The Church Shop is run on a voluntary work basis and all profits go into the Parish Funds. So everytime you buy something, no matter how small, you are helping to clear the Church debt.
Why not drop in and look around, We are open after 9 a.m. and 10 a.m. Mass - Monday to Saturday and on Sundays after 10 a.m., 11 a.m., 12 noon and 7 p.m. Masses.

"From small beginnings great things come!", or so we say - but we are a bit biased! The Knocklyon Folk Group is alive and 'singing' at 12.00 Mass each Sunday. From a handful of people in 1975 the group has grown and expanded to, would you believe, not less than 40 people!!

To help us realize our role in the Mass, several members have gone to the Gort Mhuire Conference Centre for folk week-ends and day seminars, which have proved very successful. Also successful have been our yearly outings to places such as Powerscourt and Glendalough which are always followed by a party!

But, believe it or not, we do find time to sing at home here in Knocklyon. Every Sunday 'hail, rain, sleet, or snow', you will find us practising at $11.00 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. in the school for our $12.00 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. "show"! As if that was not enough we have another practise at $7.45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. in the church inevitably followed by coffee and biscuits.

Finally, as you are most probably aware, we are 'singing' out for males. So if you are interested and over 15 years, do not hesitate to contact the Presbytery or any of the Folk Group Members. As Father Staunton once said; ". . . marriages begin in Folk Groups . . ."!!!!

As you can imagine, with at least twenty kids sharing so few toys they don't last long, i.e. the toys! . . . Yes . .i. we do need toys - big or small, old or new. We will gratefully accept any and all contributions, which will also be used for the "Toddlers Morning" and suchlike.

All in all, the creche has been and will continue to be, we hope, a great success. We have been

informed that the noise level has been reduced, if only slightly. People are able to 'drop' their kiddies and concentrate more on the Mass in something like peace and quiet.

## REDUNDANCY - CAN OUR COMMUNITY HELP?

In the present time of economic constraints, which have led to diminished living standards, very many redundancies and often consequent hardship, several parishioners have approached the priests with offers of help for those affected. We would like to take two initiatives, in an effort to channel the evident good will of those in a position to give help and thus assist in particular those without jobs.

In the longer term we propose to hold an open meeting on the second Tuesday of January (Jan. 10th) at which, as a christian community, we might explore ways and means of providing ongoing assistance - funds, job creation, local work projects or the like. We would try to set up some kind of appropriate structure to help alleviate the problems of the time.

In the shorter term we propose to open a fund which would be used to help families with the parish who are currently hard pressed, to celebrate Christmas in a fitting manner, namely with food on the table, proper heat and clothing, presents for the children and so on.

Contributions to this fund could be made to any one of the priests, or left in a box provided in the church. We would encourage those who are experiencing hardship to approach any of the priests, directly or indirectly, with assurance of the strictest confidence. Being unemployed today is no shame, but rather an unhappy circumstance which occasions the rightful concern of all who are fortunate enough to have work. As Christians, let us all remember that those in need have a right to expect assistance from those who can afford to give it. And reciprocally, those who have more than enough are obliged to share with those who have not.

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ST. COLMCILLES' - WHAT'S ON IN THE CHURCH AT CHRISTMAS TIME
Thursday Dec. 22nd, 8 p.m. Service of Reconciliation
Remember, in the Sacrament of Penance, we are celebrating Gods forgiving us, a truly joyful event and one which should, as far as possible, be experienced as such. Some of us, perhaps, are victims of an unfortunate emphasis on judgement, humiliation and unnecessary detail. This sacramental celebration will be quite different. At it, we pray and prepare together, listen to God's word to us and make common thanksgiving. Upwards of ten priests will be on hand to receive a brief confession of sin and to give absolution.
There will be further explanation at the ceremony. Meanwhile, let us just remember that we are all sinners dearly loved by God, and his forgiveness is ours for the asking.
Friday Dec. 23rd
A day of penance
. . . as from now on is every Friday! Here is an excerpt from the Guidelines issued by the Bishops' Conference, following the coming into force of the New Code of Canon Law:
"Because Friday recalls the crucifixion of Our Lord, it is set aside as a special penitential day. What the Church requires, according to the new code, is that its members abstain on Fridays from meat or some other food or that they perform some alternative work of penance laid down by the Bishops' Conference.
In accordance with the mind of the universal Church, the Irish Bishops remind their people of the obligation of Friday penance, and instruct them that it may be fulfilled in one or more of the following ways:
(i) By abstaining from meat or some other food:
(ii) By abstaining from alcoholic drink, smoking or some form of amusement;
(iii) By making the special effort involved in family prayer, taking part in the mass, visiting the Blessed Sacrament or praying the Stations of the Cross:
(iv) By fasting from all food for a longer period than usual and perhaps by giving what is saved in this way to the needy at home and abroad;
(v) By going out of our way to help somebody who is poor, sick, old or lonely. While the form of penance is an option and doesn't have to take the same form every Friday, the obligation to do penance is not. There is a serious obligation to observe Friday as a penitential day. We are confident that the Irish people as a whole will take this obligation to heart. We recommend that each person should choose some form of penance for Fridays, in memory as was Friday abstinence, of the Passion and Death of Our Lord.
