John McKennedy was born and reared in Stepaside, Co. Dublin, and spent an idyllic childhood in the heart of the Dublin mountains, climbing, hiking and having fun in this vast playground of freedom and beauty. His Primary School was St. Mary's Sandyford. Secondary brought him into the centre of Dublin when he became a student at C.B.S. Westland Row. The reason his parents chose this, was simply because there was a direct bus route from Stepaside to Westland Row. One might think that such a transition from peaceful surroundings to the noise and bustle of city life would have been too much, but not so. Lunchtime was long in the C.B.S. and John soon discovered that just across the road from Westland Row there was an entrance to the grounds of Trinity College. The Campus was an oasis of tranguility. Flower beds, long stretches of green grass, cobblestones, and beautiful old buildings were like pictures from another age. No wonder he decided to opt for Trinity College after the Leaving Cert. There he studied and graduated in Science and Chemistry and later on a Higher Diploma in Education and a Masters in Chemistry.

After this John joined the staff of St. Tiernan's Community School, Sandyford Road and settled into life in the teaching profession. In addition to his Science/Chemistry classes he has a great love of music. He set up a student choir and established the school musical. It is now a yearly event. He also plays Irish music.

St. Colmcille's Community School is due for completion in March and another 120 students are due in September. The plan will continue for 5 or 6 years when the intake will have reached 650 students. By then the school will have three Science Labs, a Computer Section, facilities for Art and Construction Engineering. Sport facilities are a priority. There will be a full-sized Gym. A choir has been formed and will present their first musical production, 'Joseph And His Amazing Coloured Dreamcoat' in March under the direction of Ruth Kelly and must surely be a welcome first.

We are responsible not only for their scholarly education, but also for guiding them to be upright citizens of our country. Regardless of age, we must always remember to respect them. It is a well known fact that respected young people have mutual respect.'

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
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Life After School ... And Beyond! The second in our series following up on particular careers chosen by some of our parishioners

Dr. Brian Bird

In the November '94 issue of the Newsletter we published an account of Brian Bird's studies – he was then a third year medical student at Trinity College. We recently spoke to Brian who brought us up to date with events in his life since then. . . .

Brian graduated from Trinity as a medical doctor in June '98 and since then he has

worked in St. James's Hospital, and Wexford and Portlaoise General Hospitals. He is currently employed in Tallaght Hospital working in the Gastroenterology service unit.

Being a doctor is a demanding job with huge responsibility, but Brian feels he is in a privileged position, being able to help and care for the community. Having gained experience in various units, Brian is keen to specialise in oncology – a much-needed service in society today.

He has already worked with Professor Daly and the oncology team at St. James's Hospital, and he is aware of the positive effect that treatment in this area can have on cancer patients.

Brian is optimistic that sometime in the future a discovery will be made for a vaccine against cancer and he hopes that a time will come when damaged organs can be regrown.

Brian has completed a post-graduate course where he studied for and was awarded membership of The Royal College of Physicians in Ireland – a great achievement for any 26-year-old.

He is concerned about the long working hours expect-

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ed from junior doctors, and he was involved in the public campaign to highlight the dangers, and the need for changes in working 36 hour shifts. Brian is one of the people representing Tallaght Hospital on The Irish Medical Organisation, which is involved with ongoing negotiations with Government the Body H.S.E.A. - regarding better conditions for junior doctors. He is disappointed that so far no progress has been made in limiting the number of hours worked. For relaxation Brian takes to the sea air and sailing. Since the

age of 13 when he had his first sailing lesson he has been hooked! For the past five years he has been involved with the club 'Les Glenans' which encourages beginners and provides courses

focussed on teaching people to sail.

As a member of this club Brian has spent time training at their two resorts (Westport, Co. Mayo and Baltimore, Co. Cork) and last Easter he completed a course on which he qualified as a sailing instructor. This activity is carried out on a voluntary basis and he gets a great sense of satisfaction in sharing his skills with others.

Even though Brian now lives in an apartment near town he still has strong links with Knocklyon as he frequently visits his family home in Idrone. As we speak he recalls his happy childhood growing up in Knocklyon, his schooldays in St. Colmcille's and his time spent with the youth club. When he was 12 he broke both his arms by falling off his bike and it was around that time he decided he wanted to become a doctor.

