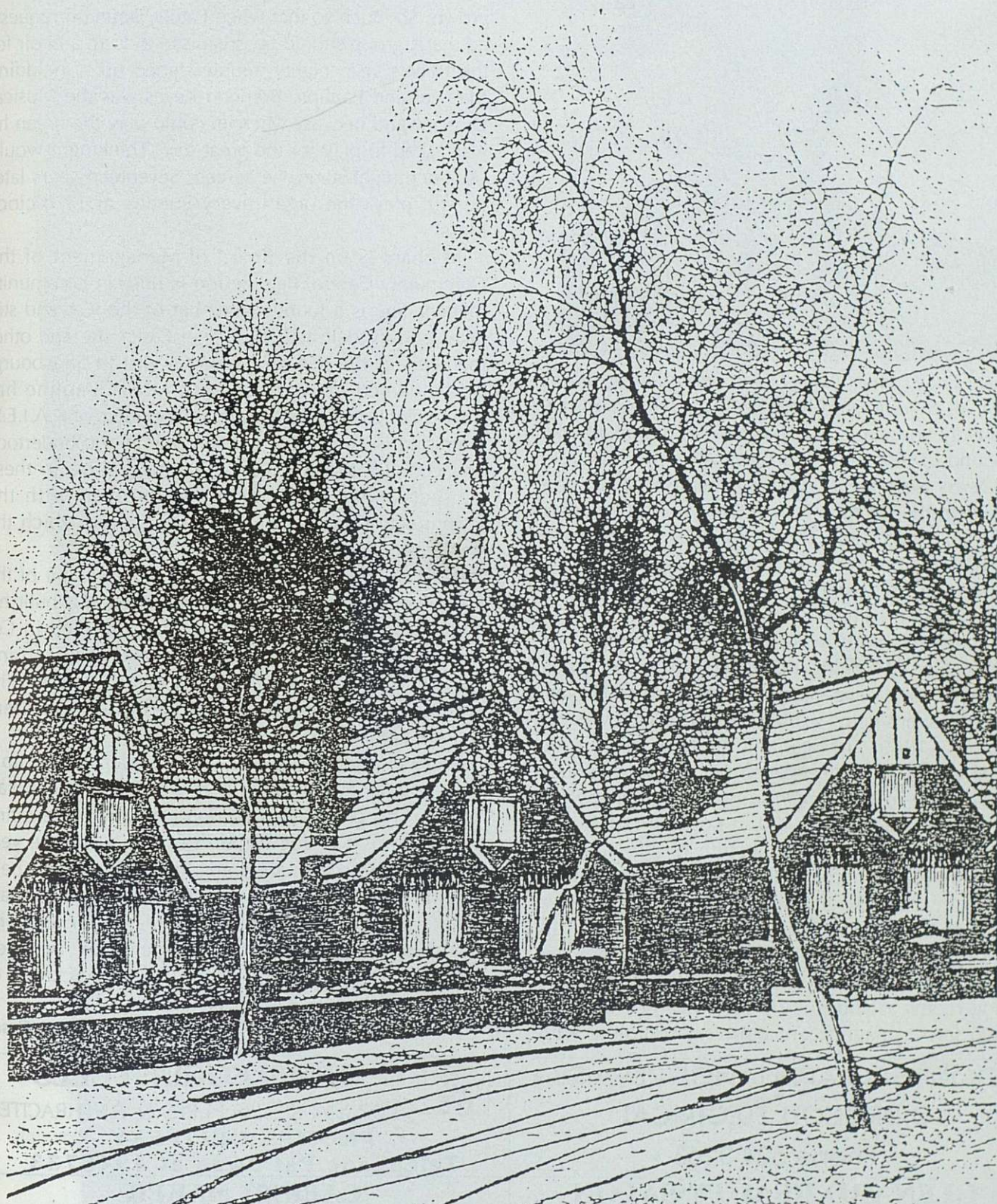

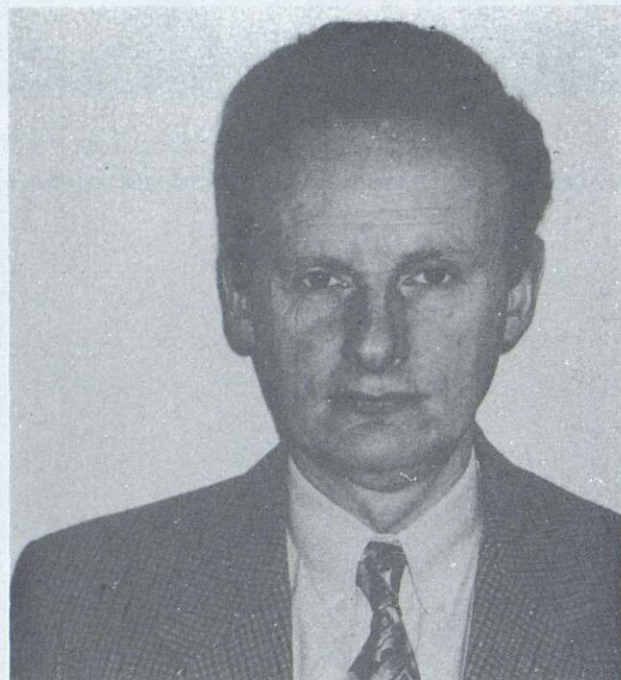

Michael - Maestro of Sound & Speed



Michael Sheedy has always been interested in music. As a small child he must have been very conscious that the Sheedy household reverberated day and night with the sound of tunes old and new. Why you may ask? The answer is simple. Michael's father owned a Dance Hall where the Ramona Dance Band played Ceilidhe, Old Time, Modern and Traditional music. Those were the days when the 'Ballroom of Romance' caught the imagination of the young people of the country, who thronged the dance halls of every town.

Michael was born in Roscrea, Co. Tipperary and was educated at the local Christian Brothers School. He soon became quite expert as a pianist but although he loved his music, the world of entertainment was not for him. In 1969, after gaining his Leaving Cert. he entered University College Dublin where he graduated with a degree in Civil Engineering. Shortly afterwards he joined the staff of Irish Rail in Rosslare Harbour as Engineer responsible for Inspection of the Harbour. During his years of service there, many changes took place. Thirty acres of land were reclaimed from the sea in order to make more berths for incoming ships. This cost 8 million pounds. The dingy, dismal passenger service block which housed the entrance, exit and waiting rooms to and from le Havre Ferry was transformed into a magnificent building complete with

restaurant, bar and seating lounge which must surely be the envy of many a continental Port. Michael is proud that he was part of a team that planned and worked to make Rosslare Harbour the attractive and efficient place it is today.

It was during these years that he met and married his wife, Pauline and in 1975 they moved to Delaford. They both remember the old times in Knocklyon when everyone in Knocklyon knew each other and appeared to be one big happy family. By 1979 the Parish had grown. So much so that when Father Staunton requested that a group should be organised to form a choir for the Pope's visit, eighty people signed up - including Michael and Pauline. Brendan Keyes was the Musical Director and because Michael could play the organ he was asked to play for the great day. Thinking it would be a one night stand, he agreed. Seventeen years later he still plays the organ every Sunday at 11 o'clock Mass!

