

Brid O'Connell - Working for our Community



When Brid O'Connell and her husband Tony came to live in Knocklyon, it must have seemed a very different world to the exciting one which they had left behind. Tony's professional life had taken them to far off lands and indeed the early years of their marriage were spent in Nigeria, Afghanistan and Pakistan before they returned to Templeogue and settled in Knocklyon Avenue with their

four children, Anne Marie, John, Ciaran and Colm. At that time, little did Brid know that in moving into Knocklyon she was also moving into the field of helping to build up a new community and Parish, a work in which she would become very actively involved.

One of the first things that Brid did in those growing years was to open her house one morning each week for a Prayer Group meeting. Everyone was welcome especially mothers and young children. In fact she even organised a crèche in another room in the house which was supervised on a rota system. A special Mass was celebrated at prayer meetings several times during the year. This prayer group was a wonderfully peaceful experience and over the years of its existence brought help and happiness to the many people who sought its blessings. It is interesting to note that many of the help services still available to the community at large, were started by former members of this group. They include Parenting Programmes, Baptism Team and Church Shop Helpers, just to name a few.

Getting to know other people is surely the nucleus of a strong community and Brid did not fail us. The first of many happy days together occurred when she invited many families in and around her home to a barbecue in her back garden. It was a glorious summer's day – the games, the laughter, the smell of sizzling sausages, the children's shrieks of delight and the friendships formed, are still fondly remembered.

Brid has worked away quietly through the years never seeking thanks or recognition for her dedication to the well being of our community, temporal and spiritual, but I do know that she is particularly grateful for the growth in the number of Eucharistic Ministers in the parish. In the beginning there were 12. Today there are 80.

The Parish of Knocklyon still continues to grow and because of this, Fr. David saw the need for a permanent centre to provide for the pastoral needs of this growing community. This building would be a Centre for education, culture and spirituality, counselling and support. A friendly place, a meeting centre where people may find hope and in which the laity will continue to build up the Christian community by caring and sharing. Providing for all the needs and interests of the community is its aim.

Over a long period of time, Brid has completed courses in Spirituality, Scripture, The Enneagram, Meditation and Lay Ministry in other Pastoral Centres throughout the country. This challenge of our very own Pastoral Centre gave her the opportunity to make use of the knowledge she had gained. The use of the refurbished Pre-fab as a temporary Pastoral Centre has proved very successful. Already 40 courses have been run since the Centre was opened in 1995, with Brid as Director. The courses are researched and planned by Brid and in their running she has been helped by Aoife O'Tierney, Mary Doyle and Anne Quinn.

Recently the Centre offered a Parent to Parent Drug Prevention Program which was run in conjunction with Coolmine House. It proved of such interest to parents it was necessary to repeat the Program on two more occasions. A further meeting for those who have completed the course is scheduled for the near future when it is hoped to enlist a group of people who would give their time and energy to grapple with the problems of Drug and Alcohol abuse within our area. Theological Coffee Mornings, The Grieving Process, Pondering Faith and The Church at Prayer were some of the courses offered; also a variety of parenting programmes. Later on in the year Brid will whet your appetite with further titles, in the Autumn schedule.

The Pastoral Centre also provides a place for such activities as the Mother and Toddler Group where mums can meet once a week, enjoy a cup of coffee and still be able to keep an eye on their little charges as they play happily together. A Nurse's Clinic is available for pre-school children, run by the Eastern Health Board, and the Centre is also the venue for meetings of all the various Service and Support Groups in the Parish.

Despite her never ending work, Brid and Tony are still fond of holidays abroad. Their most recent journey was an epic one, but one they could not miss. It was a flight to New Zealand to attend the wedding of their son John. "Would you like to live there"? I asked. She looked at me in horror. "Oh no", she said. "I wouldn't live anywhere else in the world but Knocklyon". And for that we are very glad.

GAELSCOIL CHNOC LIAMHNA A Success Story by Treasa Ní Chinnéide

Gaelscoil Chnoc Liamhna is a new all-Irish school which opened in Knocklyon in September 1996. Since then the school has gone from strength to strength.

