From Knocklyon to Katima Mulilo



Suzanne Downes

Suzanne was involved with Knocklyon Youth Club T.A.S.K. and the Parish Council, and we were delighted to receive her account of her new lifestyle in Namibia.

Namibia is a large, and country in South West Africa. It is bordered in the North by Angola and in the South by South Africa. Until 1990 Namibia was ruled by South Africa and it suffered the effects of Apartheid. In the eight years since independence there has been a lot of progress in Namibia and the government has been very successful in preventing tribal disagreements.

I am living in the North East of Namibia in an area called the Caprivi Strip. I am living in a town called Katima Mulilo which is the main commercial and administrative centre for the region. Katima Mulilo has a population of about 10,000 people and it consists of two supermarkets, six clothes shops, a bank, a post office, an open-air market, a hospital and some general shops. I am living five km. from the town centre on the Holy Family Mission. The Mission is situated on the banks of the Zambezi River, looking across to Zambia. The Mission consists of a church, a convent (of five Polish, three Zambian, and one Namibian nun), the priest's house (where Fr Luke lives – he is an Irish Capuchin Father from Cork who anived in Zambia in 1948). There is also a Cheshire Home (for children with physical disabilities), a girl's hostel, houses for teachers and workers in the school and Mission, a primary school (Malumba), and the secondary school where I work – Kizito College.

There are approximately 400 pupils in Kizito College. Most of the girls, about 200, are boarders and they stay in the girls' hostel. The pupils spend their first seven years of school in the primary school and then they transfer to Kizito College in Grade 8. At the end of Grade 10, the pupils sit for their Junior Secondary Certificate Examination and then at the end of Grade 12 they sit for the International General Certificate of Secondary Education Examination. School begins each moming at 6.15 a.m. and classes end at 12.05 p.m. Every afternoon, except Wednesday, the pupils return to school for supervised study between 1.45 p.m. and 3.25 p.m. On Wednesday afternoons there are sporting activities and Kizito College has a very successful Volleyball and Netball team.

I am teaching Grade 11 pupils which is equivalent to 5th year in Ireland. For many of my pupils, English is a challenge because it is their 4th or 5th language. Most children speak their own language (or two) at home, and then learn Silozi in school as a first language and then English is called their second language. In

general my pupils are very hardworking and just like pupils in Ireland, they have ambitions to study medicine, engineering, nursing etc. I hope to see many of them attending third level colleges before the end of my two year contract.

So far I've had a wonderful time here in Katima Mulilo. I have made some wonderful friends and I have really enjoyed teaching. Hopefully, I will write again soon and keep you up-to-date with what is happening here in Namibia!

The KCC welcomes readers after the summer break. It has been a busy summer with a number of developments of concern to the community, some more obvious than others.

KNOCKLYON COMMUNITY SCHOOL AND GAELSCOIL

The following is the text of a note received from the Department of Education's Building Unit and passed on to the KCC by Tom Kitt TD in relation to the Knocklyon Post-Primary School and the

"Architectural planning has commenced and it is hoped to have the school open for operation by September 2000. The Department's senior Architect recently met with a deputation from the proposed Knocklyon Gaelscoil which is seeking a portion of the site to construct a new Gaelscoil.

The architect explained that a portion of the site had been sold to An Bord Gais and that during the construction of a housing estate to the back of the site there had been an encroachment which had been the subject of a legal action by the Department. In addition a section of the front of the site is reserved for road widening by the local authority. Because of the other site conditions (a stream running through the site and a wayleave for the main drain) and the factors cited above the area of land is barely sufficient to build a second level school, let alone also include a Gaelscoil. In fact all the indications at present are that the Community School will have to be a two-storey building because of site restrictions. The Gaelscoil proponents have suggested that the play area could be shared between the two schools. Even if this could overcome the site restrictions (which it does not), the Department for policy reasons relating to discipline has never favoured children of primary and post-primary levels sharing the same play area

Accordingly, the Department will continue to proceed with the architectural planning of Knocklyon Community School on the basis that it alone will occupy the site at Scholarstown Road. There is no question of accommodating the Gaelscoil on the same site."