Michael is on the Board of Management of the Community Centre. Pauline too is busy in community matters. She is a founder member of the ICA and still takes part in their activities. After Easter she and other members of the ICA are paying a visit to Strasbourg, accompanied by Mary Banotti, M.E.P. Pauline has many talents and was among the founders of K.A.I.E.S. Interested in Social and Human studies she undertook and completed a two year Diploma Course in these subjects. She is very actively involved with the Community Centre, organising courses for which the Centre provides the facilities.

In 1989, Michael proceeded to change a bit of the Knocklyon landscape when he designed and built his own house on the first Registered plot of land in Co. Dublin. It took seven months before Michael and Pauline said goodbye to Delaford and moved into the Avenue where they now live with their children, Deirdre and Kevin.

In 1994 Michael left Rosslare Harbour to take up a new post as Senior Engineer with LUAS Light Rail Transit. This project will no doubt be another exciting one for him. It is due to be in operation by the year 2000. For those who are going to benefit, it must be a dream come true. In the meantime we wish Michael every success in this venture, but maybe someday he might be able to suggest a 'branch line' between Tallaght and Dundrum - stopping at Knocklyon of course. What about it Michael?

As reported in the media Archbishop Desmond Connell decided recently that a diocesan women's forum should be set up. This followed a recommendation made to him by the Dublin Council of Priests that a suitable forum should be set up whereby women can dialogue both with the Archbishop and bishops of the diocese and with the Priests Council on issues of common concern.

Following an announcement made at all Masses in Knocklyon church on Sunday 28 January last a meeting was held on Wednesday 31 January at which two parish representatives were elected to go forward to a Deanery meeting viz., Catherine Donohue (Idrone) and Catherine Collins (Templeroan). At the Deanery meeting they met the elected representatives of the other ten parishes in the Deanery. Marie Martin of St. Jude's Willington parish was elected to represent our Deanery on the diocesan forum. There are sixteen deaneries in the Archdiocese each of which will have a representative on the diocesan forum. The two representatives of Knocklyon parish will continue to attend Deanery meetings.