Brian's focus is on people and on the people he has to care for. His hope for the future is that "more people will suffer less, and that more people will get better quicker". With an outlook like this we feel that the patients who are being cared for by Brian will have a great chance of regaining their health. We wish him every success in his chosen career.



ST. THERESE'S **SPIRITUALIT**

"I feel that my Mission is about to begin, my mission to make God loved as I love him, to teach souls my little way." These words were spoken by St. Therese a few months before her death.

St. Therese of Lisieux was a Carmelite Sister who died at the age of 24 in 1897.

Her autobiography, 'The Story Of A Soul', written originally during her illness, at the direction of her Mother Prioress. has been translated into dozens of languages and read by many millions of people, worldwide.

She is famed for her promise that she would "spend her heaven doing good on earth". The extraordinary number of miracles of healing attributed to her intercession led to her early Canonisation by Pope Pius XI in 1925, who spoke of her as "the greatest Saint in modern times".

In April, 1923, Pius XI had written, "We earnestly decree that all the faithful should study her in order to copy her. becoming 'children themselves; since otherwise they cannot, according to the words of the Master, arrive at the Kingdom of Heaven."

St. Therese's popularity with the Irish people is witnessed by the fact that her statue can be seen in Churches everywhere throughout the Country. Here, in Knocklyon Church, we have a shrine dedicated to her, the statue donated to us by the Carmelite Sisters, Firhouse,

St. Therese is linked with St. Francis Xavier in that the two saints have been declared Co-Patrons of the Missions: St. Francis, the great pioneer-

ing, active Missionary and St. Therese, witnessing to the love, prayer and sacrifice that powers the Church's entire missionary endeavour. This fact, alone, makes the Spirituality of St. Therese, a very appropriate theme for the Novena of Grace.

The Relics of St. Therese - a Casket containing the saint's mortal remains - will be in Ireland from Easter Monday until mid-June this year. The relics will visit Cathedral Churches of every Diocese, and all Carmelite Monasteries.

The Relics will be in our Church on Saturday/Sunday, May 5th-6th. The RTE televised Mass that Sunday will be from Knocklvon Church.

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

As places for this course are limited and are being offered initially to those whose names are on the waiting list, early application for remaining places is essential. **Fee: £45.00**.



Fresh from Iowa



Lending A Helping Hand To Regina Coeli

Regular readers will be aware that our Parish of St. Colmcille's has been 'twinned' for many years with the Carmelite Mission of 'Regina Coeli'.

This mission is situated in the east of Zimbabwe, 360km from the capital Harare. In the past two years we have featured articles describing life on the mission and introducing Fr. Ned Ward, its director. Fr. Ned has recently been joined at the mission by Fr. Michael Hender from Ashford, Co. Wicklow.

Over many years our parish has been involved in fund-rais-

ing projects to assist the development of this mission - older residents may remember the 'American Tea Party' - which was an annual event at one time and proved very successful. A fashion show in the Spawell in 1995 yielded £5,000 for this cause, and the most recent donation to the mission was from a Church door collection in March 1999. Two years on, and with the 'Celtic Tiger' roaring, another fund-raising

event is being organised for which you are being asked to 'dig deep'. But before you hand over your hard-earned cash, we would like to remind you of some aspects of life in Regina Coeli, and how funds raised can be used.

The mission contains accommodation for the priests, a convent currently being reconstructed for the Dominican Sisters, a 120-bed hospital, and a secondary school with 420 pupils. Within the compound there are 20 bungalows which house teachers and another 60 housing nurses, and their families. It serves a population of 2,000 within a five-mile radius, and is a very important centre in the region.

Because the mission has been there for over 50 years, a lot of renovation to existing buildings is required. In January of this year the local health authorities conducted a survey which indicated that the dormitories, kitchen and toilet facilities were not up to an acceptable level and would have to be upgraded.

The School - The secondary school has approximately 420 pupils of which 120 girls and 122 boys are boarders. The fees for boarders are the equivalent of IR£23 per term, but even this sum is not within easy reach for many of the families concerned.

Currently the school caters for pupils up to O-level (Junior Cert equivalent), but in response to a request from the local Bishop that it be extended to cater for A-level students (Leaving Cert equivalent) the mission is currently constructing additional classrooms, but must raise the necessary funding through the Carmelite order or locally. This funding is in addition to that required for essential repairs/upgrading.