The KCC is delighted to note that planning is well under way for the Community School. We will monitor the situation to ensure that commitments are kept. We will also actively assist the Gaelscoil in attempting to find a suitable site for a premises.

TRAFFIC SITUATION AND THE SOUTHERN CROSS ROUTE

The KCC met with South Dublin County Council Officials recently to discuss the ongoing roads and traffic problems in the area. The County Council officials have taken a week to consider some of the matters and to study options. At time of writing, they told the KCC that they would come back to it with their considerations on the matter. The KCC had pursued the following matters with the Council:

(1) The pending closure of the Knocklyon Road link with Ballycullen Road.

(2 The need for foot/cycle paths at Delaneys junction.

(3) The Scholarstown Roundabout in the context of the opening of the Boden Park stretch of the Green Route.

Information Gleaned:

The Knocklyon Road link with Ballycullen may be closed by ASCON when it needs to but not without informing the County Council. This is not going to happen over the next few weeks. There would be significant cost considerations to ASCON in maintaining the link. A pedestrian right of way from Castlefield

The roads department of the County Council are looking at the overall traffic situation including the roundabout at the M50 and crossings of the river Dodder. The main problem is seen as the capacity of the Balrothery Roundabout.

The Scholarstown Road is to be widened at the school site

Traffic Lights may be considered at the Scholarstown Roundabout if they are deemed necessary. The County Council's safety officer is to consider the need for a Lollipop Person when the link at Boden Park is opened.

SUPERQUINN

Superquinn has been granted planning permission to develop its site at Knocklyon. This will involve a new sign, two extra units and a covered walkway. No reduction in carparking is envisaged. Two sections of funding are expected to be given to the County Council towards expected expenses in servicing this development.

EIRCELL ANTENNAE

The KCC has objected to an application made by Telecom Eireann for the retention of the existing Eircell GSM telecommunications antennae at the gable wall of Modern Networks Ltd at the Knocklyon Road. The KCC will be informed of the County Council's decision in due course.

ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR

There has been an increase in anti-social behaviour in certain areas of Knocklyon. The KCC has held meetings with various parties to help to minimise the problem. The best way of reducing this problem is for parents to be more aware of it and for them to be more aware of the activities and location of their children between 8 p.m. and 1 a.m. This anti-social behaviour includes the use of drink and drugs, particularly on open spaces in the parish. We would urge parents to be aware of the threat posed by the peddling of drugs in Knocklyon.

KNOCKLYON POST-PRIMARY COMMITTEE

There have been a number of developments during the summer months. Following a committee meeting held during the summer a delegation was formed and a meeting was held with the planning officials of the Department of Education in May at the Taoiseach's department. Deputies O'Donnell, Brennan and Kitt also attended. The officials confirmed that (1) The planning procedures were nearing completion of the 9 stage procedure; (2) Encroachment by housing developments at Orlagh has lost almost an acre of the original 11.2 acre site; (3) The 600-800 pupil Community School will have a PE hall, computer centre and field sport facilities. The stream running through the site may be adapted as an aspect of the school facilities. Commencement of building, costed at £3 million + £1/2 million for equipment, would begin around March 1999 and they were confident that it would be opened for the first stream of pupils in September 2000.

A planning application by the Gaelscoil to erect some pre-fabs on 3 acres of the school site was submitted to South Dublin County Council. On the 9th September we received a letter from Minister Micheál Martin which confirmed that Knocklyon Post Primary School alone will be built on the site. (See Knocklyon Community Council Report on page 5.)

We have fought long and hard for our school and are confident that it will be built on time, and that it will serve not only our local Knocklyon children but our adult education needs as well.



