

SHAPE

Now that SHAPE has almost completed its second term of helping children explore their relationship with God, I thought it would be a good time to bring you up-to-date with how the group is progressing.

SHAPE started in the summer term with an average turnout of 7-8 children. Whilst we had hoped for larger numbers, the small size enabled us to find our feet quickly and made it very easy for everyone to join in the interactive sessions we run. I see SHAPE as very worthwhile even for a smaller group than this, since we have the opportunity to help build foundations in the lives of the young people that attend. We all know that the foundations even though not seen in the finished building are essential to stop it collapsing. So too with life, faith and the church. There are many influences in a

young person's life today that shape the foundations being built. SHAPE is all about building the right kind of foundations to enable young people to build a faith that is Christ-centred, helpful and life-giving. These foundations do not automatically fall into place and cannot be

laid the quick way – there is no equivalent of concrete in building the foundations of life. The foundations have to be laid with patience, stone-by-stone, the old-fashioned way.

This term SHAPE saw an increase in numbers to an average of over 20 children. There is a great energy in this group and it's easy to have fun, but we have to be careful things don't get too wild. We've just agreed a set of ground rules with the children to make sure things stay in hand. Talking about 'wild' reminds me about the theme we'll be exploring this week – John the Baptist. He did a great job laying the foundation for Jesus to come. He called a nation to a change of heart to make space for Jesus in their lives, though of course not all listened. A wild man living out in the wilderness must have been a strange phenomenon, but that's the way God chose to prepare the way for Jesus. SHAPE is not quite as wild as John the Baptist, but like him our hope is to prepare the way for God in the lives of the people we serve.

SHAPE had its last session this term on 11 December and will begin again in the new year on Sunday 15 January at 6:30 pm. New members are always welcome – just come along to one of the meetings and we'll get you enrolled there and then.

SHAPE is run by a team of volunteers from St. Colmcille's parish and the running costs are covered by the parish. For more information or if you would like to help please talk to any of the team members running SHAPE or contact Tony Whittam on 4949533.

MEITHEAL

What is a "meitheal"? I am sure that many people have heard this word before or may have used it without knowing of its origin. I knew a woman some years ago who, although not a speaker of Irish, used phrases she had heard while growing up in Co. Meath. She even remembered elderly people conversing regularly in Irish. If she spent an evening in my house, she would thank me for the "ceili". This word to her meant get-together or friendly conversation.

She would also tell of how she assembled a "meitheal" to help her with some domestic chores. This term was mostly used years ago by the farming community. At harvest time neighbours would combine together to help one another make hay or gather other crops. This co-operation was a great way of fostering neighbourliness and a spirit of togetherness in the community. Those in the "meitheal" joined the host farmer for a meal at the end of the day's work. Kitchens in the old farmhouses were very big so as to accommodate the large numbers. Every farmer would repay his neighbour by taking part in his "meitheal" next time round.

Meitheal is defined as "working party; band of reapers" by Niall O Domhnaill in his Irish/English dictionary. The Educational Company in one of the older dictionaries describes it as 'a group gathered for work'. Personally I prefer the Irish meaning in a small dictionary published by An Gúm some years ago, "Buionn ag obair le cheile". It fits very well the definition of Parish Ministry given by Br. Pat Mullins at the Day of Recollection held in Gort Muire last September. The emphasis was on collaboration, sharing ideas, working together, co-operation in a friendly, open way.

MARATHON MAN

Dublin City Marathon success for Jonathan on one of the wettest Marathon Mondays in years

Jonathan Bates who was doing the marathon as a Fund Raiser for Wheelchair Sport completed the marathon in a time of 3.39.00. Jonathan who is an able bodied athlete completed the 26 miles in a racing chair he had borrowed for Wheelchair Sports. Anyone who wishes to pledge money to Jonathan's fund raiser can contact the IWA office.

Jonathan is a 27 year old electrician from Glenvara Park. Lots of people might wonder why an ablebodied person would want to commit themselves to a marathon in a wheelchair, but Jonathan has had an unfortunate three years in which he has broken his right foot three times. The first time was from playing rugby, and the second came 9 months later in a soccer game. After the second break he limited himself to climbing, kayaking and athletics.

Over a year had passed trouble free from injury, including lots of climbing in the Andes Mountain range of South America. He had just returned home from travelling, completing a difficult competition in the UK. At this time his fitness was at a high level and he was excited about competing in his first Dublin Marathon.

Just a couple of weeks before he was due to compete in the Liffey Descent which he competed in on an annual basis, he broke his foot again and was unable to compete in the event. On top of this, he couldn't face the thoughts of not being able to train for a couple of months. It was a friend of his that suggested the idea of doing the marathon in a wheelchair as a good way of continuing training. It took him several days to get used to the idea, but as it was a good way of raising much needed funds for the IWA, he decided to do it.

So I went forth, and finding the hand of God, trod gladly into the night.



Whilst the Community Council do not want to keep raising the issue, but following a briefing from our local Community Garda, Garda Ciarán O'Neill we would like once more to highlight some of the measures residents in Knocklyon should be taking in order to protect their property.

