

Bernie Rossney – the welcoming face of the Iona Centre

Hopefully most people who visit the Iona Centre will have had the good fortune to have encountered the director, Bernie Rossney, with her gentle smile and welcoming nature. Although, this is not necessarily guaranteed as whilst Bernie would be anxious to greet and welcome all, she is not a 'profile seeker' and because of her quiet and unassuming nature, would never choose to be in the limelight.

Bernie, with husband Justin arrived in Knocklyon in 1975 with their then two boys Alan and Colin. Time has flown for the Rossneys and the children have all

grown into adults - Alan (33) Colin (30) and Gillian (23). All of us who know Bernie will be aware of her gorgeous grandson, Conor, who is now six and a half and is the light of Bernie and Justin's life!

Bernie's first involvement was on the 'Ladies' Committee' in the late 70's. This Committee helped out in many areas, and were responsible for the setting up of the Community Play Group, with which Bernie worked for about four years. Bernie helped to set up the first Baptism Team and stayed with that project for several years.

In the late 80's, along with Carmel Wynne, Bernie inaugurated Parenting in the Parish.

Bernie has always been involved in faith-sharing groups and she has been a Eucharistic Minister for many years and is currently attached to the 1 o'clock Mass.

The Iona Centre opened in 2000 and Bernie felt very privileged to be invited to be one of the three core staff and to be in at the beginning of what has become a very successful venture for the Parish. At that point Bernie's responsibilities included reception work, organising rooms, taking bookings, etc. and she absolutely loved meeting and greeting people through the Centre.

In 2002 Brid (O'Connell) stepped down as Director and Bernie took over the reins. In her own words she was scared stiff and felt Brid would be a very hard act to follow; she was very grateful for the terrific support from Brid all through the changeover.

Bernie feels we owe a huge debt of gratitude to FAS and to all the participants from FAS who were involved in the Centre during that time and over the past three-and-a-half years helped to get the Centre on its feet. Unfortunately, because of the cut-backs in FAS, the FAS project ceased last year and Bernie feels much credit must be given to the core staff - Ann and Noeleen - who with Bernie took on the running of the Centre with great spirit. Bernie is thankful for the arrival of Tina Nea, and Sandra Kellett, who joined the staff some months ago. They, together with the volunteers from the Parish who have generously offered to help in various areas, have lightened the load. Bernie

reminded me that the Coffee Shop is open daily from 9.30 a.m. to 2.30 p.m. (Monday to Friday) and all are welcome to drop in for a cuppa in pleasant sur-

Over the two-year period, there has been considerable growth in the use of the Centre and the interest of people in the courses being run there. People tend to come back again and again, to do different courses. The feedback is that they like the atmosphere of the place. Bernie feels that the addition of the 'cuppa' provided to all Parish Committees after their meetings has added a wonderful dimen-

sion to their gatherings, as people tend to stay on longer for the social chat, rather than just leaving immediately after the meeting. Bernie is delighted with this progress, because of her strong commitment to the idea of the Centre being a place of welcome and warmth and she is quick to point out that this innovation was yet another of Fr David's very

There is huge variety in the courses ran in the Centre from Parenting and Faith Development Courses to Yoga which is very popular. There are many, many groups who meet in the Centre, e.g. the Mother and Toddler Group (where mothers with their children come to meet and have a chat together) to the Porcelain Painting Group, who have been together for many years. All parish-based Committee meetings are held in the Centre - too numerous to mention. In this way, it is hoped to meet the different needs of the people - not just their religious needs, but to reach out to cover their many requirements in a warm and comfortable environment.

Rooms are available for rent to various organisations for use for courses and conferences. Healing groups, Counsellors, Holistic groups use the Centre as they find the warm, welcoming atmosphere conducive to their work. The Quiet Room lends itself to their work and is very popular with these groups. Retreats are also held at the Centre.

Bernie's hope is that the Centre will continue to grow and be seen as a place of healing, and a haven where people could come to get away from the stresses in their lives. She hopes that the needs of the people will always be the first priority of the Centre which will continue to be welcoming and open to the people.