Hospital - The hospital has 120 beds including male and female surgical wards, a T.B. ward, maternity ward and out-patients clinic.

The nursing staff are led by five Dominican sisters. There is also a medical offi-



cer, and two ambulances to cater for the large area served.

While this was traditionally a hospital where T.B. was a problem, development of HIV/AIDS has meant that most patients are now suffering from AIDS-related illnesses including pneumonia. Malnourishment thought to be related to AIDS is increasing and Malaria is a major problem. It is hard to believe that it is only in the last six months that electricity from the national grid reached the mission, previously power could only be obtained from a diesel generator.



Home-based Care - This project was started in 1993 when medical efforts turned from T.B. treatment to tackling the problems of HIV/AIDS which is rampant in the country. The homebased care unit formed in the hospital consists of a co-ordinator, an assistant, a local trainer, nutrition educator and orphan care member. The vision of the project is "an AIDS-free community by the year 2020". Unit workers say that

awareness in the communities of HIV/AIDS is no longer a problem, and they can now concentrate their efforts on workshops to change behaviour. The huge problem of children orphaned by AIDS is being tackled by this unit, who encourage communities to take care of these children, as well as the sick and dying. This unit has itself been developing fund-raising schemes among the villages where they are active - starting groups crocheting, knitting, sewing, carpentry, while AIDS victims themselves are involved in gardening, tool-making, beekeeping. This vital project needs ongoing finance. Its client list totals over 7,000 (over 4,500 of which are orphans).

While there have been very positive developments in Regina Coeli in recent years, the needs are ongoing and growing - a "wish list" to help advance progress there includes a tractor

costing IR£8,000. But there are many many other items which your contributions to this fund-raising evening could assist. Watch out for further information through the schools and Church notices.

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On the 24th January a deputation from the KCC went to meet with the South Dublin Co. Council at their offices in Tallaght. At the meeting we were informed that the next stage of the M50 will not open until the Summer of 2001 following the completion of the Ballinteer intersection. Work will be commencing shortly on the 'flyover' behind Delanys.

Due to the potential increase in traffic on the Knocklyon Road following the opening of the Spawell Bridge, the KCC enquired if the Council had any proposals to introduce any traffic calming measures. The Senior engineer stated he was not in favour of traffic calming measures due to the experience in other areas which did not have the desired effect. However, he did agree to examine the need to put pedestrian lights at the Esso garage and is referring the matter to the Traffic Study Group for their consideration subsequent to the carrying out of a pedestrian count at that location.

The KCC also requested adequate new signage for Knocklyon from the M50. The Council will provide signs indicating major interchanges and the KCC is to make a written submission outlining the particular signage needed at the various locations and that will be presented to a general Road and Traffic Committee meeting.

The KCC also asked that Cherryfield Park be cleaned up as its potential benefit to the community is being underutilised due to its overgrown and untidy state. The Parks Department is aware of the problem and will arrange a clean-up when the work can be accommodated. The Parks Department also informed us that their tree-pruning programme this year is to include Ashton, Knockaire, Knockcullen and Knocklyon Avenue. They are aware that there is greater need for pruning in the general Knocklyon area but due to staff shortages this can only be carried out on a gradual basis.

Our local representatives Stanley Laing, Ann Ormonde and John Lahart were also present and assured us they will follow up the various concerns of the KCC with the executives of the Council.

On the planning front Ellior Developments have submitted for planning permission for 638 houses at Knocklyon, Dublin 24. The KCC have sent their submission to South Dublin County Council. The **Annual General Meeting** will take place on the 27th March, 2001, in the Community Centre. All residents of Knocklyon are welcome and any **Proposed Motions** are to be with the Secretary <u>not later than the</u> 13th March, 2001.

Nominations for **Independent Members** must have their nomination form back with the Secretary by the 20th <u>March, 2001</u>. Nominees must be present on the night. Under the constitution eight Independent members can be elected.


Coolamber Trio at Royal Festival Hall



We wish Stephen every success with 'The Irish Highwaymen'.



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
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A PLEA FOR ST. PATRICK'S INTERCESSION
