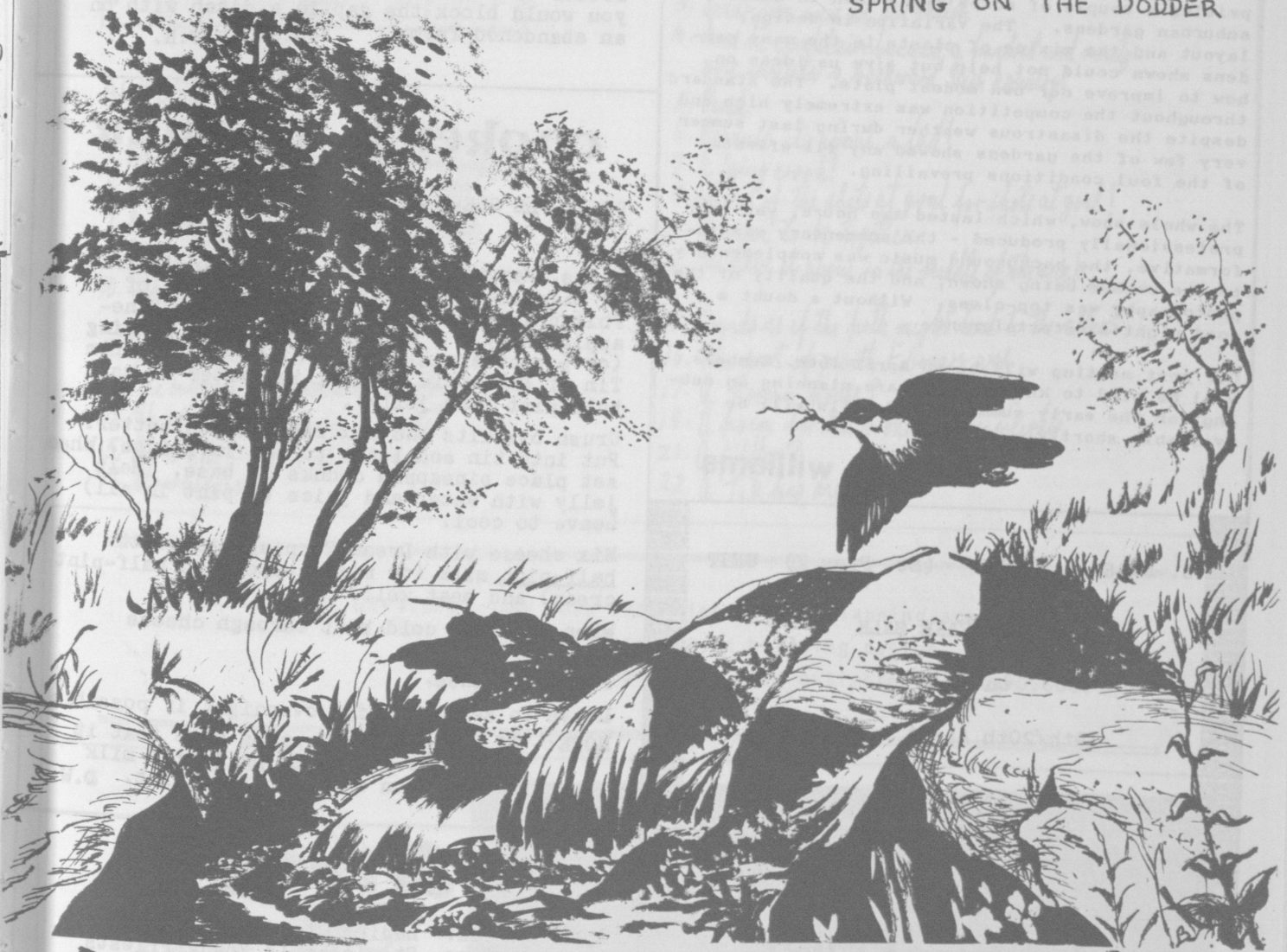

Our March meeting featured the audio-visual show of the finals of the National Gardens Competition 1985, presented by Mr. Mark Downes, and it attracted a large number of members and non-members. Five minutes before 8 o'clock there was a moment of minor panic when a small electrical fault in the equipment threatened to prevent the show's going ahead but fortunately Mr. Downes was able to rectify it and the show got under way at 8.10 p.m.

The film covered a wide variety of gardens throughout Ireland ranging from very large gardens comprising a couple of acres right down to small suburban gardens. The variation in design, layout and the mixing of plants in the many gardens shown could not help but give us ideas on how to improve our own modest plots. The standard throughout the competition was extremely high and despite the disastrous weather during last summer very few of the gardens showed any ill effects of the foul conditions prevailing.

The whole show, which lasted two hours, was very professionally produced - the commentary was informative, the background music was complementary to the scenes being shown, and the quality of the photography was top-class. Without a doubt a good night's entertainment.

