

# YOU AND YOUR MICROWAVE

All recipes in this leaflet were tested 0.1 a 600w Bejam microwave Model BM618. This model features variable power control which gives a range of energy output (wattage) which enables the user to select a slower cooking process for different foods.

If your microwave has a top setting of 700w or less than 600w, it will be necessary to adjust as follows:

650w: Test dish just before end of cooking time.
700w top setting: Reduce timings by 9 seconds in every minute.
500w top setting: Add 9 seconds in every minute.
400-500w top setting: Add approximately 12 seconds in every minute.
On lower powered microwaves, cooking is very much a matter of trial

Microwave settings vary from machine to machine. The power guide chart below will help to find the right setting.

# Something to tempt you this Christmas

#### **CREAMY RUM FUDGE**

11b (450g) Tate & Lyle Icing Sugar 1 6.91oz (196g) can sweetened condensed milk 2 tbsp (30ml) Lyle's Golden Syrup

2oz (50g) butter, cubed 1 tbsp (15ml) rum 1 tbsp (15ml) Lyle's Black Treacle

- 1. Mix ingredients together in large heat proof bowl.

- Fold flour into the creamed mixture, alternatively with the cocoa, until evenly mixed, pour into prepared dish
- Cook on High for 12 minutes until well risen and cake springs back when pressed with the fingertips. Cake may be slightly sticky on the surface.
- Leave to stand for 5 to 10 minutes. Turn out onto a wire tray to cool completely.
- Melt chocolate in a bowl for 2 minutes on High. Spread chocolate on leaves and leave in refrigerator to set Make icing.

loz (25g) butter 20z (50g) Tate & Lyle Demerara Sugar 3 tbsp (45ml) cold water

- Place the butter and sugar into a large bowl. Blend the cocoa with the cold water and add to the bowl with the milk

- Heat until boiling, then allow to boil for 2½ minutes.
- Add the icing sugar, warm water and vanilla essence. Mix well, then beat for 5 minutes
- Pour over the cake whilst still warm.

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#### THE TEMPLEOGUE POLITICAL SCENE



First of all may I say a very big and sincere THANK YOU to all who cooperated with me on the day of the Marathon to help preserve our Roundabout. As many will know the early morning was very wet and if thousands were allowed to stand and walk across it, it would be in a very bad state today. Again thank you.

Well, Templeogue is very much alive and kicking. Since I last wrote to you I have attended a number of very important meetings in the area.

First of all may I congratulate the Templeogue Ladies Club in focussing attention on the area in this the European Year of the Environment and I would like to wish them well in their project and appeal to all for their cooperation and maybe next year with this extra initiative we might get 1st. in the Tidy Districts Competition. I am delighted to report that the Council are prepared to supply seat/seats for the Open Space adjacent to College Park where a number of our reisdents play bowls.

Congratulations to the Residents of Wainsfort/College and Cypress area for re-activating their organisations and I am sure this will bare fruit in the future. Cypress have already had a meeting supported by the Gardai to introduce the Neighbourhood Watch. The settlement programme for the Travelling People and in particular the proposed site in Kimmage Manor is a continual concern to our community. However, I am very pleased to report that the Provinciate have turned down the site. At a recent debate in the Council it was noted that the maintenance of the sites in existance cost over £500,000 for 1987 with no support from Government funding. I attach a report following my return at a recent meeting.

I also raised the matter of the lack of finance in this years estimates in this the European Year of the Environment for

tree planting throughout the county which has done so much to enhance our areas. If we don't get money for this important area once again the community will be called upon to replace broken trees and to supply new ones.

A report on this matter is attached. Many residents have been in touch with me regarding the Annual Junk collection but once again through lack of finance the Council are unable to fill this function. However a skip can be supplied in a central location and the

Council well do the necessary collection. I am sure our very active Residents Association would be prepared to circularise the area.

A large sum of money is included in the Council Estimates for the maintenance of lighting but owing to the cut backs in financial support there will be no extra lights erected in the coming year which is a great disappointment to the older areas.

Proposed site for Travelling Families at Kimmage Manor, Terenure.

MOTION: Councillor S. Laing.

"That the Manager report on his recent meeting with the Provinciate of Kimmage Manor and that in view of the combined opposition of all the local residents' associations adjoining Kimmage Manor to any itinerant halting site within the property that this Committee recommend to the Council the deletion of any proposed site for Kimmage Manor and that the Manager seek another site from the Terenure Electoral area and that this matter be discussed".

REPORT

The County Council adopted a programme of 30 sites over 15 electoral areas for the settlement of the travelling people in the County at its meeting held on the 10th. March, 1986 including the proposed site at Kimmage Manor. Excluded from that programme were 5 electoral areas where developments for travelling people had been already approved or were in progress. The exclusion of these areas from the revised programme was considered fair and equitable as they had already been required to provide the level of accommodation for travelling people that the new areas are now being asked to provide. Any decision by the Committee to delete a site from the revised programme will result in a re-examination of those areas for replacement sites to make up the shortfall, thus increasing unfairly the number of sites in areas of the County which have suffered most from the problem i.e. Tallaght and Clondalkin. It would be unjust and unfair to revise the current programme in a manner that could result in designating an additional site or sites in these areas.

