KNOCKLYON GUIILD OF ICA CELEBRATES TWENTY YEARS

When the ICA held their annual Coffee Evening recently for Our Lady's Hospice we discovered that it is exactly 20 years since the Knocklyon Guild was set up. We asked a few of the members to share with us memories of the past two decades, and discovered that back in 1984 the person responsible for the launch of the Guild was Kathleen Ní Mhurchú who is still a prominent member. A Ladies Committee and a Ladies' Club was already in place and most of those women went on to join the ICA. Very soon the Guild catered for 100 members, and a waiting list had to be introduced. Since 1984 the ICA has gone from strength to strength, and bonds of friendship have been sealed for life.

When the ICA was founded in 1910 its purpose was to bring women together, and through their cooperation endeavour to improve the standard of rural and urban life in Ireland. The Knocklyon women make sure this aim is being achieved. They have excelled in the areas of drama, arts and crafts, cookery and personal achievement. A most worthwhile project in the arts and crafts area is a magnificent patchwork quilt created by them which hangs in the ICA College, An Grianán, in Co. Louth. This is a venue which provides ICA members with all kinds of courses, and most of the local Guild try to visit at least once a year – usually during 'The Dublin Week' – a popular event.

The ICA meet on the first and third Tuesday of each month and on these nights activities can range

Their successful projects include the research and writing of The History of Knocklyon in 1992, the sponsorship of two children in the Special Olympics last year, and the ongoing fund-raising for Our Lady's Hospice. Indeed it was during this recent Hospice Evening on 2nd November that Sr. Xaviour attended and told us of the wonderful work that is being carried out there. On that evening members were delighted that Fr. Philip popped in to support the cause (we think he was among the raffle prizewinners too!).

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It's Christmas. Why Rush?

Henry Thoreau once wrote, "Nothing can be more useful to a man or woman than a determination not to be hurried." We're all so uneasy, in a hurry. There is so much to be done, jobs to be completed, deadlines to be met, calls to be made and promises to keep! We seem to be way behind schedule, whatever that is meant to mean.

God made time but we try to take over. Doctors tell us that hurrying is not good for the health. It is regarded as a form of violence exercised upon time. It seems a pity, but it's true for many, that making and living and having a life are not the same things.

Samuel Beckett in his rather unusual play, Waiting For Godot, acknowledges that passing the time is for many of us a primary problem. We don't like waiting. Instead of waiting we talk about killing time. I suppose that's alright for those who like their time dead! He explores the paradox of the human condition that we so fear death while we search desperately to shorten the time while we wait for it! He does this rather hilariously. The characters on stage tell stories to pass the time and then they worry

what to do next. In that play, through a miracle of art, we can enjoy looking at ridiculous aspects of ourselves, however painful that may be.

As Christmas approaches we stop to reflect that lesus came to bridge the gap between God and ourselves. Christianity is about relationship. That should enable us to look with new eyes at the reality around us. Must we rush in to buy things that may be of no practical value when Christmas is over? Something inside us seems to despise the ordinary and we become star-struck, celebrity obsessed, believing that those are blessed who are forever young, forever rich, forever good-looking, forever healthy, forever important and forever busy. It's more our busyness than our badness that's the problem.

It's the feast of the Incarnation and we should seek for a sense of the sacred in our lives. There is so much beauty in the world that we miss as we hurry by and beauty has power to transform the soul. It is the greatest of all teachers. I envy artists, poets and those who have artistic gifts in so many disciplines in life. There is a strong relationship between art and spirituality. To experience beauty is to glimpse something of God. He speaks through beauty and so must we. Addressing peoples' anxieties, Jesus pointed to the life of the lilies of the field and the birds of the air.

Christmas has become a bit too commercialised, don't you think? It can still be a magical time. As we prepare to celebrate Christ among us this Christmas we might spare a moment of our time to think of how best to spend our time and money.

We cannot do everything, And there is a sense of liberation in realising that. This enables us to do something, And to do it very well. It may be incomplete but is a beginning. A step along the way, An opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter And to rest. We may never see the end results, But that is the difference between The master builder and the worker. We are workers, not master builders. Ministers, not messiahs. We are prophets of a future not our own.