- 1. Make sure all doors and windows are securely locked when leaving the house. Always put on the alarm.
- Avoid leaving the back door and patio doors unlocked during the day.
- 3. Never leave your car keys downstairs at night.
- 4. Ladies, mind your handbags.
- 5. Do not leave valuables visible in your car.
- 6. Bikes and tools should be securely put away after use.
- 7. Get your house alarm serviced regularly.
- 8. Be aware when withdrawing money at ATMs.

Unfortunately the level of break-ins remains quite high in the area despite the detection of a number of culprits in recent months. With all the rushing around over Christmas don't be complacent as these guys are always looking for an opportunity.

- V. Sports facilities. Continual support for existing clubs and


looking forward into the future.

KNOCKLYON HISTORY SOCIETY

Catalpa Mission Lecture: Date: 9th November 2005 Speaker: Aidan O'Connor


In 1871 an amnesty was granted to all the Fenian prisoners in the Fremantle Penal Colony in Western Australia except to those who were members of the British army when they became involved in the Fenian movement. They languished lonely and forgotten in this gruesome climate.

In response to a letter signed "A voice from the Tomb" to John Devoy in the United States, plans were made for an attempted rescue of these men, six in all. They were Thomas Darragh, Martin Hogan, Michael Harrington, Thomas Hassett, Robert

Cranston and James Wilson.

John Boyle O'Reilly had already escaped from this penitentiary and was now established in the newspaper world in Boston. He knew the only escape route was by the sea. He and John Devoy with others organised the purchase of the whaling ship Catalpa. The ship under the command of George Anthony (29) set sail in August 1875 ostensibly whale fishing en route and with a crew of 22 men. Strict secrecy of the mission was maintained. Only after leaving the Azores did George Anthony tell the 1st mate the true purpose of this expedition. Ironically, en route he fell in with a British ship Ocean Beauty whose captain gave him charts of the Australian waters and remarked that he captained the Huguomont, the last ship bringing convict prisoners to Western Australia and which carried all the Fenian prisoners to Fremantle! The Catalpa finally reached Bunbury 85 miles south of Fremantle on March 28th 1876.

Meantime 2 Fenian agents, John Breslin and Tom Desmond were organising the escape in Fremantle. Breslin posing as a wealthy American businessman gained access to the prison. Prisoners often worked outside the compound as it was thought that the harsh,

arid climate could not facilitate escape. They built roads, felled trees and quarried stone. The escape was arranged for Easter Monday the 17th of April when most of the convict establishment garrison were watching the Royal Perth Yacht Club Regatta. The six men were spirited away and brought in the carriages of Breslin and Desmond to Rockingham Beach about 15 miles south of Fremantle where a whale boat took them to the Catalpa.

The word soon got out and orders were given to the mailboat Georgette to give chase. The Georgette closed in on the Catalpa with the captain demanding that the Catalpa stop and he stated "I'll blow the masts out of you". Captain Anthony's reply was "That's the American flag I fly. I am on the high seas. My flag protects me. If you fire on this ship you fire on the American flag." The Catalpa got away.

Whaling on her way (to help with costs) the men aboard the Catalpa became anxious to set sail for New York. The ship arrived to cheering crowds on the 19th of August 1876.

Captain Anthony had no allegiance whatever to Irish groups in America when he undertook his hazardous mission. He returned home to his young wife and small daughter after 15 months at sea and now grey haired. De Valera visited his grave when in America in 1919.


After the strenuous flight, we arrived in the beautiful South Africa. At the gates, Niall Mellon greeted us warmly and shook our hands. He also welcomed us on the coach. Clearly he appreciated the effort we were prepared to give and just as clearly cared about this project so much.

So, after a good nights sleep, we were briefed on the week ahead. We were then sorted into four teams, each one had a different colour shirt. Luckily, the royal blue shirt went very well with my eyes! I got to meet a couple of the lads and they seemed like great craic!

The entire group got to watch the South African children's choir sing. It was just... beautiful. The way their faces lit up, the way their voices surged, the way, that just their lives filled us with inspiration. If they can do that – cope with all they've gone through and what is to come the least I can do is this week, I thought determinedly. For all the excitement and the good cause, this week was going to be tough.

The whole group paraded through Shantytown, faces smiling all around – shining with gratitude. It was incredible. These people have nothing, absolutely nothing! Anyone can glance at a picture and think how awful it must be. Yet you don't know how awful it can be, not until you experience it. Not until you go there, smell, touch and truly see this environment, nothing can prepare you for it.

Hard work in the heat passed every day. Even when I lay in bed at night exhausted, all I could think

about was how to build, and what to build. I was carrying blocks in my sleep! Yet, there was a huge sense of pride seeing house after house being built with everybody contributing. Friendly competition was occurring and my team was winning!

Cape Town's legendary unpredictable weather had produced hurricane winds. 80 per cent of what we built was destroyed, as the concrete never had time to set. There were horrendous scenes of wreckage where our houses were and things were even worse for the shanties people lived in. We were distraught. How could this have happened? It was such a good cause.

With morale extremely low, and heads dipping, our group leaders stepped in abruptly. They reminded us of the cause and we were even more determined to succeed.

As bricks flew up and people moved like the clappers, immense satisfaction filled our hearts as roofs were built replacing shanties. We met our target of houses and built even more. Nothing was stopping us now!

Such hard work throughout the week... I did a lot of labouring, and hard work... Slavery out and out!