Responsibility for meeting the needs of the travelling people is a communal one and the decision of the Council in determining 2 sites of 5 families each is based on this premise. It is considered that the decision is an equitable one and that such a sharing of responsibility is

just and sensitive to the settled community in general and to the travellers themselves.

It is also considered that the Council's proposals may not be fully understood as yet by some local communities. What is proposed in each locality is a settlement of 5 families only in a high standard development with full basic living conditions including shower facilities, refuse collection etc: not the type of unauthorised untidy roadside encampments, which is the image most communities have of the travlling community. The sites will be fully maintained and managed, hopefully with the help of a local committee and will be suitably screened from the roadside so that there will be a minimum of evidence of the developments visible to the general public.

Several meetings have been held with local residents and the Holy Ghost Fathers to discuss the proposal and explain the Council's arrangements for construction of the site, management and maintenance of the site and the level of support services to the families which would be settled on the site. Despite these meetings however local opposition to the proposal has remained and in a recent letter the Provincial has indicated, with regret, that due to this opposition the site cannot be made availablen

Virtually all proposed sites on the Council's previous and current Programme have been opposed by local residents. Despite this opposition five halting sites were successfully established under the previous Programme and the Council is well advanced in relation to a number of sites under the new Programme despite this opposition. If the Council is to meet its statutory responsibility and make progress in its Programme it cannot afford to undemine the whole Programme by deleting individual sites because of local opposition. Any decision to amend Programme because of local opposition would have disastrous "knock on" consequences for the Programme as a whole which must be opposed.

It is proposed to continue discussions with the Holy Ghost Fathers and the Committee will be kept informed of developments.

Unfortunately I lost this motion with only Mr. McMahon supporting the motion, I lost by 10.2

Wainsfort Park/Wainsfort Road

Laneway.

Question: Councillor S. Laing.

"To ask the Manager when can some repair work be carried out on the laneway between Wainsfort Park and Wainsfort Road as it is in a very bad condition and elderly people are having great difficulty walking and it is being continually flooded during bad weather".

REPLY:

It is not accepted that there is flooding at this location; however there is evidence of ponding after heavy rainfall.

While it was hoped to undertake the patching of the concrete surface of this laneway in the current years, it is now extremely unlikely that it can be done due to the number of higher priority works in the area Engineer's programme to be completed out of 1987 monies. It can however be done in 1988 if the level of funding anticipated in the Draft Road Works Scheme is maintained.

Item No. 22

Templeogue Village and Templeville Road.

Question: Councillor S. Laing.

"To ask the Manager if the Council can undertake the maintenance of the Laneway Templeogue Village with Templeville Drive".

This laneway is cleaned and swept as often as resources permit.

Item No. 101

Templeville Road/Fortfield Park Traffic Signals.

Motion: Councillor S. Laing.

"That the Manager report on the results of the recent count at the Templeville/Fortfield traffic lights and does the Manager now agree that the

pedestrian lights should be replaced by a full traffic signal at the request of the residents of the area".

REPLY

The provision of traffic signals with a pedestrian phase at this location was recommended by the Traffic Study Group at its October meeting. However, having regard to the level of funding anticipated in the draft estimats for 1988, it will not be possible to provide these signals in 1988.

At last approval, but no money for the present. I shall continue to look for funding for this important matter.

It is proposed subject to the level of funding anticipated in the draft estimates for 1988 being maintained to provide right turning filter arrows from Templeville Road towards Templeogue Village and from Springfield Avenue towards Terenure. The signal company which maintains these signals on behalf of the County Council has been asked to prepare details of the additional equipment necessary to submit a quotation. The estimated cost of the work involved is £1,500.

"To ask the Manager how the Templeogue Ladies Club E.Y.E., project can be assisted in having visually pleasing litter bins placed along Templeville Road; Templeville Road is extensively used by students going and coming to the many schools in the area?"

REPLY:

The practice in regard to the provision of litter bins is that they are provided where people tend to congregate eg., shops etc., and Templeville Road will be



examined in this context. A list of locations in the Templeogue area has been submitted by the Templeogue Ladies Club and they indicated they hoped to have sponsorship for the provision of these litter bins.

In general the Council would support the concept of sponsorship provided matters relating to siting, maintenance and servicing of the bins is acceptable. The Council would not be in a position to service additional bins in the area because it is not covered by a handcart man.


Item No. 11

Wainsfort Road - Pedestrian Crossing. *Question: Councillor S. Ardagh.* 

"To ask the Manager to restart the process of providing pedestrian corssing on Wainsfort Road at Wainsfort Drive, College Park and near to the junction with Templeville Road?".

REPLY

The provision of a pedestrian crossing at the junction of Wainsfort Road/Wainsfort Drive was not recommended by the Traffic Study Group at its meeting in April, 1987. However, the extension of the double vellow lines at this location has since been recommended and referred to the Dublin Transport Authority for formal consultation with the Council before issuing a statutory request. The other two locations will be examined by the traffic engineer and if necessary counts carried out and report to the Traffic Study Group for its recommendation to the relevant authority. There is no provision in the Draft Estimates 1988 for any additional pedestrian crossings.



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
