European Parliament.

Towards the end of my stay, a "Euroconcert" was staged in which I sang a duet with another Irish delegate. This was attended by delegates and host families. My host family were exceptionally kind and helpful.

All too quickly it was time to say goodbye to all my new European friends. I was also leaving the historic and uniquely beautiful city on the Danube. Budapest is indeed struggling after its years of communism but it boasts many fine buildings and friendly people.

I will always be grateful for having had the opportunity to partake in such an event. Thanks is due to Mr. Sean Landers of Sancta Maria College for his efforts in making it such a success.

KNOCKLYON COMMUNITY COUNCIL NEWS

4th March 1993 saw the start of a new year for the Knocklyon Community Council, and with it the election of a new chairman and some new and some old members.

At this meeting, many contentious issues of the past year were carried forward:

 POST-PRIMARY SCHOOL: As we have had no communication from the Department of Education since the departure of former Minister Seamus Brennan we are endeavouring to obtain a definite answer from the new Minister – Ms. Niamh Breathnach. We understand she has put the provision of a new Post-Primary School on hold.

 HOUSING AT BALLYCRAGH: We have objected to this proposed development of 880 houses on the grounds of lack of infrastructure, traffic chaos, abandonment of open space, etc. We have enlisted the support of local Councillors and hopefully a new satisfactory decision

will be reached.

 REALIGNMENT OF BALLYCULLEN/KNOCKLYON ROADS AND POSITION OF FOOTBRIDGE OVER SCR MOTORWAY: Dublin County Council Roads Department had a site meeting with our Planning Convenor and a second meeting to advise the whereabouts of the footbridge on the new Motorway. With regard to the alignment of the Ballycullen/Knocklyon Roads, we have been advised that this will commence in the near future.

 PURSUIT OF OPEN SPACE: We are still on the trail of pursuing open space for pitches in the rapidly expanding area of Knocklyon.

Some new issues which arose at our meeting were:

 HALTING SITES: It has come to our attention through our Local Councillors that Dublin County Council propose building three halting sites next year – two are destined for our environs_at Stocking Lane and the other at Ballyboden. We already have two such sites – one at Daletree, Ballycullen Road and another at Cherryfield Way, Firhouse Road. The members of the Dublin County Council are to meet to discuss this and we will have more information after this meeting.

 D.T.I. – DUBLIN TRANSPORT INITIATIVE: This body of people propose running a quality bus service from the City Centre to Tallaght via Templeogue. We have written to them requesting that they route the buses through Templeogue and Firhouse Road to Tallaght to

benefit our residents. We are awaiting a reply.

The Knocklyon Community Council represents all the Local Associations of Knocklyon and is made up of representatives of local Residents' Associations and sporting groups, independent bodies and many others. In the present climate of development in Knocklyon we have many Residents' Associations represented on the Council, however we need more to keep everybody informed. We meet every first Thursday of the month in the Presbytery and we invite new groups to be associated with the Council.

LIFE AFTER SCHOOL



This month's contributor is Kevin Collins of Templeroan, who is a 3rd year Civil Law Student at U.C.D.

The law degree, or Bachelor of Civil Law (BCL), is one of the most popular courses at U.C.D. but without the huge intake of students characteristic of the other main degree courses at U.C.D. As only 150 students are admitted each year the entry requirements are quite high (510 points in 1992).

I found the course interesting and very different from the impression that I had formed before I left school. Don't get me wrong, I didn't say that law was exciting but nor is it boring. Subjects range from jurisprudence (legal philosophy) to revenue law, criminal law to African law with a wide choice in between so you get the chance to do whatever you

find most interesting.

Career options are just as varied but the more widely trodden paths to success and riches are the jobs of solicitor and barrister. To become a solicitor requires thee years apprenticeship to a solicitor after the law degree. Unfortunately such apprenticeships are few and far between right now so competition is tough. Equally difficult but more glamorous is the barristers' profession for which you must find a master to "devil" for after graduation. Even after devilling for the required two years it is difficult to survive without a regular supply of clients referred by solicitors.

During the three years at college, as the average law student has only 10 hours a week of lectures there is plenty of time for extra-curricular activities. The typical law student joins the Law Society, which is one of the biggest college debating unions and perhaps lends a hand at the college's Free Legal Advice Centre where students can get free legal advice from law students about their problems. Aside from these activities there are hundreds of clubs and societies to occupy even the most adventurous of students. Of these I found the Canoe Club the best. The club provides all of the equipment necessary to hurtle down white water rivers at terrifying speeds once a week at least, as well as weekends away and indeed weeks away on canoeing expeditions but as any member will tell you the social aspect of the club is just as important. In the first week at college you are bombarded with advice about how to enjoy college and the best bit of such advice is to join lots of clubs and societies and get involved. As well as developing interesting hobbies you can meet thousands of new people. The old adage "your college years are the best years of your life" is cliched but true.

COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

- DOG WARDENS: The I.S.P.C.A. currently employ four Dog Wardens for County Dublin, one of which is assigned to the South Dublin Area. This Dog Warden operates from Wenden Kennels which provides kennelling arrangements for dogs seized and impounded by the Dog Warden in the course of his duties. The setting up of this arrangement was necessitated by the closure of the Cats and Dogs Home in 1991. Wenden facilities have been inspected by the I.S.P.C.A. and have been found to be satisfactory. Dublin County Council has entered this arrangement with the I.S.P.C.A. for the exercise of its functions under the Control of Dogs Act 1986.
- LOCAL HISTORY BOOK: Knocklyon I.C.A. have received a grant of £500 from Dublin County Council's Arts Scheme towards publication of their local history book.
- KNOCKCULLEN LAWN: Following local requests trees which were badly located on Knockcullen Lawn have been re-transplanted.
- NAMEPLATES: Nameplates for Idrone Avenue and Knocklyon Grove have been requisitioned and will be erected as soon as possible.
- BALLYCULLEN ROAD/FIRHOUSE ROAD
 JUNCTION: The signalizing of this junction with
 linking to the Firhouse Bridge Junction has been
 included with the proposed signalization of the Balrothery Roundabout which will be forwarded as soon
 as possible to the Department of the Environment for
 approval and funding.
- FIRHOUSE ROAD PARKING: Cllr. Muldoon has brought the parking problems on Firhouse Road to the attention of the County Council. The problems are occurring opposite Ballyboden/St. Enda's G.A.A. Club where cars are being parked on the grass verge and cycle lane. The Council is writing to the Club to ask them to encourage members and visiting teams to use the Club's own car park. The public should now note that parking and driving on grass margins, footpaths and cycleways is an offence and the Gardai have been requested to have this location examined.

- SOUTHERN CROSS ROUTE: Approval has been received for the Knocklyon Road/Ballycullen Road improvement schemes. Tenders will be advertised shortly with a view to having a contractor on site in autumn 1993. Dublin County Council are hopeful that work on the Southern Cross Route can commence in 1994.
- KNOCKFIELD MANOR TAKING IN CHARGE: All outstanding works in relation to the roads and services in Knockfield Manor have been completed satisfactorily and the preparation of drawings to enable a recommendation for taking in charge to issue is currently in hands. The development of the open space is the one outstanding issue. The developer's representative failed to consult with Parks Section to agree the open space works to be undertaken. He is again being requested to have the development of the open space carried out and, in that connection, to consult with Parks Section. If so response is forthcoming consideration will be given to the initiation of legal proceedings.
- WOODFIELD ESTATE: Works to bring Woodfield Estate Phase I to taking-in-charge standard are in progress and a meeting has been arranged on site between the developer and the Building Control Section to review progress and to expedite the remaining remedial works. House building has not been completed in Phase II but some of the works required for taking-in-charge purposes have been carried out in conjunction with house building. When house building is complete a full taking-in-charge survey will be carried out and the developer will be supplied with a list of outstanding works.
- ACCESS TO DEPT. OF EDUCATION LANDS FROM ORLAGH GROVE: Dublin County Council has advised that it is essential that the gate between numbers 16 and 17 at this location be retained to give access to grass cutting machinery until an alternative suitable vehicular access to the lands is provided off the Scholarstown Road. It confirmed that pitches would neither be provided nor allocated on these lands until this alternative access was in place. When the access has been provided the gate between house numbers 16 and 17 will be removed, the post and chainlink fence will be extended and both sides of the fence will be planted up with suitable hedgerow material.

Warrington Aftermath

I was impressed, as I'm sure everyone was by the courageous stand taken by Dublin woman Susan McHugh, who, feeling enough-was-enough, challenged the ugly face of murderous terrorism which is being carried out purportedly in our name, both in England and Northern Ireland. We should not be too amazed that one woman, who regards berself as just a bousewife, mother and childminder was able to tune into our emotional waves of revulsion and despair and turn them into ones of reconciliation and bope.

Her words "I am merely doing what others are thinking" stirred my conscience. I was one of the thinkers, one of the silent majority. Inspired by ber ideals, I was moved into action, albeit in a much less dramatic and impressive way.

All of us bave the capacity to make changes for the better in our own and others' lives. It need not necessarily involve tackling the greater issues of sectarian violence, bigotry or injustice. Rather it can begin in small, but equally valuable, ways by challenging our own outlook on life, within ourselves, our families, our community and our city.

We can achieve this by grouping together to pool our resources of intelligence and experience, and encourage, support and above all listen to each other in a bond of trust and friendship. With effort and determination we too can become actors rather than re-actors, leaders rather than followers.
