### The Year of the Eucharist – October 2004-October 2005 A REFLECTION BY ELTIN GRIFFIN, O.CARM

#### Take and Eat

I was travelling by train from Rome to Assisi. Opposite me sat an oldish man. He neatly placed his overcoat and his lunchbox on the rack above him. Half-way through the journey he took down his neatly packaged lunchbox and began to lift the cover. Out came a panino – the Italian for a bread roll – as most people know nowadays. He adroitly slit it in two with his pocket knife. Then he proceeded to lift various items out of the many compartments in the box and spread them over the lower part of the panino – squirmy, disgusting looking things which seemed like worms with various bits of pasta and vegetable covered in garlic. Replacing the top part over what he had



placed on the lower part he pressed them together and – wait for it, he extended his hand in a gesture of invitation as he uttered 'Padre'. Even if I were to get ill on the spot I had no other choice but to eat the panino and its contents. It would have been churlish to refuse such an utterly kind gesture. For me it was a moment of Eucharist. Here was I, a total stranger in his country, and yet he shared with me part of his own meal.

That kind gesture was not an isolated act. It was in continuity with his life formed as he was I'm sure in a Catholic family, assimilating a Christian outlook and Christian values at home, in school, in the parish. Italians are capable of extraordinary faith as I discovered during my all too short stay in Rome and in places beyond Rome.

#### **Pure Heart**

Donald Nicholl in his very popular work 'Holiness' tells of a similar incident as he was coming back from his morning run on the hills near Bethlehem. Four workmen walking in single file and close to him were on their way up to a quarry. The last one within split seconds plunged his hand into his lunch bag, took out a handful of raisins, pushed them into his hands with the words 'you are sweating'. The word came unbidden to his mind 'Eucharist'. A Muslim friend to whom he narrated this incident described it as 'qualb naghy' – pure heart.

#### Pope John Paul II

A good description of what the Eucharist is: is pure heart, total giving. In his Encyclical letter on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee of his being made Pope, the late John Paul II described the Eucharist as 'Christ's saving presence in the community of the faithful, its spiritual food. It is the most precious possession the Church can have in her journey through history. From this living bread the Church draws her nourishment.'

#### Over a lifetime

I am fifty-five years ordained a priest on July 16th of this year. I have celebrated the Eucharist in a whole variety of places at home and overseas. I have witnessed a multiple variety of Eucharists in urban and rural areas, across a number of countries, including mission areas. Memories come crowding into the mind. Eucharist with the drums of Africa, the steel bands of the West Indies, the

backgrounds of choirs with great organ accompaniment, the great celebrations at the end of the legendary Folk Music weekends in Gort Muire, the captivating chant at the liturgy in the Russian Orthodox Cathedral in London and by contrast the lively school Mass at Glenstal Abbey Church on a Sunday morning directed by Paul Nash, O.S.B., Eucharist as part of a pilgrimage, of a parish mission, of a novena, of Carmelite gatherings, the famous twenty to six that was Terenure College, now no more because of traffic and the numerous departures into eternity both of friars and laity. A simple Eucharist with little or no music maybe, on the altar of a small country church. Even there the Eucharist is celebrated on the altar of the world. because the Eucharist is multi-dimensional. It reaches backwards in time to the Passover of the Old Testament, which anticipates what is to come, to the Last Supper, to Calvary, to the Lord's glorious resurrection. It reaches forward into the future to the future glory of which the Eucharist is the pledge. The Eucharist combines past, present and future with amazing richness. It seems to include everything, word and sacrament, communion with God and communion with each other and with the whole Church. Communion with the saints and with those who have gone before us. The Eucharist is the moment of total realisation. It demands penetration. It demands that we stand back from time to time and consider what we are doing at the altar. Considering what we are doing at the altar should lead to what John Paul II called 'eucharistic amazement': "The thought of this leads us to a profound amazement and gratitude. . . . This amazement should always fill the Church assembled for the celebration of the Eucharist."