The founding committee of the school had well defined aims and objectives as to the sort of education they wanted for their children. They sought a high standard of education through the medium of Irish with emphasis on music, culture, drama and sports. The school is living proof of a dream come true.

Gaelscoil Chnoc Liamhna opened with forty pupils and two teachers. The school received full Department of Education recognition prior to commencement. At present the school is situated in temporary accommodation in 'The Scouts Den, Knocklyon'.

The school when fully established will be a small one stream, eight teacher school. The common bond of: an interest and love of the Irish language; a well rounded education system, and the small numbers ensures that Gaelscoil Chnoc Liamhna has a warm friendly

One of the main skills the school seeks to develop in the children is good communication - a must in today's world. Huge emphasis is placed on developing a positive self image among the children, confidence, good listening skills and the ability to concentrate on the task in hand. The children are involved in school concerts, entering competitions, drama and public speaking. Irish dancing is taught in the school as part of our school curriculum and violin is also taught to the older children if their parents so wish.

The parents have organised numerous 'Margadh Cisti' (Cake Sales) in the area. The school has hosted a number of highly successful 'Céilís' and at the moment the Finance Committee, which plans to build prefabs for the coming academic year is busy planning a 70's night to be held before the end of June. These events are much more than mere school fundraisers - they are highly enjoyable social occasions and the chance for parents to brush up on their 'cúpla focail'.

It is not essential that parents of pupils are fluent in Irish, but this is of course a great help. What is of vital importance is that parents and their children have a great love and interest in our 'Ceanga Dúchais' and a commitment to education through the medium of

Another local Author to explore

Biography of Delia Murphy written by parishioner, Aidan O'Hara

"Her main contribution was that she made us all feel that we could respectably sing our own songs." That is how Liam Clancy of the Clancy Brothers summed up the impact Delia Murphy's recordings made in bringing about the revival of Irish Music. His statement is taken from I'll Live till I Die – the Story of Delia Murphy, a biography of Ireland's most famous ballad singer, recently published by Drumlin Publications. The amazing story of this girl from a farm in the west of Ireland who became the toast of the international diplomatic circuit was written by parishioner, Aidan O'Hara, writer, broadcaster, and a friend of Delia's during her last years in Canada.

Delia Murphy became the first real home-grown pop star that Ireland produced, and she did it singing the songs of Ireland. This was at a time when Irish music was regarded as definitely inferior by some, and less than respectable by others. But the achievements of the girl who had the whole country singing *If I were a blackbird* and *Three lovely lassies from Bannion* did not stop there.

At the height of her popularity she left Ireland with her ambassador husband, Dr. T.J. Kiernan, to charm diplomats and government leaders in many countries. In Rome during the second World War she got herself involved in the underground network set up by the famous Monsignor O'Flaherty to help escaped Allied POWs, anti-Fascists and others on the run from the Gestapo and the SS. Meanwhile she was entertaining Il Duce himself, Benito Mussolini, and top German generals.

The book tells her fascinating story in the chatty intimate way that Delia would have told it herself. It will revive fond memories for those many thousands who remember her distinctive singing style and vivacious personality. Through her songs, Delia Murphy brought a bright and shining new hope in the 1930s, '40s and '50, and people gained a renewed pride in their rich heritage of Irish Song.

Editor's Note: We wish Aidan much success with this book and hope parishioners will enjoy reading it.

Our most recent meeting was held on the 1st of May 1997.

Our annual Church Gate collection will take place this coming weekend - 24/25th May. We would ask local people to give as generously as possible to their local Community Council.

"Environmental Week" is under way since the 19th and will continue until the 24th of May throughout the parish. Saturday (24th) is tidy up/clean up day. Teresa Clarke, the Convenor of the Environment Committee, outlined her plans for the coming year at our last meeting. They include the Environment Week in which all Residents' Associations were asked to participate if they did not already organise a similar event in their own estate. All Associations who are members of the K.C.C. will have their estates included in the Tidy Estate competition. You will remember that Orlagh Grove Estate won this competition last year. The criteria for this competition will be on display on the noticeboard in Superquinn. The Environment Committee aims to raise the consciousness of everyone in Knocklyon to their local environment. Also included is a schools participation programme.

