





IRELAND - THAT AT MEATH PLACE, DUBLIN. 1684.







WITH THE 1860 ADDITION, AS SEEN BELOW, ON LEFT.







A QUAIN T RURAL EXAMPLE OF FRIENDS' ARCHITECTURE

FERNOS, CO. WEXFORD, ERECTED IN 1776.






EUSTACE ST. DUBLIN, MEETING HOUSE, AND BELOW