"I turn above all to you, young and not so young, who find yourselves in the decisive moment of your choices. Have you ever thought of committing your existence totally to Christ? Do you think there can be anything greater than to bring Jesus to people and people to Jesus?" – John Paul 11

## THE SAPLINGS SCHOOL, RATHFARNHAM

The 25th of April 2005 was a momentous day for many families in the South Dublin area. After two years of intensive planning and discussions with the Department of Education, and relentless fund-raising by parents, The Saplings School for Children with Autism opened the doors of its third school. First established by parents and professionals in 2001, Saplings is a year-round early intervention facility for children on the autism spectrum. Saplings currently has three sites – one in Kill, Co. Kildare, one in Goresbridge, Co. Kilkenny and our newest school situated in St. Mary's convent in the grounds of Sancta Maria College, Rathfarnham.

The Sapling's model of education utilises the principles of Behaviour Analysis, a psychological discipline, which simply stated, is the scientific study of behaviour. Applied Behaviour Analysis, or ABA, is the application of these principles to help solve human problems. In order to change behaviour we must be able to predict and control the variables that influence it and behaviour analysis offers the tools to accomplish this. We have learned through careful study that behaviour is influenced by its consequences, that is, we will do more of the behaviours that have pleasant consequences, and hence, ABA focuses strongly on the principle of positive reinforcement to encourage appropriate behaviours and motivate children to learn new skills. ABA is recognised as the most comprehensive and most effective approach to improving the lives of persons with autism and their families.

#### Frequently Asked Questions about Autism and ABA

The following questions illustrate common misconceptions about the ABA approach to teaching individuals with Autism.

#### Is ABA just a new fad?

**ABA with persons with autism is not new and is not a fad.** Research began in the early 1960s with the studies of Charles Ferster, Ivar Lovaas, Montrose Wolf and Todd Risley to name just the best-known pioneers.

As long ago as 1981, ABA was identified as the treatment of choice for autistic behaviour. More than 550 studies have been published in scientific journals showing the effectiveness of behaviour analytic procedures with persons with autism.

#### Is ABA useful for managing anything other than 'bad' behaviours or severe behaviour problems?

### ABA is definitely not just useful for managing 'bad' behaviour or for people with severe behaviour problems.

Although ABA does provide the best methods for managing problem and challenging behaviour such as self-injurious, ritualistic, repetitive, aggressive and distruptive behaviour, it does this through teaching alternative *socially inclusive* behaviours.

### *Is ABA a mechanical approach that turns people into robots?* ABA is not mechanical.

Behaviour analysts know that successful programs require that they work collaboratively with all concerned and make best use of the knowledge and skills of carers and the persons with autism as well. B.F. Skinner, widely acknowledged as the founder of modern behaviour analysis, described behaviour analysts in the following manner: "The behaviourists I know are gentle people, deeply concerned with the problems facing us in the world today, who see a chance to bring the methods of science to bear on these problems." (B.F. Skinner, 1971)



#### MAPS IN LOCAL HISTORY Wednesday, 11th of May

Arnold Horner enthralled the society members with his display of maps, maps he considered useful in local history issues.


These maps ranged from maps made by the Bogs Commission in 1810. It was thought the bogs could be drained and that it would then be good to grow hemp – essential for sail cloth for ships and to maintain the British Empire. It was little realised that the bogs could not be drained in one season!

Mr. Horner showed early maps of Philipstown (Dangan) and a map of the Liffey circa 1510 showing Galway close to the Boyne! He dealt with boundary maps, estate maps, thematic maps (e.g. maps showing the areas where Irish is spoken in Ireland) and topographical maps. He further developed his talk referring to the Down Survey (after the Cromwellian Plantation), Rocque's maps of Dublin City and County of the 1750s and finally the establishment of the Ordnance Survey in 1824 which though organised by the military had as its aim to develop a uniform system for the valuation of land in Ireland.

Mr. Horner showed many maps of the Tallaght / Templeogue / Knocklyon area including Taylor's maps and 2 comparative maps of Dún Laoghaire in 1815 and 1912 showing the transformation of this area through the development of the harbour and the coming of the railway.

An interesting comment – the Irish never made maps, they knew where they were! Thank you for a thrilling talk Arnold, Fior bhuíochas ón gCumann Staire.

• To prepare the child for further education and lifelong learning.

Since 2000 we have focused a lot on teaching our pupils how to learn. The classroom and school environment has been fully modernised in order to create more stimulating surroundings for pedagogy. Parents have become much more involved in the daily life of the school. Our local population of under-nines come from much more diverse backgrounds, with children who were born in twenty different countries now enrolled here. We also have at least one pupil with special educational needs included in each class. The Department of Education & Science has invested heavily in our building, while the Board of Management and our parents have funded resources for curriculum expansion.