A priority of this group is to have Knocklyon Road resurfaced from the traffic lights at the junction of Firhouse Road all the way up the hill to Dargle Wood Estate. This road is in a bad state of repair. Representations will be made to our local councillors regarding Tree Pruning and cleaning of gullies etc. We would appeal to residents not to dump rubbish in open spaces or land adjacent to housing.

A public forum will be held regarding the Southern Cross Route and traffic management proposals for same in late June. Details in next issue.

The Representative to the K.C.C. from Knocklyon United, Mr Finbarr Dolan, has stepped down from the K.C.C. due to business and other commitments. Finbarr has played a very central role on the executive for the last six years. We wish him and Knocklyon Utd. well in the future.

K.C.C. compliment Dublin Bus for its extension of the 49 Bus route into the new Ballycullen developments and surrounding areas.

Planning permission has been granted (subject to 18 conditions) to the Esso station on Knocklyon Road for a major refurbishment job. The K.C.C. will be examining these conditions to see whether there is a case for appeal to an Bord Pleanála.

The K.C.C. has contacted the County Council in relation to the trees in the area that are protected by law from being felled. We are anxious to have a list prior to the construction of the Southern Cross Route.

Colmcille

After a life devoted to the service of God. St. Colmcille while in exile on long went to his eternal reward on June 9th, 597. The 1400th anniversary of his death is being marked in various ways throughout Ireland and Britain. Naturally enough most of the events are in places associated with St. Colmcille but there is widespread recognition of the very significant role which he played in spreading the Christian faith both here in Ireland, in Scotland, and indirectly, in Northumbria. In the Parish of Knocklyon the Church, the Primary School and the Pastoral Centre are named after the saint. The Holy Well on Ballycullen Road is associated with Colmcille. This year in particular it is hoped that many parishioners will participate in the annual celebration at the well which will take place on Sunday, June 8, at 4 p.m.

CELEBRATIONS IN DERRY

In the Diocese of Derry and Raphoe special church services, including novenas, are to take place in parishes associated with Colmcille. In Derry novenas are to end with a Tridium of Prayer in St. Columb's, Waterside; St. Eunan's Cathedral; and St. Columba's Church, Long Tower. The Papal Legate, Cardinal Winning, will preach at Mass in St. Columb's and the ceremony will be televised on UTV. At 9.30 p.m. on Monday, June 9th, a service will be held in Guildhall Square, Derry. Civic dignitories and Christians of all denominations have been invited to attend. Members of the Methodist Conference and Anglican pilgrims travelling from Rome and others associated with St. Augustine have declared their intention to do so.



CONFERENCE IN DERBY

A Conference in Magee College, University of Ulster, Derry, will take place from 4th to 7th July. There will be about 25 speakers on various aspects of the life and times of Colmcille.

A pilgrimage from Derry to long takes place this month.

Anne McVeight Sister of Mercy, Derry The statue at St. Colmcille's Well. Ballycullen Road. was unveiled on June 9th, 1920. Coin Mac Néill gave an address in Irish to the gathering of priests and laity. In earlier years Pádraig MacPiarais visited the Well. The annual celebration takes place on Sunday, June 8th at 4 p.m.



EXHIBITION AT TRINITY COLLEGE

To mark the 1400th anniversary of the death of Colmcille Trinity College Library mounted a very special exhibition which brought together three superb examples of Celtic illuminated manuscripts associated with Colmcille, namely the Book of Kells, the Book of Durrow and the Cathach and its shrine. The gospel books produced in Durrow and Kells were made in honour of their founders—the former in the early 8th century and the latter in the early part of the following century. The Cathach containing folios of Psalms was encased in the ornamental shrine made in Ceanannas (Kells) in the late 11th century.




ST. COLUMBA'S COLLEGE

St. Columba's College in Stackallen House, Rathfarnham, was opened in 1843. It was a governor named Todd who suggested that the

college should be named after Colmcille. In the chapel there is a fine stained glass window depicting the saint. He is also depicted on the college notepaper and on medals. The college's motto derives directly from him.