Anyone who knows Bernie will realise that as long as Bernie is at the helm, this hope and wish will be realised, as in her quite unobtrusive way, she exudes this welcoming warmth. We wish Bernie many happy years as Director of the Iona Centre and we know that we are all in safe, gentle hands under her direction.

MASS what happens when we go?

It was at the Last Supper, a festive meal that Jesus instituted the Eucharist. It is no wonder that it was at a meal that Jesus did institute it. For when we read the Scriptures we find more than four dozen accounts of Jesus' eating or talking about food. In the religious culture of his time, Jesus by 'breaking bread' extended the hand of friendship and peace in a rite that united all in friendship. At meals, Jesus taught, healed, forgave sins and spoke of God's love and mercy. His presence and sharing at these meals showed his complete willingness to do whatever was necessary to reconcile people to God the Father.

If this is what Jesus' meal ministry was about, then, so much more was the Last Supper. If Jesus accomplished these things at meals at which ordinary bread was broken, what are the achievements of a meal in which the 'bread' broken and share is eternal - when the bread was his body and the wine his blood? They surpass all limitations.

The Old Testament uses images of bread and wine as signs of the joy and plenty of the promised land. This led Tradition to refer to the Eucharist as the foretaste of the Messianic Banquet of the Kingdom. These are but ways of speaking of heaven and of our eternal union with the Trinity and with each other. This Messianic Banquet is the overflowing banquet which is the ultimate reality beneath the veil of our eucharistic signs.

Memorial

In following Jesus' instruction at the Last Supper to "do this in memory of me" we are not simply recalling a historic event. The whole biblical concept of 'memorial' is far deeper than this. In the Eucharist we are acknowledging that through his grace and power, God is able even today to insert us into a past moment which is still living and actual. This mysterious action of God makes Jesus' great salvific act of self-giving present to us and enables us to join with his act and so not only do we receive but also we offer ourselves - "May he make us an everlasting gift to you". Through the Eucharist, we unite ourselves to God the Son, through the Holy Spirit to God the Father.

Real Presence

When we bring the bread and wine to the

altar, they are simply that - bread and wine. By the power of the Holy Spirit, these imperfect gifts are taken over by Jesus and 'from being signs or offering, they become signs of Christ and his self-giving. Modern Sacramental Theology teaches us that a sign is not something representing an absent reality but that it reveals an conceals a reality that is present. Jesus' total self-giving in the world of sacramental sings means that the bread and wine are changed into Christ's very self.

Saying that Jesus is present in the bread and wine goes beyond saying that he is present in an object or a person. It is a far richer concept. It is saying that in the Eucharist there is 'a personal encounter with the Risen Christ'. All other modes of his presence - the Word, the assembly, the celebrant - come together in the celebration of the Mass. The presence of Jesus requires our presence and our response. When we present ourselves and respond to his presence, he nourishes our life of faith and so allows us to grow deeper into union with God and with others.

Sacrifice

The mystery of the Eucharist is also about the Sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross - the one and only sacrifice of Christ that brings salvation, Over the years we may have emphasised the Passion and Death of Jesus to the point where we divorced it from his life. Can we truly separate Jesus' life from those moments on the Cross. Is sacrifice just a particular, isolated event - a sort of negative force that somehow has positive effects or is it a life-long positive commitment to living for values other than selfish ones. Jesus' sacrifice is not this negative notion of 'giving up' but a positive option for God who desires union with us. This sacrifice is not a 'giving up' but a 'giving for'. Eucharist was not something he shared only on the night before he died. It represented and reflected his entire life of self-giving.

The Eucharist is not just the commemoration of the sacrificial event of a single day but the celebration of the sacrificial gift of Jesus' entire life. The implications of this for us as his followers are crucial in that they require us to live out fully our life-long option for God.

REFLECTION

St. Colum Cille (521-597) - Feast Day 9th June

Crimthann O'Donnell was born in 521. He was directly descended from Niall of the Nine Hostages. (Crimthann means 'fox' or perhaps 'red-haired'.) Because of his Gospel life and regular visits to the Church, his monastic nickname (or was it his baptismal name?) was Colum Cille ('Dove of the Church'). His alertness to the inspiration of the Spirit of love may also have helped to earn him the title.