### Remembering Omagh

Six weeks after the tragedy of Omagh, parishioner Anna Brioscú reminds us of how the community in Knocklyon gathered in prayer and sympathy for the victims and their families.



On Saturday the 22nd August at three o'clock in the afternoon the Church of St. Colmcille, Knocklyon, was thronged with people of all ages who had come to pray and to show solidarity with the people of Omagh, Co. Tyrone, in their time of great sorrow and suffering. Around the Pascal Candle on the altar were smaller candles representing the dead. Hundreds of tiny candles were lit by members of the congregation who came to pray that all might be comforted and that at last real peace might come to our country. We prayed for the deceased; the maimed; the injured; the medical and para-medical people who came from all over the country to help in the hospitals; the security forces and all who valiantly and unselfishly gave assistance in the wake of the horrific explosion which happened on the Feast of the Assumption of Our Lady in Omagh at ten minutes past three in the afternoon. We also prayed that the politicians would redouble their efforts for peace with a generosity of spirit. Prayers were also offered for the perpetrators of the dastardly act that they repent and turn their backs on their evil ways. A Thiarna bí ceannsa agus éist linn!



I had not read the book but like so many I was convinced he was a bit of a troublemaker. Now my conscience began to niggle so I decided to buy Paul's book and read it carefully. My eyes were opened. Here was a young man whose father had won Rás Tailteann many moons ago. He had a dream that one day he would ride in the Tour de France. This is a

story of a young lad who was brought up to think for himself; not to be afraid to say no; not to be a sheep. He had a dilemma on his hands very early in his professional cycling career. Should he submit to the drug culture in the sport or bow out? He was fortunate to have a talen for writing, which gave him his chance to escape. In "Rough Ride" Paul Kimmage tells from his own experiences how difficult it is to have the moral courage to say no.

It is so sad that greed and the "win at all cost" culture has crept into sport. Let's get back to the days when participating was all important and winning was a bonus."



### ~~~ Reflection ~~~

"You cannot serve God and ... the Designer Label"!

The biggest hang-up I suffer from is — wait for it! — hatred of the Designer Label. The saddest (sickest?) thing I've heard recently was of a group of youngsters, not yet in their teens, laughing and jeering at one of their peers because his runners had been purchased in Dunnes Stores! Worse again was a woman, interviewed on radio, solemnly informing the nation that her eight-year-old would "only wear clothes with the right tag". It was the tone of resignation and acceptance that got me. For God's sake!!

Incidents of this disease of the spirit abound. A woman going to town with a folded plastic bag bearing the name of an upmarket store, in which she will carry home her shopping purchased in a down-market outlet! A man buying jeans or shoes for his son (which the child will outgrow in months), and paying four times the price of another pair just as good but not carrying the "in" label!

No longer are necessity or usefulness the main bases for buying, but rather the childish allegation "everyone else has one", and extravagance serves the passing whim of an over indulged generation.

The children are not to blame. They are victims of a climate established by an adult world. Children, in their insecurity, are naturally prone to peer pressure, and not to fit in with the rest is the worst of all fates.

What in the adult world has caused the rot? A number of things. Insecurity in the grown-up too, that stops us stepping out of line. Poverty of spirit that sees exaggerated value in what is external and superficial to the detriment of the inner qualities that really define a good person.

And it all misfires. It doesn't work. By bringing up our children to overvalue the material, we actually undermine their self-esteem. What an awful indictment of a society that teaches its young to set more store on clothing than on compassion, on labels than on love!

Most parents I talk to know it's all out of control and out of proportion. They feel powerless, stymied; another case of "Catch 22"! Go with the flow and you lose, as your child falls victim to the disorder. Stand out against it and you lose also, as your child suffers the pain of being different and is subjected to the cruel jibes of its peers.

Yes, the climate needs changing. And that's not easy. Still it's got to be done. And to acknowledge the problem is, at least, a start.




