GREEN FLAG AWARD


By now we hope you have all seen and admired the Green Flag which stands in the grounds of St. Colmcille's Senior School. The Europe-wide project was set up to encourage young people to recognise the importance of environmental issues in their life now and in the future. They start with small achievable targets and proceed. The long-term nature of the scheme acts as a focus for developing a whole school policy. The reward is given to schools who complete the essential elements of the Green Schools programme and is awarded every two years. The project is an opportunity to develop children's decision-making skills, with action at every stage. It helps the pupils to recognise the importance of environmental issues and take them more seriously for their personal and home lives.

Registration with Green Schools was set up in the year 2000 having made sure that they had the full support of the Principal and staff, who, have as usual, given their "all" to the task in hand and which now has reaped the reward for the work involved.

The Green Schools Committee is the driving force of any project and makes sure that all the elements set are adopted. They give children responsibility and ensure that their ideas are valued. They also ensure that the views of all members of the school community are heard and where possible acted on.

The Green Committee (Coiste-Uaithne) meet every Tuesday at lunchtime in Room Three. The Committee consists of Mrs. O'Gara (Head of Coiste-Uaithne), Claudia Harding, 6th Class, (Secretary); Amanda

Keegan is her Assistant. Stephen Buggy, 4th Class also a Committee member, is very keen in acquiring a rabbit population for the scheme. Members of the Coiste Uaithne Mr. Ρ. O'Neill are (Príomhoide), Mr. Ruddy (Gardens and Board of Management Representative), Ms. Drennan (Litter-picking Co-Ordinator), Mr. Mac



Gabhann (Teacher Room 4), Miss Woods (3rd Class Co-Ordinator), Mr. Byrne, 5th Class (Composting) and Mr. Glennon, 5th Class (Composting).

Claudia takes the meeting, first to re-cap the last minutes and find out any improvement of the week before. Today there is a talk on recycled paper and a discussion on the yearly clean-up. A rota is planned for the litter pickers.

Boxes are available to all classes for recyclable goods – stamps for Fr. Tony, cans etc. and of course, the bottle bank. All letters are deposited in a bin. "If there is no bin – we will take the rubbish home" is the answer. All aluminium cans used in school go into the Recycling Bank.

Since September they have set up a Composting Environmental Review, the current Action Plan needs 2 litter bins, 2 Oxigen bins, an anti-litter campaign for anti-litter. The main problems – litter and lack of recycling. To date the grounds of St. Colmcille's School are now LITTER FREE!

Work must have realistic and achivable goals. Success increases confidence, and builds enthusiasm for setting new targets in subsequent years of the Green Schools Programme.

I always think we are lucky to be living in Knocklyon where the area is surrounded by such countryside. Almost everyone has a view of the Dublin Mountains from at least one window in their home.

I would like to say "Thank You" to St. Colmcille's School for opening my eyes to the environmental possibilities which are available to me. Indeed talking

> about recycling, newspapers and magazines were my favourite collections. A couple more years and I would have been able to build my own mountain, not in any way as beautiful as my world outside. In fact, I have now begun to look with pride at my Green Bin. From now on it will be given pride of place in my garden.

The inspiring Victor Frankl, who was a P.O.W. during the Holocaust, endured years of indignity and humiliation before he was finally liberated. When he was first captured, he was marched into a Gestapo courtroom. The Nazi's had taken away his home, his family, his freedom, his possessions, and even his watch and wedding ring. After shaving his head and stripping him, he stood there naked under the glaring lights of the German high command, being interrogated and falsely accused. He was destitute. A helpless pawn in the hands of brutal, prejudiced men - or was he?

In that moment a light came on inside Frankl, and he suddenly realised there was one thing nobody could ever take from him. Just one. The power to choose his own attitude in any set of circumstances!

Regardless of what they did to him or what the future held for him, he could always choose that. Bitterness or forgiveness. To give up or go on. Hatred or hope. Determination to endure or the paralysis of self-pity. And today you have that same choice too (Phil 4:13).

Paul writes these inspiring words from prison, "Even though on the outside it often looks like things are falling apart on us, on the inside, where God is making new life, not a day goes by without His unfolding grace" (2 Cor 4:16 TM). NOVENA OF GRACE

It was suggested to me that having a Novena Of Grace was an out-of-date exercise. With people living in the fast lane they would not have time to spend an hour in church for nine evenings. Perhaps, such a Novena would suit the elderly and should be at the morning ten o'clock Mass as this age group does not venture out after dark.

I am glad to report that this analysis was very wide of the mark. The attendance was very good. The speakers gave much food for thought. John Lonergan, governor of Mountjoy Prison, reminded us that our houses should be places where everyone feels at home; where friends are welcomed when they call and that sitting-rooms are for living in, not for show.

Fr. Christopher O'Donnell, a world known Carmelite Theologian, posed the question, 'Sin -Dead or Alive?' We were under no illusion after his direct talk that sin is very much alive.

'Me - Growing Or Static?' was the theme addressed by Geraldine Glasgow. If we are not as the people of the Gaeltacht would say "Istigh leat fein" (at home with one's self) we might consider looking inwards before being cynical or critical of others.

Fr. Miceál O Neill, one of our parish Carmelites, spoke of the damage being done to our environment. We are but caretakers in God's world, taking care of earth, sea and air in order to pass it on in pristine condition to future generations.

Questions on Politics, Prayer, Youth and the Church were also addressed by visiting speakers.