Characteristics of monastic/Celtic spirituality

The word monk originally meant a hermit but was generally applied to anyone who 'left the world' to live in community. It was founded on the natural religious spirit of the Celtic people. They made no formal distinction between the sacred and the secular, the material and the spiritual. There was a profound sense of the presence of God in all created reality. Religion permeated the whole of life. It was marked by a pre-occupation with mystery which leavened everyday experiences. There was a great consciousness of the Communion of Saints, that intimacy with all members of the Mystical Body of Christ, those living and those dead. In the rule attributed to him he requests the monk to 'perform the prayers for the dead with fervour, as if every one of the faithful who died were a special friend of yours'. The monastic rule of 'pray daily, fast daily, study daily and work daily' deeply influenced the life of the Irish.

Iona

In 563 he became a 'pilgrim for Christ's sake' and set out for Scotland. The theological reason for this was to

imitate Abraham, our father in faith, who left his country at the invitation of God.

That journey would influence the course of history. It began the spread of the Irish monastic tradition. There were 150 monks in Iona. Each of his monasteries had a network of affiliated monasteries. After his death in 597 some 60 monastic communities had been founded around the coast of Scotland. Thus began the spread of the Irish monastic tradition.


The legacy of Colum Cille

He stands among the great Irish saints who were also scholars, lovers of books, learning and teaching.

Poet, monk, lover of beauty, man of prayer and action, diplomat, trouble-shooter and wonder worker. The spirit of enthusiasm permeated his life. As a scholar he developed the skill of manuscript illumination. He defended the bards on the assumption that poetry was an important part of Irish life.

Books and beautifully designed books are associated with him and his monasteries. He belonged to a period that produced this island's major art treasures; the Book of Durrow, which contains an early medieval manuscript copy of the Four Gospels, and the Book of Kells are associated with monasteries that he founded. Tradition associates him with monasteries at Derry, Raphoe, Swords, Lambay Island, Inchmore in Lough Gowna, Kells, Durrow, Glasnevin and, of course, Knocklyon.

He died in Iona on June 9th, 597. Columbanus and himself are said to have had the greatest influence in the development of western European civilisation. - Fr. Jimmy



Some discussion took place on whether there are groups in the parish that are not being catered for and how the parish is meeting the needs of the traveller community and, also, on what the needs of non-nationals might be in our community. Parish Team members will follow up these issues further.

In 2003 the Knocklyon Parish Forum decided to reactivate the Parish-based Rainbows site. A number of members of the Forum expressed an interest in getting involved in Rainbows and they attended a Rainbows Facilitators training course. A public 'Rainbows Information Meeting' was then held in May 2003 and this meeting threw up more volunteers who were willing to get involved. The Knocklyon Parish Rainbows site now has 13 trained facilitators. This does not automatically mean that we can facilitate 13 groups as for one reason or another not everyone is available at the same time. It was then decided to run a parish based Rainbows programme for school-going children aged between 5 and 12 years old. This programme ran from October 2003 to February 2004 and was rounded off with a very successful 'Celebrate Me Day' in March 2004. We had seven groups and over 30 children participated in this programme.

The task of facilitating a Rainbows group seemed very daunting beforehand. The usual human doubts creep into one's mind – will I be able for this? Will I be able to talk with and listen to a group of children that I don't know (initially)? How will I react if the discussion gets very emotional or angry? Will I really be able to help them in any way? Will they come back for the second session? As it turned out the experience was very rewarding. You get to know the children pretty quickly and you develop a style or system to conduct your session. The structure of the Rainbows programme makes it relatively easy for the facilitator and the participants can be as involved as they want to be – some may just want to sit and listen. It can be difficult for some initially but I think that the experience of our programme was that they all engaged in it eventually.