Each classroom now has a networked computer and cable television – with broadband and classroom telephones being installed this Summer. Within the next couple of years we expect the government to provide us with new classrooms to replace our prefabs. We await with anticipation the bright airy and spacious steel-framed timber-clad structure which will befit the 21st century.

Our school has been a focal point for the Knocklyon community since 1975. Amid all of the changes the school and parish relationship has remained constant and steadfast. The support of successive parish priests has been vital as our school continued to develop. D'fhás pobal Chnoic Liamhna agus Scoil Colmcille i dteannta a chéile le tríocha bliain.

Later this year we will begin to build links with schools in Belgium, Germany, Turkey, Italy and Estonia as part of a European 'Comenius' programme. The project will give pupils an opportunity to explore school, home and community life in Knocklyon – past, present and future. Our pupils will in turn learn about and make comparisons with life in neighbouring countries.

As Principal Teacher, I am really looking forward to witnessing the children's imagining of school in thirty years time.

Will we have human teachers or tele-teachers? Will we travel to school or learn at home?

Will formal schooling begin at age 2, 4 or 6?

Will we use books or computers for reading and recording?

Will the government's commitment to less than twenty pupils in a classroom be delivered before then?!!

Will our long-awaited school extension have been a success?

How many of our current young energetic teachers will remain at St. Colmcille's Junior School?

Who will be principal teacher?

Whatever happens between now and 2035, I sincerely hope that our patron saint, Colmcille's last words remain a priority in our school community: "That we may always have among us, mutual and genuine charity and peace."



# PARISH FORUM UPDATE

Meetings of the Forum were held in April and May and the June meeting will review the Forum's progress to date. 





#### KNOCKLYON HISTORY SOCIETY

At the April meeting of the History Society the Rev. Patrick Comerford, well known journalist and historian, gave a talk on Archbishop Adam

Loftus. The 400th anniversary of his death on 5th April 1605 was commemorated by a service in St. Patrick's Cathedral of which he was the first Dean. He was also first Provost of Trinity College. He came to Ireland at the age of twenty-six as chaplain to the Lord Deputy, Lord Essex. He was an ambitious man, who became Archbishop of Armagh and Dublin, Lord Chancellor of Ireland and also held other positions of power. In today's parlance he might be known as 'a control freak'. He was ruthless in the treatment of his enemies and was responsible for the torturing of Archbishop Dermot O'Hurley of Cashel in 1584. Apart from his hunger for public office he also accumulated a lot of estates in the Rathfarnham and Tallaght area, which included Scholarstown, Oldcourt, Tymon, Woodtown, Killakee, Ballycragh, Ballycullen and Mount Pelier Hill. At one time he owned Rathfarnham Castle and Knocklyon Castle. It was interesting to hear that the first location chosen for Trinity College was St. Patrick's Cathedral and its lands. However, through the intervention and influence of Archbishop Loftus the College was built on lands confiscated at the Reformation from the Priory of All Hallows. While Adam Loftus may not be held in high esteem by many, Patrick Comerford's eloquently delivered talk to a capacity audience was most interesting.

# A Carmelite Contribution

### European City of Culture, Cork 2005

The Crawford Gallery plays host to some wonderful exhibitions this year, - Van Gogh and Mondriaan. Local boy made good, James Barry, will also return to the Crawford although nearly 200 years after the death of the man known as the most important neo-classical painter in 18th century Britain.

The painting of The Baptism of Aengus King of Cashel by St. Patrick has occupied an honoured place at the entrance hall in Terenure College over a span of several years. The artist was James Barry, a native of Cork, one of the most important painters to come out of Ireland in the nineteenth century. His father was a builder who went into the shipping business between England and Ireland. His mother Julia Reardon was a devout Catholic. James went to sea early in life but gave it up to study art. James Butts, the Cork landscape artist, had a great influence on him. James Butts has come into the news recently. His 'View of Cork' a rare and important 18th century painting, has hung in the foyer of the Crawford Gallery for over 30 years. Now it may be going on sale unless the Minister of Arts and Culture John O'Donoghue comes to the rescue. Before he left Cork, Barry painted several pictures, mostly on biblical



themes. His ambition was to become a history He was a student of Dublin Society's painter. Drawing School from 1760. It was in those early years 1760 - 1763 that he painted The Baptism of the King of Cashel by St. Patrick (oil on canvas). He was awarded a premium for it when he exhibited it at the Dublin Society Exhibition. The painting drew a lot of attention and marked the beginning of his career. It was the first painting of its kind by Barry that survives. It was later acquired by the Irish House of Commons, thus giving it some sort of official recognition. Thinking that it was destroyed Barry painted an unfinished variant of it in 1800–1801 (see p.8). The picture suggests the importance of the action which marked the introduction of Christianity to Ireland. The Doric column in the background vindicated the claim that the Irish are descended from a civilisation as advanced as that of ancient Greece and the Dolmen in the background echoes that.