It is now proposed to set up a women's parish forum in Knocklyon at which women in this parish may express their views on issues of concern to us as members of the Church. The two representatives would liaise between the parish forum and the Deanery. A meeting will accordingly be held in the Iona Room, Pastoral Centre, on **Wednesday 13 March at 8 o'clock p.m.** All women in the parish are invited to attend.

This is an exciting development in Church history and it is hoped that all the women in our parish will be part of it.

SCHOOL NEWS

SENIOR SCHOOL

February has been an action packed month here at the Senior School. We have had a couple of very enjoyable, educational and worthwhile visits.

One of these visits was from The Dodder Valley Environment Group. This three-member group is based in Tymon Community School. They visit classes and inform children about aspects of animal and insect life. The visit was most enjoyable for the pupils and teachers. The group members related the story of the animals' habitats, foods and life patterns in a simple, informative way. They involved the children in a thought-provoking question and answer session. The stuffed animals they brought aroused great interest indeed, so life-like was the fox that one teacher was seen to leap at the sight of it in the staffroom!

Another visitor to the school was Garry Henneberry of The Irish Red Cross Society. He talked about various accidents which occur in the primary school and how they might be avoided. The children were encouraged to join a "Safety Squad". These pupils will help to promote safety in the school, in an effort to reduce the number of accidents and learn what to do when injuries do occur. Membership costs £1 and includes a membership card, badge and newsletters.

The Diocesan team of religious advisors visited the school on Friday 16th February. They spent time in each class and explored the main themes of the religious programme with the children through discussion, stories, parables, songs and a guided prayer service. The children enjoyed the experience immensely.

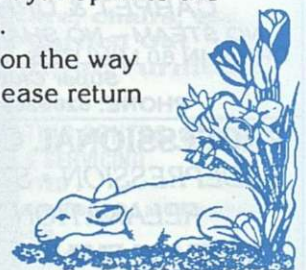

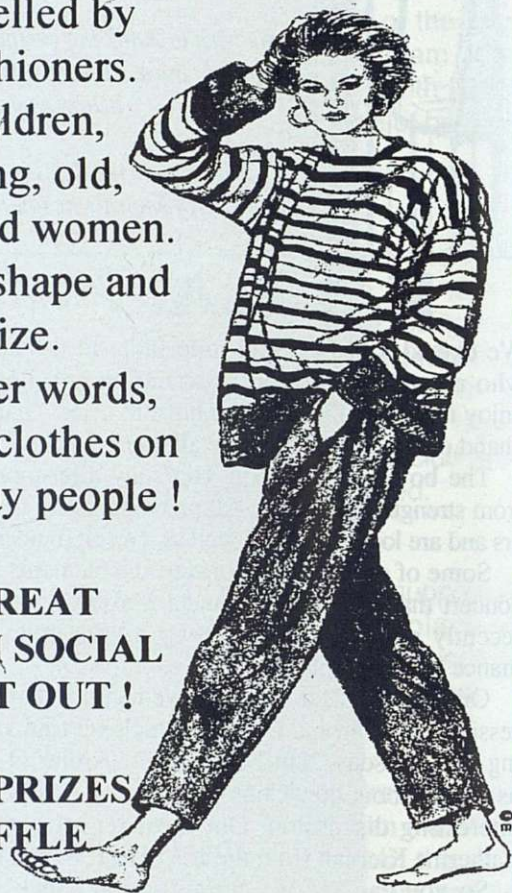

According to a series of questions recently put to the Minister for Education Ms. Niamh Bhreathnach in the Dáil by Deputies Brennan, Kitt, Shatter and O'Donnell, the Minister has, once again, decided not to proceed with the building of our long promised Post Primary School at Scholarstown Road.

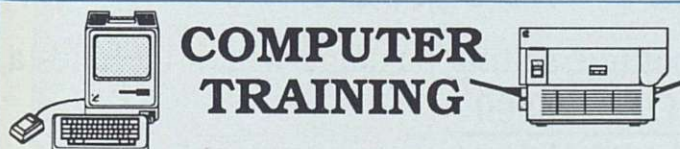
At several levels I am sorry to inform you that this Minister has failed to keep the Post Primary Committee informed or to give us the opportunity to discuss her Department's re-evaluations in the light of our "Independent expert's" report. Our data was conclusive in its evidence that her planners did not appreciate the new house building which took place in Knocklyon since her original decision was made.