KNOCKLYON HISTORY SOCIETY

Lecture: Marsh's Library Wednesday, 10th November, 2004

Knocklyon History Society's November lecture on Marsh's Library, given by Dr. Muriel McCarthy was as usual very well attended. Dr. McCarthy, Keeper of the Library gave an enthusiastic account of the life of Archbishop Narcissus Marsh (1638-1713) who founded the library in 1701. He was a very learned man of broad interests and was inspired to found the library when as Provost of Trinity College he observed that it was very difficult to use the college library.

Marsh's Library is situated in St. Patrick's Close. We were given a vivid description of the interior of the library with its beautiful dark oak book cases, each with carved and lettered gables, topped by a mitre and the three elegant wire alcoves or 'cages' where the readers were locked with rare books. This interior hasn't changed since the library was built over 300 years ago.

The library holds four main collections consisting of 25,000 books relating to the 16th, 17th and early 18th centuries. These four are the library of Edward Stillingfleet (1635-1699) Bishop of Worcester, the library of Archbishop Marsh himself, the books of Dr. Elias Bouhéreau, a Huguenot refugee from France who became the first librarian and the books of John Stearne (1660-1745) Bishop of Clogher. There are also about 300 manuscripts.

Contained in the library as well is the Delmas Conservation Bindery which restores and repairs rare books and manuscripts and also prints, drawings, watercolours and maps.

Dr. McCarthy's talk was very informative and entertaining and was much enjoyed by all present.

Our next talk, 'A Story of Sweets and Their Manufacture in Dublin' will be given by Anna Brioscú on Wednesday, 15th December, at 7.45 p.m. in the Iona Centre.

Strictly Come Dancing (in Knocklyon)!!!

However, most of you won't be aware that we have our own ballroom dance classes here in Knocklyon. Yvonne Deaton, who is a qualified fellow of the International Dance Teachers Association, has been teaching in Knocklyon Community Centre since it opened in 1989. Yvonne teaches several classes every week from the toddlers classes for 3-8 year olds where children are taught basic steps associated with the waltz, tango, cha cha cha, jive, etc., through to teenagers who become competent in ballroom and Latin dances and compete in many different events throughout the year.

Yvonne has also been a great supporter of KAIES, the Adult Education Body operating in Knocklyon, and teaches adults of all ages how to dance. These courses are attended by couples looking for an activity they can enjoy together, couples preparing for their wedding day, and people interested in learning to dance for the sheer enjoyment it brings. Yvonne says dancing is wonderful exercise, you can keep fit while enjoying learning to dance to fabulous music. Never again will you have to sit out that waltz or jive at the next wedding or dinner dance, you'll be dancing the night away!

With all the recent emphasis on obesity in Ireland, and the need to increase the amount of exercise we take, maybe we should consider taking up dancing as a hobby. Whether you go


For the gospels to "come alive" for us, it helps enormously if we have even a little insight into each book, its structure, its style, its author, its content, and the very different personalities whose names are



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


JUNIOR SCHOOL NEWS


higher than Junior Infants next September should apply immediately. Application forms may be completed at the school office.


The St. Colmcille's S.N.S. Book Fair


Senior School News


The Graffiti Classics

BACK TO SCHOOL

The glossy leaflet fell softly onto the doormat. As I picked it up I made myself a cup of coffee and reclined in a comfortable chair to peruse the latest courses on offer.

The brochure was entitled KAIES Day and Evening Courses. KAIES stands for Knocklyon Adults in Educational Studies. I was particularly interested in the morning courses. Having packed in my job back in April, I was no longer juggling work and children.

There were fifteen morning and ten evening courses to choose from. Courses ranged from Indian Head Massage to Silk Painting. I was surprised at the variety. I eventually decided on two – the Relaxation/Meditation course on Mondays and the Creative Writing on Thursdays.

The times suited me, the children would be at school and I wouldn't have to brave the dark cold evening nights as I had done in the past. The fact that the courses were being held within walking distance certainly helped my decision.

As I enrolled for the classes I bumped into Angela, one of the ten KAIES Committee Members. She explained that they were a voluntary and non-profit making organisation working for the community.

The group was established twelve years ago and took some risks in offering courses that were not available elsewhere at the time. Golf and wine-tasting were some of the courses that KAIES had the foresight to run.

About four years ago they ran a Belly Dancing class and RTE arrived to catch the fun on film. Angela and her daughter had decided to attend the course. A close-up shot of Angela's smiling face followed by a shot of a perfectly toned torso had nothing to do with editing, she explained with a smile!