#### **To London**

In 1764 Barry left Dublin for London and with an introduction from his patron Edmund Burke (1729–1797) he worked as a draughtsman for James 'Athenian' Stuart Burke, writer, statesman, philosopher and leading orator of the Whig Party. He got to know Barry through his success in the London Exhibition.

#### The Continent

In 1765 he went to study on the Continent. After ten months in Paris he went to Rome and stayed there from 1766 to 1770. While there he painted The Temptation of Adam (National Gallery of Ireland) which was exhibited at the Royal Society in London in 1771, and as a result of its success he was elected as an associate of the Royal Academy the following year gaining full membership in 1773. One of his leading works there was a series of six large canvases illustrating the theme of the Progress of Human Culture. This established his reputation as the periods leading painter. There are seven of his paintings in the National Gallery of Ireland.

Some of his earlier writings highlights the importance of religion in his work and though regarded as a loner and extremely serious he was respected as a good lecturer. He was expelled from the Royal Academy in 1799. He declared that it was 'no longer capable of accomplishing its original intention of improving public taste'.

It seems that he was a martyr to the lost cause of history painting. He lived out his remaining years in London. His dedication to history painting meant that he never earned much money. A fund was set up to support him. He died in poverty in 1866. His importance as an artist was only fully acknowledged after his death. He is buried in the crypt of St. Paul's Cathedral in London.



#### Terenure

There is no known record of how the picture arrived in Terenure College. It seems likely that Robert Shaw MP for New Ross in 1798, Lord Mayor of Dublin 1815 –16, who rebuilt Tyrenure House as the original building was called, may have obtained the picture when the remnants of the burned-out House of Commons were being distributed. Shaw was MP for New Ross in 1798 and Lord Mayor of Dublin in 1815–1816. He represented Dublin in the House of Commons from 1804 to 1826. The Carmelite community at Terenure College is delighted to share this precious possession with the Crawford Municipal School of Art in Barry's native city for the Cork City of Culture 2005.

#### Dubrovnik - A Surprise

The City of Dubrovnik in Southern Dalmatia has become one of the most popular tourist resorts in Eastern Europe. One of the highlights of a visit to Dubrovnik is a boat trip to the Elafiti Islands. The most popular of the Islands are Kolocep, Lopud and Sipan. All three can be included in a one day trip. The Franciscans have a long history in Sipan. Over the centuries they have cared for sea men and homeless people finding themselves on the islands. What a surprise it was to discover this painting of Our Lady of Mount Carmel in the main Franciscan Church on the Island. The artist being Flemish would have been acquainted with the Carmelite tradition in his native land. The Virgin Mary is shown extending an apple to the Child with one hand and bestowing the Brown Scapular Beneath the painting in a with the other. rectangular panel is shown the suffering souls in Purgatory. Complete with large Scapular over their shoulders and hands uplifted in imploration, indicating the very strong connection that has existed between the devotion to the Mother of Carmel and the deliverance of souls from Purgatory.



#### **Terenure College honours John Paull II**


On Thursday 7th April 2005 at 11.45 a.m. the entire College community came together in an act of remembrance and prayerful thanksgiving for the life of Pope John Paul II. The staff and pupils of Junior and Secondary schools joined members of the Carmelite community in the celebration.

The principal celebrant and homilist was the Prior of Terenure College, Fr. Míceál O'Neill, The very moving ceremony was co-O.Carm. ordinated by members of the Religious Education Department and the Chaplaincy Team. It included the participation of many pupils of all ages drawn from the two schools. Pupils led prayers, proclaimed the Word and assisted as ministers of the Eucharist. Others enhanced the celebration with music and song - teachers and pupils singing, playing instruments and praying side by side. Members of the one school family united with the family of the Church and the world in their remembering of one who always had a message of hope and love for the young people of the world. It was with a genuine sense of sorrow, gratitude and love we bid farewell to Karol Josef Wojtyla -Pope John Paul II.