Rainbows is a Registered Charity and was founded in America by Suzy Yehl Marta to help children who have been bereaved through parental death, parental separation or parental divorce, to work through the grieving process which follows any significant loss. Well over a million children and young people have taken part in Rainbows. It is described as a 'peer support programme to assist children, adolescents and adults who are grieving a death, separation or other painful transitions in their family.' It helps by providing a safe setting in which children can talk through their feelings with other children who are experiencing similar situations. They are helped to articulate their feelings by an adult facilitator or listener. A Rainbows programme is conducted in small groups of between 3 and 5 children of the same age and usually runs for 12 weeks. Rainbows provides materials, journals, storybooks, games and activities which forms a structured programme to lead the children gently through the grieving process.

In view of the success of the 2003/2004 programme it is planned to start a further programme for children of a similar age group in September 2004.

To the many people who got involved with the true spirit of the clean-up, well done, and to those who sneaked in after dark to dump their unwanted rubbish – shame on you.



IT'S GOOD TO TALK ... AND LISTEN

But before you can do this with your child you need to know your facts, you need to know what the various drugs are and what they do, this will increase your credibility in your child's eyes which will help him/her feel that you can be trusted when it comes to talking about drugs.

'Between the ages of 10 and 13 most children will have tasted alcohol, usually at home and with their parents' permission', however some children experiment without their parents' knowledge, maybe by helping themselves from the family drinks cabinet. By the age of 14 they will at least know someone who smokes hash and will be curious to try ecstasy.'

So far we have looked at the illegal drugs Cannabis, LSD and Ecstasy. This month we have a look at the illegal drug Amphetamine Sulphate.

What it's called: Speed, Whizz, Uppers.

What you'll get: Speed is very common among young people and is becoming more available. It is sold in 'Raps' (about half a gram) of white or pink crystalline powder in a paper envelope like pouch.

What'll you do with it: Speed is commonly snorted up the nose, but can also be swallowed or drunk with liquids. It can sometimes be injected and the risks from injecting are the same as other drugs, such as heroin. A type known as 'ice' or 'crystal' can be smoked.

What'll that do to you? After about twenty minutes, the user will start to feel the effects of the drug. Heightened awareness and a sense of elation is experienced. The user will babble at lengths and will be friendly towards anyone they meet. Energy levels are increased. The user will find it difficult to sleep and appetite will be suppressed often for a long period after the drug is taken.

Will it effect me in the long-term? In more ways than you think. As with other stimulant drugs, users experience a 'crash' after the 'high' caused by the drug. High doses of amphetamines can cause panic, paranoia and hallucinations. With long-term use, a condition known as 'amphetamine psychosis' can develop, with symptoms similar to schizophrenia. The paranoia can cause people to become violent if they believe they are being threatened or persecuted.

New President from Knocklyon

The Academy of Medical Laboratory Science, the professional body for medical scientists in Ireland has a new President, Christine Long. Christine resides with her husband Greg and son Eoin in Dargle Wood.

She began her career by studying at the DIT, Kevin Street, when it was the College of Technology. She then went



to Coventry, Bristol and finally to Coleraine where she gained her MSc, with distinction. More recently she achieved her Diploma in Training and Education from NUIG, a course of study she enjoyed immensely.

Throughout her working life, Christine has experience of both large and small hospital laboratories in Ireland and Australia. Besides her love of medical science, she also has an interest in management and education and training, in particular how they relate to medical scientists. In recent years she has lectured on management and education programmes as a member of the associate faculty of the National College of Ireland and as guest lecturer of the AMLS/NUIG programme on training and education.





CHILDMINDERS' ADVISORY SERVICE

The Childminders' Advisory Service has been set up to support and advise Childminders who work in their own homes looking after children and are not covered by the current Childcare (Pre-School) Regulations.

To assist Childminders in their work the Department of Justice, Equality and Law Reform has introduced grants for the purchase of small capital items and equipment.

The grant is designed to assist Childminders, already providing a Childminding Service in their own home to enhance safety/quality in the service through the purchase of small capital items, equipment, toys or minor adaptation costs.

It may also give financial assistance to new or prospective Childminders with their initial set-up costs.

The maximum grant available is 90% of total expenditure to the maximum of \le 630, i.e. spend \le 700 claim back 90% = \le 630.