For me the evening of Reflection and Intercession, with 'War - Justice or Failure?' as the theme, was special. Fr. David Weakliam's quiet but poignant words were very inspiring, especially as they were spoken on the day that Inspector Blix was reporting to the United Nations on his work in Iraq. The choir of young people sang appropriate hymns. The Parish Team deserve our gratitude for organising the Novena. The choice of themes and speakers, six of whom were lay people, was very relevant to 2003. Thanks also to members of the many parish choirs who generously gave of their talents each evening.

The Novena of Grace was first celebrated in

Ireland in 1712 at Mary's Lane Chapel, St. Michan's Parish, Dublin. It is wonderful that almost three hundred years later, the parish of St. Colmcille, Knocklyon, in the Dublin suburbs can have a wellattended nine evenings of prayer and reflection on twenty-first century themes. We prayed for ourselves, our families and all people living in our parish at the beginning of Lent when we are endeavouring to improve our relationships with God. Anna Brioscú

NEWS FROM THE PARISH FORUM

The Parish Forum continues to meet on a monthly basis. At its January meeting it was agreed that the January/February/March meetings would look at a number of priorities arising from a discussion on the parish finances. These would include the question of how the youth of the parish can best be served.

The Forum was advised that the matter of a submission to the Broadcasting Commission is a much wider issue than the parish requirement for the broadcasting of religious services, and as such would not seem to fall within the scope of the Parish Team or Forum.

The re-commencement of the Rainbow Programme in the parish is proceeding with four persons having undergone the initial training course. Facilitators are required and a meeting is to be arranged with this in mind. The facilities required were discussed and agreed.

A working group was set up to ensure the ongoing updating of the Parish Website. Ed Kellett of the Parish Team will work with the group. The Forum also reflected on the characteristics that make youth initiatives successful as well as those that can be identified in unsuccessful initiatives.

The Forum also recorded a vote of sympathy to Anna Brioscú (a member) and her family on the death of Aodhagán.






Chess Club



Some scientists set out to capture a rare species of monkey and bring it back alive and unharmed. To do this, they devised a trap; a small jar with a narrow neck into which they placed a handful of nuts. Smelling the nuts, the monkeys reached in to get them. Have you said to yourself, "I'll never forget this as long as I live"? Whether you know it or not, you're not holding on to resentment – it's holding on to you. You're trapped! The real victim of resentment is the one who carries it. Are you a carrier? Hate prolonged is just a slow form of suicide.

Do you think the other person is the one who needs forgiveness? Think again. Paul said, "... Forgive ... as quickly and thoroughly as ... Christ forgave you" (Ephesians 4:32 TM). How did Christ forgive you? (a) When you were completely undeserving of it. (b) With no strings attached. (c) With full knowledge that you'd fail Him again.

"What's the answer?" you ask. Forgive and forget! More issues are forgotten than are ever resolved. To forgive is to set a prisoner free – and discover that the prisoner is you! – THE WORD FOR TODAY DON'T RI

In years gone by, the above heading was frequently used to draw the attention of readers to an article or item of news which they were otherwise likely to have Ignored. In my experience, it always worked! So much so, that I wonder why the ploy is nowadays seldom, if ever, used! (Although, come to think of it, I dare say it is used, but in subtle and more sophisticated ways.) It just points to one of the many bewildering facets of this nature of ours. The most effective way to get someone to look over their shoulder is to tell them not to! Or if you want someone to really listen to you, tell them first that maybe you shouldn't be telling them at all!



We have received correspondence from Olivia Mitchell T.D. regarding her question to the Minister for the Environment and Local Government in relation to the funding of the following two portions of the green route: (a) Ballyboden Road/Grange Road Scheme; (b) Route between Spawell Bridge and Knocklyon Road.

The Minister's reply is as follows: "South Dublin County Council's revised submission for 2003, under the EU Co-Financed Specific Improvement Grants Scheme, included applications for the Greenhills Road Realignment Scheme and the Green Route/Ballyboden Road-Grange Road Scheme. However, the route between the Spawell Bridge and the Knocklyon Road was not included in the Council's revised submission.

It would be open to South Dublin County Council to apply for funding for this route in 2004, in response to my Department's request for applications which will issue later."

LET IT GO!

How did Christ forgive you? (a) When you were completely undeserving of it. (b) With no strings attached. (c) With full knowledge that you'd fail Him again.

"What's the answer?" you ask. Forgive and forget! More issues are forgotten than are ever resolved. To forgive is to set a prisoner free – and discover that the prisoner is you! -The Word For TODAY

In years gone by, the above heading was frequently used to draw the attention of readers to an article or item of news which they were otherwise likely to have Ignored. In my experience, it always worked! So much so, that I wonder why the ploy is nowadays seldom, if ever, used! sure: it's a very powerful part of our make-up. And it's been with us since mankind first came upon the earth.

If you've read thus far, I'm hoping you will continue. For my real purpose is to interest you in celebrating Holy Week and pondering the mystery of it all. My first thought was to introduce the programme of Liturgy, Prayer and Service, with a heading in large print: "PLEASE, UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES. COME TO ANY OF THE FOLLOWING!" But I just couldn't follow through. It seemed fundamentally inappropriate to give a gimmicky heading to anything so solemn and sacred. The heading I've chosen is risky enough.

What transpires in Holy Week is at the very apex of our celebration of the Faith we profess and, hopefully, value. These Liturgies and Celebrations should call for our communal and prayerful presence more insistently even than Sunday Mass. So please, I ask you, read through the programme, consider the events, and choose to come to those, and as many, as you can.


