From these causes, from the conditions of the senson, and from the continued impor-tance of the Italian theatre, it seems likely that a prolonged period of comparative im-activity is probable in France. It is note-worthy that in these new arrangements no menuion is made of Americal Array units. The new Allied War Council does not appear in the least likely to make for unity in any real sense. Such unity can only be attained by direct single control, such as the German High Coammand exercises over the Austrian, Bulgarian and Turkish Armiss-though without any undue inter-perence in details. Nothing else is a unity that counts for anything of importance.