## COOKERY CORNER

### PINEAPPLE CHEESECAKE

3 ozs. Margarine or Butter; 1 Large packet of Digestive Biscuits; Large Packet of Philadelphia Cream Cheese; 1 Lemon/Pineapple Jelly. 1 sachet Birds Dream Topping (or  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint cream)  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint Milk; Juice from Tin of Pineapple and boiling water to make half-pint (for jelly).

Crush biscuits and mix with melted butter. Put into tin and leave to set in fridge. When set place pineapple chunks on base. Melt jelly with water and juice ( $\frac{1}{2}$  pint in all) Leave to cool.

Mix cheese with Dream Topping made with half-pint milk (or mix cheese with half-pint cream) and beat well.

When jelly is cold beat through cheese mixture.

Pour over base.

Leave to set in fridge overnight if possible.

NOTE: If using Dream Topping note that it should be made with half-pint milk rather than usual quarter pint. D.W.

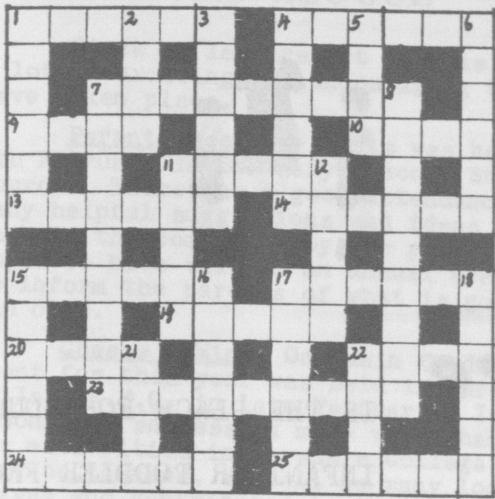

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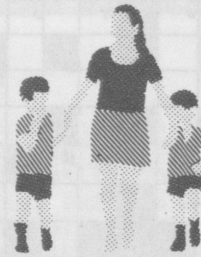

# A Noble Sport Still Thrives In Dublin

In the past few years the game of bowling has received considerable cover on the television screen, and has gained a large viewing audience who appreciate the high level of skill and indeed the excitement of the contests. Such new publicity may indicate that the game is of fairly recent origin. This is so as regards the playing of it on a synthetic surface in a covered stadium. However, the game which is most widely played on grass lawns is very old in history, and was the sport of kings, queens and commoners, dating back to the sixteenth century. Shakespeare refers to it and records show that in Dublin there were bowling greens over two hundred and fifty years ago in the area which is now Suffolk Street, in Marlborough Street, Oxmantown Road, and in Trinity College.

The modern game was developed last century and the first club with its own lands and premises was founded by Kenilworth Bowling Club in 1892. The club is now engaged in plans towards celebrating its 100th birthday in six years time. Dublin has several clubs of good standard, and three are convenient to residents in the Templeogue area. These are Kenilworth in Grosvenor Square, Rathmines, Catholic Young Mens Society, Terenure Road, and the Leinster Club, Observatory Lane, Rathmines Road.

Some of the advantages of the sport are that being basically a game of skill it can be played on an equal footing by both men and women. An adequate level of skill can be obtained quickly to provide considerable enjoyment in play. In modern values it is not an expensive pursuit and a set of bowls will last a lifetime.

There are people who whilst viewing the game with interest may not wish to join a club as absolute beginners and incur expenditure until they are confident that they will enjoy playing. To assist them, Kenilworth Bowling Club intends to run a series of tuition and practice sessions in April. At the conclusion of these, beginners will be in a position to decide whether they wish to become bowlers, and if so, they will be considered for membership of the club. There is no fee involved, but course places are limited and confined to men of eighteen years and upwards. It is regretted that the courses cannot be extended to ladies as the membership of the Club's Ladies Section is almost full for this season.

Those who wish to give bowling a trial should write as soon as possible to the Honorary Secretary, Kenilworth Bowling Club, Grosvenor Square, off Leinster Road, Rathmines, for details.

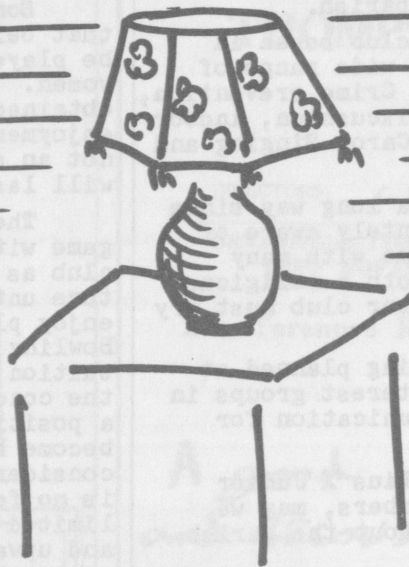
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# POETRY CORNER

## COUNCILLOR LYNCH

A Planning Application was made recently for a hot food take-away shop on Wainsfort Drive, opposite Kavanagh's Pub. With the support of the other local Councillors, I recommended that the application should be refused as it would cause further traffic congestion and general nuisance on that Cul-de-Sac. The planning office will make a decision on the application during the first week of April.

