





Our April meeting took place on 15th, and although it was the Wednesday before Easter we had a very good attendance. Our speaker for the night was Miss Finnuala Reid from the Botanic Gardans, who proved to be a very able speaker indeed. Miss Reid's approach was practical and unassuming. Knowing that we all have a lot to learn she started off by recommending some books which would be a valuable source of information to us, and she pointed out that quite a lot of information on plants can be obtained quite easily from Seed Catalogues. English catalogues in particular can be really helpful because they are usually more lavishly illustrated and give wider information than their Irish counterparts.

Wisely Miss Reid came to the meeting armed with a very varied selection of cuttings from her own garden. These were used not only to show what one should grow but also to illustrate what one should not grow. She contended that if a plant just grows in a garden, looking green but uninteresting, there is no point in having it at all. A plant should be kept either for its good foliage, its spectacular flowers or its pleasant perfume, but there is no point in giving it space if it has none of these qualities. As each cutting was discussed it was passed around to the members so that it could be inspected more closely, and this was a very good idea as very often the full impact of a plant, and in particular its perfume, cannot be gained from a slide. Throughout this part of the evening members were encouraged to ask questions and were helped with suggestions and advice.

The second part of the evening was devoted to slides which Miss Reid had taken in the Botanic Gardens, at the Chelsea Flower Show, and out and about in the countryside. She pointed out that very often we can get many lovely flowers from country lanes, mountainsides and even at the seaside. However, she did emphasise that it is not necessary to dig up the whole plant, thereby denuding the countryside of its natural wild flowers. It is usually only necessary to take a cutting of the flower in question

and normally this will root in the same way as any ordinary cutting.

As Miss Reid lives in Harold's Cross she knew the type of soil which we have to contend with in the Templeogue area, and was well able to advise on the treatment required for special plants which give us trouble. At the close our Chairman thanked her for a most enjoyable talk and Miss Reid was warmly applauded by all At the interval we had a raffle for a handsomely illustrated book on gardening and this was won by Amy Daly from Templeville Drive, who had only enrolled that evening. We are happy to see new members still coming to join us.

We are also delighted with the response for the Spring Outing on 3rd May. It has been a complete "sell-out" and the bus was declared full at 53. At present we have a waiting list of nine people in case there are any cancellations. We hope all our members will make a particular note to book early next time as if we had known early enough that there would be so much interest shown we could have made alternative travel arrangements, and in that way could have accommodated everyone. It is a shame that some had to be disappointed.

For those who will be travelling a final reminder that we shall meet at 1 o'clock at Fortfield Shopping Centre on Sunday 3rd May. The bus will leave at 1.15 sharp so we hope that everyone will make a special effort to be on time, as we have a very full day ahead of us. Re: Proposed Change of name - Cypress Garth to Ashfield Garth.

I have been informed by Dublin County Council of the Prescribed Statutory Notice having been given in the Public Press, it is recommended that the Council adopt the list of ratepayers in Cypress Garth, Templeogue, for the purpose of taking Statutory Plebiscite in connection with the proposal to change the name of Cypress Garth, Templeogue, to Ashfield Garth, Templeogue.

Residents in the Wainsfort Road area expressed concern to me on the fact that C.I.E. buses were using Wainsfort Road although it is not an official bus route. The following letter from C.I.E. is in answer to representations made by me through Dublin County Council on the matter:

"I refer to your letter of March 10th regarding the use of Wainsfort Road by C.I.E. buses.

Whilst Wainsfort Road is not part of a bus route, situations can arise which make it desirable for buses to traverse this road to a limited extent.

I regret any difficulties caused by buses operating along Wainsfort Road, and I have taken the necessary steps to ensure that the use of this road by buses is kept to an absolute minimum.

I trust that this will be to the satisfaction of the Mid County District Committee."

In the circumstances I have requested the Superintendent of the Garda Siochana to investigate the position at the above location and take whatever steps may be necessary to prohibit this unlawful trading activity.