Despite her promise to be transparent in all her dealings with us, I regret to say that the very opposite has been the case. It seems that the Minister still retains her view of Knocklyon as a well heeled, advantaged area with little or no problems! Does this reflect your view of our parish? Over the years this committee has campaigned on the streets, on TV, Radio, Newspapers, in the schools and even marched to the Dáil. It seems that once again the people of Knocklyon will have to take stronger action if our case is to be acted upon. A Public Meeting will be held in the near future to decide on the future direction of our campaign.

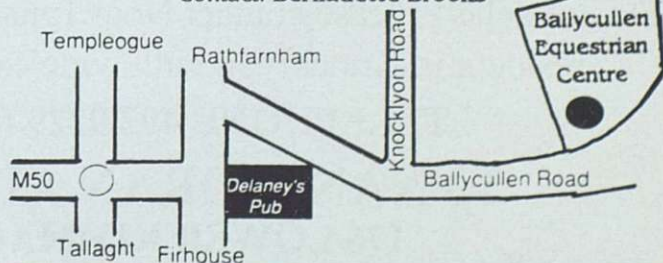

The Brothers Pearse Athletic Club has over 70 children from this parish as active members. Top of the list is Coolamber with 15 children, followed closely by Knockcullen (12) and Templeroan (11). Almost every estate in the parish is represented. Typically, as you might expect, the newer estates have the lowest representation, since the child population there is very young.

If you are thinking of involving your child in athletics you are more than welcome to join them in the training programmes run by the club in Cherryfield on Tuesdays and Thursdays (once the evenings get bright) and on Sunday mornings.

It is interesting to observe the diversity of the boys and girls from the parish from ages 8 to 16. Some are very athletic looking while others are not; some are slow and some fast. Does this mean that only the fast and athletic can participate? Far from it. It is our experience that over time each child will find an event which he or she will enjoy. Some of the slower children can often excel at longer distances or in field sports like the long jump or throwing competitions. Some children participate because they enjoy it and don't necessarily want to compete in a serious way. Athletics is a very good discipline for young children because it teaches them how to lose (at some stage everybody gets beaten in a race and for most children they are regularly out of the medals). Also it is a very good way of keeping your child aerobically fit. So as the sap begins to rise in our veins with the approach of Spring, we are looking forward to getting the children of the Parish out on grass.

Having heard of her involvement with the President's Award scheme we asked young student, and resident Jean Doyle to give us an account of "Gaisce". We hope other young people might be encouraged by her description below.

The President's Award, launched in International Youth Year 1985, is the nation's highest award for young people between the ages of 15 and 25.

To compete each entrant must partake in four different sections; Community Involvement, Personal Skill, Physical Recreation and a Venture Project. The challenge for the Bronze Award involves work in community service as well as in two of the other three sections. The Silver and Gold Awards demand higher degrees of commitment.

Participation in the Awards' Scheme is a suitable extra-curricular activity for students in transition year and upwards. In this case, the school acts as the Operating Body and a teacher or senior student acts as a President's Award Leader (P.A.L.). The task of the leader is to explain the scheme to the participants, help them decide on their activities, introduce them to their trainers, and make sure the challenges agreed are appropriate for the category.

However, if you have left school or if your school does not participate in the scheme an employer, youth club, or community group can act as an Operating Body.

There are a number of young people in the parish taking part in the Gaisce Awards. I am in the process of completing my Bronze Award and the majority of the people I know would be doing likewise. For my community service I help out in the Youth Club on a Friday night. Several of the other leaders in the club have taken part in the Award Scheme. For my physical recreation I have been attending a water safety course which is on once a week. Lastly, for my personal skill, I have chosen photography. There is a world of things in which you can become involved, for example some of my friends are doing modern dance, gymnastics, public speaking, aerobics, piano playing, etc. We began the scheme last October and hope to have it completed by May.

The programmes of the scheme are designed to encourage initiative, self-discipline, leadership, and caring skills in young people. It's demanding, it needs will power, but it's good fun and very rewarding. For further information contact "Gaisce" in Upper O'Connell Street.

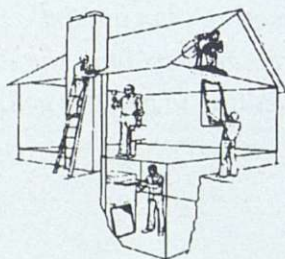