#### Martin McMahon, O.Carm R.I.P



Macker we as called him was quite a character. He got TB as a student and all through his life he was dogged with ill health but continued manfully at his various assignments. He was educated by the Christian Brothers O'Connell's at

School in Dublin. He joined the Carmelite Order in 1941 in Kinsale. At UCD he acquired a BA Degree in philosophy and in English, which was to be his great love all through his life. At Milltown Park (now the Milltown Institute) he studied theology. He was ordained priest in 1949 and taught for a short while in Terenure College. He excelled at soccer and athletics. He trained some rugby teams and one of those reached the Leinster Senior Cup Finals in 1951. In 1952 he went to S. Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe). He started a Teacher's Training Programme, which was ahead of its time. 1959 found him in the Carmelite College Moate where he became Headmaster in 1960. In 1965 he was transferred to the Australian Province for his health. He was on the staff of Whitefriars College Donvale. Asked by his brethren 'what are you teaching Mac?', his answer was inevitably 'English and clear thinking'. From 1970 to '75 he was stationed at Whitefriars Street. He was appointed Prior of Knocktopher Co. Kilkenny in 1975, spending four years there. He was back again in Terenure from 1979-85. He put a lot of work into his preaching, heavily influenced by the apologetics he had learned in school, convinced there would be somebody in the congregation looking for proofs, but the 'somebody' never ventured to call at the door. Mac loved an argument, part of his searching for proofs. Because of deteriorating health he returned to Australia. He worked in the Carmelite Parish at Hilton in the Diocese of Perth until he was compelled to enter a nursing home in Freemantle. He was very well looked after there. People from the Parish would come and drive him out through the fascinating countryside of Western Australia. He never got back to the Dublin he loved. In Terenure College he would never say 'I'm going into the City' it was always 'going into Dublin' where he would roam the streets investigating the bookshops. He was always a Dub.

#### Hugo Arthur Mallia, O.Carm R.I.P.

Fr. Hugo, a native of Malta, endeared himself to a lot of people in Ireland. He was born in Msida Novin ember 1931 and as child lived а through the second world war, an event which marked him deeply. He often recounted the hardships endured by his family and the



sacrifices his parents made to ensure that he and his sisters and brothers had food on the table. Like so many people in Malta he was a member of the S.D.C or the Museo, becoming a fully incorporated member on Christmas Day 1949. Hugh took very much to heart the teachings of the founder, Don George (now Blessed George), which advocated meekness, forgiveness and service. Fr. Hugh entered the Carmelite Order in 1950. He was professed in 1951 and ordained priest in Gozo in 1956. He was a born teacher. He taught Maths, Physics and French for some time but his first love was poetry, with a particular passion for Dylan A respected poet in his own right Thomas. publishing in Maltese, Italian and English he was inducted as a member of the Maltese Academy. He loved languages. In Rome he served the Order as secretary General and was a frequent contributor on Vatican Radio and on RAI, the Italian broadcasting network. The hankering after contemplative spirit of the Carmelite Order saw him join the eremitical community at Wolfnitz, Austria. He loved music, especially opera and the great choral works. He will be greatly missed by the Gort Muire Community for his many practical skills such as mending watches, clocks, spectacles and radios and for his incredible computer skills. He was bursar at the Milltown Institute for close on six years. He was a great favourite with the students of the Institute. While studying as a young priest in England he worked in a Dockland parish. He loved the parish and its people. He kept in contact with many of them over the years. His funeral was held in Malta. A memorial Mass was celebrated in Gort Muire on March 3rd and drew a lot of people. Our sympathy and condolences go to Hugh's sisters Ethel and Edwige and his brothers Edwin, Walter, Edmond and Albert, his nieces, nephews and many friends. Fr. Eoin Moore, Terenure College did him proud in his homily at the Memorial Mass in Gort Muire.