I will keep your readers advised as to further developments.







Dear Secretary,

The protection of the Environment is a matter of concern to Dublin County Council and to each Residents' Association. It is very important to us all that the surroundings in which we live should be kept in as clean and tidy a condition as possible. An essential element in maintaining the quality of our environment is the cleanliness of our streams and water-courses. Unfortunately, these are under constant attack in our built-up areas. We are all aware of the unsightliness of indiscriminate dumping in our open spaces and stream channels. However, in the last few years there has been an even more insidious assault on the quality of these waters, as a result of the widespread misconnection of discharge pipes from washing machines and dishwashers.

In the Dublin area almost all houses are served totally separate foul and surface water systems. Only the clean rainwater run-off from roofs and paths should be connected to the surface water sewers, which ultimately discharge to streams and rivers. All other wastes from kitchens, toilets and bathrooms should be connected to the foul sewers and these receive special treatment before discharge to sea or river, in a purified state. Many householders are unaware of the existence of these separate sewer systems and when the discharge from newly installed washing machines or dishwashers is being connected to the sewer systems, the nearest and most convenient sewer is often selected for this connection. Unfortunately when this sewer happens to be the surface water sewer the result is that the polluted contents of the appliance are ultimately discharged to a stream or water-course with consequent major deterioration in the quality and appearance of these receiving waters. This has been happening on an ever-increasing scale in the Dublin area over the last few years and when detected by Dublin County Council results often in appreciable expense for the householder who must take corrective action in re-connecting his washing unit to the foul sewer. We are satisfied that these problems could often be avoided if householders could be alerted to the situation before installing a new dishwasher or washing machine. Householders with existing units might also check the discharge pipes from these to ensure that they are connected to the right system and, if not, to remedy the position.

We would very much appreciate any assistance you can give in bringing this problem to the attention of individual householders, who are members of your Association. If they are in any doubt or require specialist advice from Council staff on the pipe systems within their property we shall be delighted to arrange for a special visit of our staff to assist them.

I would be grateful if you would arrange for the insertion of the attached advice in your Association's Newsletter if it is not possible to quote this letter in full.

Templeogue Community YOUTH CLUB


Congratulations are extended to Brian and Carmel, the youth leaders, who recently got married. We would like to wish them all the best for the future.

At a recent meeting of the mid-County District Committee I tabled the following motion:-

"That the Traffic Study Group be requested to take immediate action to have traffic lights erected at the Templeville/Glendown Road junction, as it has now become almost impossible to

make an exit from Glendown in safety and that this matter be discussed as an item of urgenay".

I received the following reply:

"When this matter was first discussed by the Traffic Study Group the volume of traffic leaving the estate did not justify the provision of traffic signals. However, further counts have been scheduled for this junction, and it is hoped to make a report to the May meeting of the Traffic Study Group."

I am delighted to report that immediate action is to be taken at this dangerous junction, and I would appeal to ALL residents of the area to take extreme care as a number of accidents have taken place between the two roundabouts in recent weeks, especially since the new Garage has commenced operations.

I am sorry to report that no money is available in this year's estimates for the pedestrian crossing at Cypress Grove Park shops which was approved some time ago.

Those of you who attended the A.G.M. of the Templeville & Fortfield Residents' Association will remember PRog a report by Mr. Joe O'Gorman of the Southern Cross Group. Mr. O'Gorman stated that no further work could be undertaken until the Consultant's Report was available to the Council for approval and for submission to the Minister for the Environment. I have since raised this matter at Council level and the County Manager stated that the necessary tests, etc., had taken longer than expected, but he hoped to have the Report before the Council in June/July.

I have also raised the matter of the unfinished grass verges at Wains fort Road shops, and I would like to tell the residents of the area that the pegs will be lifted shortly and repainted and the grass cut.

I would like to inform the Residents' Associations in the Templeogue area that I am always availad to give any assistance that is required at any time.