I have asked questions about street signs at several recent Council meetings. Here are some examples of answers which I have received:

The sign for Fortfield Drive (Fortfield Road end) has "been ordered and will be erected on delivery".

No directional sign will be erected for Ashfield Estate as "it is not Council policy to do so".

A temporary directional sign will be erected on Cypress Grove Road for Fortrose Park because Fortrose Park "is not yet shown on the ordinance survey maps".

While I am not one to make a mountain out of a mole-hill, or a saga out of a street sign, I will pursue these and other similar requests until the signs are properly placed (permanently).

The E.S.B. have assured me that the works on Fortfield Park will result in a better service. The holes they have left on the car park area were for access to the cables and should be filled in before the end of March.

Few issues have raised as much community tension over the years as itinerant settlement. This explains why Dublin County Council's record in actually dealing with the problem is so bad.

The proposal of the now Fianna Fail controlled council to have two settlement sites for five families each, in each electoral area received my support, although I had no influence on the location of the sites. We are to have one site in Kimmage Manor (Whitehall Road East) and one on the constituency boundary at Tymon Lane.

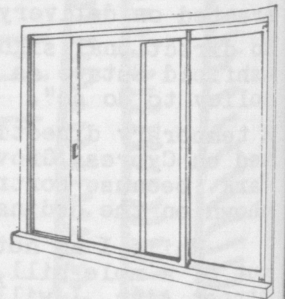


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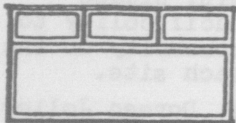

# BATHTIME

On a bad day, bathtime feels like the last hurdle in the Grand National - one effort before the winning post to bed.

Chaos reigns in the kitchen. A trail of toys lies everywhere, there has been a battle of wits and wills to get the children to the bathroom - and they fiddle about instead of getting undressed.

If I dash to fetch clean nightclothes, on my return I find the bath towels lying in a soggy heap, drenched in a tidal wave, and one child is crying because her hair is wet as well. On these days, there is a hasty rubover with a soapy flannel, a quick rinse and out - protestation or not. And with grim determination I attempt to contain in a clean dry towel what feels like a yellow squirming octopus, trying to dry the arms and legs before putting them into nightclothes and bed.

On a good day, I can chat and sing my way upstairs, and give them all the time they need to do all the things I remember doing at their age. Time to float and sink the duck with a hole in it and fail to sink the new one which pops straight up to the surface however many times we push it down to the bottom. Time to scrub the side of the bath with the nail-brush, and lose the soap in the water now cloudy with the soapsuds. So much time that the water grows chilly and the wet flannels are plastered on chests. Then, the plug is pulled and there's the last-minute scramble to be lifted out before being sucked down the plughole!

We need to remember our childhood, for it is these shared memories that bring us closer to our children. If we learn to share memories of what we did then we also can share with them how we felt, which helps them to identify with us as people.

Mother used to say, "If you start and end the day clean I don't mind what happens in between". I suppose most of us see our children's bathtime as a practical way of removing the day's grime before getting into a clean bed - with playtime in the bath a bonus. But for children, bathtime can be more than that. It is important for children's mental health that they are allowed to get dirty during their play and just as important to discover that dirt washes off. There is a great deal of satisfaction in the magic of "now it's clean again". Children need to confirm this understanding by washing and scrubbing all sorts of articles and surfaces as well as themselves. Their washing of themselves and other objects is a way of saying "I can make dirtiness and naughtiness, but also, make cleanliness and goodness."

The bad days are the very ones that need to end on a warm peaceful, optimistic note. If the day has been full of upsets leading to bad feelings about everything and everybody, then a warm relaxing bath can wash it away.

Never withhold a goodnight kiss, which says "it's been a bad day, darling, but I love you and we'll start again tomorrow."

This ceremony was the commencement of "National Tree Week" from 9th to 16th March. Do you know?— the tallest tree in the world is the Giant Redwood found in California, U.S.A. and when last measured was 362 ft. The oldest tree is found in the White Mountains, once again in California, and reckoned to be 4,600 years old.

Reply: Naming scheme for Cypress Downs submitted by Developer and approved by Council in 1981. The following names were approved - Cypress Drive, The Avenue, The Close, The Court, The Green, The Heath, The Manor, The Park, The Walk. The early erection of nameplates is being pursued with Developer.

**Refuse Collection:** Failure to collect refuse for two weeks in February.  
Reply: Refuse collection employees considered the roads unfit for work because of weather conditions on Friday 7th and a dispute ensued leading to a refusal to collect the backlog on following Thursday and Friday. A meeting was to be arranged to avoid such stoppages in the future.