THE NAMES OF THE SAINT

In his Life of Colmcille Mánus Ó Domhnaill says that Colmcille was baptised Criomhthain (the old Irish for fox) but that he was subsequently named Colm (a dove) and that children added 'cille' (of the church) to his name. This story is repeated in An Leabhar Laigheanach (The Book of Leinster). Adhamhnán, Abbot of Iona in his Life of Colmcille, says that he had the same name as Jonah the prophet ... in the Latin tongue translated Columba (dove) ... and that it was appropriate for one with his dove-like disposition.



IN THE WAKE OF COLMCILLE

On the first weekend of this month a specially built currach sailed from the coast of Donegal to Toraigh. On June 9 the currach Colmcille will leave for long. It will have a crew of thirteen drawn from various religious backgrounds, nationality, gender and age. The boat was built by Eddie Hutch of Dingle and the design was based on the Kerry naomhóg. This project is being organised by the Portrush-based Causeway Coast Maritime Heritage Group. Robin Ruddock believes that if we study the life and legacy of Colmcille we will find much of relevance to us today. Through the voyage and use of the currach those behind the project hope to build bridges between communities and help the process of peace. Voyagers of the currach will link up the coastal communities of Donegal, Derry and the Inner Hebrides.

In 1963 a crew of thirteen made the voyage from Portrush to lona to commemorate the 1400th anniversary of the voyage made by Colmcille.



Down District Council is holding a four day Conference at the Slieve Donard Hotel, Newcastle, Co. Down from June 8 to 11. It will discuss St. Patrick, St. Colmcille and the wider legacy of the Celtic church in Europe. Chere will be visits to Saul and Inch Abbey.

COMMEMORATIVE STAMPS

When the Royal Mail in the UK issued stamps to commemorate Colmcille questions were asked about the intentions of An



Post. A spokesperson said that it would not be commercially viable to issue a stamp in memory of Colmcille. Under pressure from public opinion it was eventually decided to issue a Colmcille stamp, later this year.

CELEBRATIONS IN DONEGAL

On June 7 President Mary Robinson will visit the Heritage Centre in Gartán, believed to be the birthplace of Colmcille. On June 8 the Diocesan Celebration will take place in the Cathedral of St. Eunan and St. Colmcille in Letterkenny, Co. Donegal. There will be an Evening Commemoration Service in St. Columba's Church. Gartán. In the mid-afternoon the Donegal County Council will host a reception at the Colmcille Heritage Centre, Gartán. In the late afternoon there will be an Interdenominational Commemoration. In the evening there will be a programme of music and entertainment. During September, October and November a Colmcille Exhibition will be on view in the Donegal Museum, Letterkenny.



BIRR CHIRCEEN HUNDRED

BIRR CHIRCEEN HUNDRED has organised a 'Celebration of Cain Adamnain' which will take place in Birr, Co. Offaly from June 26 to 29. Adhamhnán, an Abbot of Iona, intervened on behalf of women and children in violent society and the legislation which he inspired and which became known as Cain Adhamhnáin had a significant impact in Europe. The Birr Conference will be opened by President Mary Robinson. A full programme of lectures and discussions will follow. On Sunday, June 29 there will be a coach and boat trip from Birr to Clonmacnoise and back.

That's the gift that King Solomon asked from God. And God was so pleased with him for asking that He gave him riches and gifts beyond measure, besides.

An understanding heart! Something way beyond wisdom or cleverness or knowledge or insight. Rather are we dealing in empathy, compassion, acceptance, real love! Understanding breaks down barriers, heals wounds, brings comfort. And when understanding is full and mutual in a relationship, you have the nearest thing to heaven on earth.

Kahlil Gibran, as usual, says it beautifully: "Your neighbour is your other self dwelling behind a wall. In understanding, all walls shall fall down". For, as the Little Prince insists: "It is only with the heart that one sees rightly; what is essential is invisible to the eye".

If only we could accord to others, even the level of tolerance, forgiveness and acceptance we rightly give ourselves, not only would we be living the truth, but we would savour the peace and inner freedom that truth alone can bring. Listen again to Gibran: "Who knows but that your neighbour is your better self wearing another body? See that you love him as you would love vourself".

Ask yourself, what quality do you most admire in others; most appreciate in your friends (without which indeed, you would not hold your friends 'real' or 'true'). The answer, infallibly - an understanding heart!