#### James Doyle, O.Carm R.I.P. Zimbabwe

Jim was born in Killaloe Co. Clare in 1938. He was educated at the local primary school and C.B.S. secondary school, Limerick. He also spent some time in the Teacher Training (College) Drumcondra. He joined the Carmelite Novitiate in Kinsale in 1956. He was ordained in 1964. He came to Zimbabwe during 1965 and ministered at two missions Triashill and Kriste Mambo. During 1966 he went to teach at St. Charles Lwanga Minor Seminary in Chimanimani and was appointed Rector there during 1970. In Chimanimani he was involved in building up some Among his pupils were Bishop out-stations. Mutume, Ambrose Vinyu, Patrick Chiwara, Alexander Sakarombe, Richard Musakwa, Constantine Masarira.

In 1985 Fr. Jim was appointed Prior and Parish Priest of Hatfield Parish, Harare. This was the first time he was fully involved in a Parish. He really enjoyed it and did very well. He was responsible for building the Church there.

In 1992 he was asked to take over the Student House in Mount Carmel, as Prior and Student Master. He found the change and challenge difficult, as he had been content and happy in Hatfield. But as always with Jim, he took up the new challenge with enthusiasm. He was responsible for the new extensions and he renovated the main building we can see today.

Fr. Jim made contacts with many friends while in Mt. Carmel especially the sick and those in need. He was very disappointed to see many of his friends leaving because of the present situation in Zimbabwe. He played a key role in Harare for the Order. We all depended on him for so many little things and he was always ready to oblige.

He loved Gaelic Games but was also very interested in soccer, cricket, rugby and golf. Fr. Jim was also a keen golfer and he enjoyed the social life after a game. But I suppose the one thing we will all remember him for was his jovial

#### P.J. Foley R.I.P.

P.J. Foley of the Friary, Leighlinbridge, Co. Carlow died on March 22nd last. He and his wife Mary lived in what was the last dwelling place of the Carmelites at Leighlinbridge. A rather imposing dwelling set among the trees on a hill above the village, its architecture bears some resemblance to the friaries of Kildare and Knocktopher.

The Foleys decided to retain the house because of its historical significance. The Friary grounds and farm are now part of a stud farm called Ballyhane. character. Whenever there was a gathering of Carmelites or others he would love to sing a few songs. He was a great entertainer. Not just a great priest Fr. Jim was also a great Carmelite. He was totally committed to his priestly work. Whenever he could, especially at weekends, he would love



to go out and say Mass in different places. There was nothing small about Fr. Jim. He had a generous heart and he was always ready to help.

I suppose the one thing we are all asking today is why? In the African context some might say who did it or was it a punishment from God? We must never forget that life is a gift from God and He calls us to Himself in His own time. This is a challenging time for us Carmelites. This is the third tragic death in six months. Fr. Gerry Hipwell in Ireland, a young man in Poland and now Fr. Jim. With such a shortage of priests today, we ask why? But we must realise that we are chosen by God as his priests but He is the Lord of the work. He will reveal in time to us His plans for us. When we are working for the Lord we should never forget the Lord of the work.

We thank God for Jim. We thank Jim for his love, joy and the example he gave to us and the great memories he left us. Through the intercession of Jesus, we ask the Father to receive Fr. Jim into the home he has prepared for him.

Fr. Jim, like us all, was affected by what is happening around us today and when I spoke to him last Wednesday on the phone the last thing he said to me was "I will stay and work here in Zimbabwe as long as I can". Little did either of us think that for Fr. Jim that would be only four days more!

# Exhibition

#### A Comprehensive Exhibition of Paintings and Engravings to be held at Crawford Municipal Art Gallery during Cork's Tenure as European City of Culture

A major exhibition celebrating the work of the most significant artist to have been born and trained in Cork – James Barry (1741–1806) opens at the Crawford Municipal Art Gallery in October 2005 in partnership with Cork 2005.

With over one hundred and forty works including paintings and engravings, drawn from major public museums, private institutions and collections from Ireland, Europe and the United States, the James Barry exhibition will be one of the visual art highlights of Cork's tenure as European Capital of Culture.

Now regarded as perhaps the most important neo-classical painter of eighteen century Britain this extensive collection of Barry's paintings and engravings will be on show for five months from October 22 2005 to March 4 2006 culminating in a two-day conference in which leading international academics will reappraise James Barry's work. This conference will coincide with the two hundredth anniversary of James Barry's death

#### **James Barry Conference**

The conference will coincide with the two hundredth anniversary of James Barry's death and will uniquely take place in two venues in two countries:



Like the first picture, (page 1) there is calmness about the central figures.