The committee members work hard at particular times of the year. Getting the brochures ready for the September and January deadlines is just one of their many tasks. They also organise tutors, insurance and balance the books. Each committee member is delegated at least one course to monitor. This aids in the decision-making process for the following terms programming. The committee are

The TV crew came a second time to Knocklyon. This time to interview a couple who had met on the Wine Tasting course. Maybe this is one of the reasons this course has been one of the most successful ever run by KAIES.


Each year the committee organises an open evening where they display and sell the art work and floral arrangements produced by the students. Some of the proceeds are donated to charity. Perhaps the creative writing group could compile a selection of their best work for this evening also!

A course that has proved very popular is the NUI Certificate in Counselling. This runs for 30 weeks and is the most expensive course on offer at over $\leq 1,000$. Most of the other courses run for 8-10 weeks at an average cost of ≤ 80 .

After enrolling I met a friend of mine queuing up to register for the Dance class. He proudly explained that he had completed the Beginners course last year and was now enrolling for the Intermediate level. Before he could continue the lady standing behind informed him that there are men in the Floral Art also. She stared directly at him as she divulged this titbit of information.

As I walked down the stairs of the Community Centre I thought perhaps the TV crew will be returning to Knocklyon shortly!

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What is Family Mediation?

The breakdown of a relationship leading to separation is a major crisis for many couples and their families. The breakdown usually occurs after a long period of conflict and often many efforts to resolve that conflict. The decision to separate is never easy, and the accompanying feelings of anger, guilt, fear and betrayal that may arise during this time can exacerbate the sense of confusion and uncertainty. In the midst of all this turmoil couples may not know where to go or who to turn to. Family Mediation is a process designed to help couples who have already decided to separate. It offers couples the opportunity to negotiate their own terms of agreement within a structure that helps each individual look at their own needs and interests, and also the needs and interests of their partner and any children they may have.

For many couple trust has been diminished, for some couples communication has broken down completely. Thus, coming to a decision about where each will live, how to parent the children, and how to manage finances can give people a way to move forward with more confidence into the future.

The Mediation Process

When a couple has agreed to participate in the process of Family Mediation the first thing to do is schedule an appointment. Each partner must contact the mediator to confirm that both are willing to attend. In the context of Family Mediation this is extremely important. The process of mediation can only work if both partners participate equally.

The couple is seen together in a confidential setting. This first session gives the mediator the opportunity to hear both stories. The mediator then explains what the process of mediation involves so that both people can decide if mediation is the appropriate process for them. Each person must commit in order for the process to continue.

The mediator is a skilled professional who is trained to work with all kinds of couples. If there are concerns about violence, addiction or mental illness the mediator will discuss with the couple together, and with each person individually whether mediation is a suitable option.

Mediation facilitates people to make their own decisions and to hold their own power. The mediator does not make decisions for the couple, and couples are encouraged to seek legal advice. The mediator may also recommend consulting a financial advisor. Mediators are resourceful people. They have information about children, social welfare and legal issues. They also know that the more fully informed people are the better the decisions they make. Therefore they utilise other resources in the community. Mediators cannot give legal or financial advice or opinions; however, they do have the necessary information to guide people to where they can get the advice or information they need.

Mediators understand that no two couples are alike. They understand that separation can cause extreme emotional difficulty, so the mediator provides a safe place for people to negotiate about their future.

Where there are children it can be very painful for parents to deal with the impact of the separation on their children. Parents know best what their children need, but in a time of crisis it is easy to lose sight of this. Mediators can help both parents work out what arrangements will work best for the whole family.

When parents have reached agreements children may be invited to attend a session with their parents. This provides an opportunity for the children to hear about the plans that have been made for them. It also provides a setting where children can hear that their needs have been considered and discussed and that their parents are very concerned about their happiness and wellbeing within the new family structure.

The decision to invite children in for a session rests entirely with the parents who know what is best for their children.

Most mediations end with each person being given their own written document that clearly sets out all the details of the couple's agreement.

This document can then be taken to their individual solicitors to be drawn into a legal contract or legal deed of separation.

Mediation can help couples end their relationship in a respectful and dignified way. It can also save valuable time, energy and resources, and can relieve a lot of unnecessary stress and anxiety. – Marie Keely






